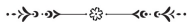
Without any memory of Elsa's magic, Anna had no idea why she was always alone. Over time, she simply came to accept that her sister's coldness was part of who she was. She didn't

“Just you?” Hans asked. A warm smile spread across his face.

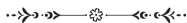
Anna couldn’t help smiling back. All of sudden, the castle bells began to peal.

Anna told the crowd.

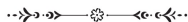
“Are you sure you can trust her?”

Panic grew among the villagers. Hans looked toward the North Mountain. “Princess Anna is in trouble!” he cried. “I need volunteers to go with me to find her.”

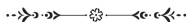
A number of men immediately stepped forward. The Duke ordered his two huge guards to join the search party as well. But he gave them a little advice before they left.

the frozen fjord and up into the mountains.



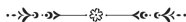

There, he immediately spotted the guard trapped against the wall and the other one pushed to the very edge of the

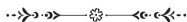
balcony. The man was just inches from falling to his death!

Quickly, Kristoff scooped Anna into his arms and placed her on Sven’s back. He climbed up behind her, nodding his thanks to the trolls.

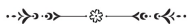
Hulda sighed. “Ugh. We’ll never get him married, Soren,” she muttered.

“I’ve got you,” Kristoff said,

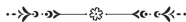
helping her off the reindeer.

“You won’t get away with this,”

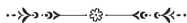
Anna said fiercely.

“No!” the Duke shouted.

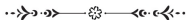
With his head in his hands, Hans played the part of a grieving man. “We said our wedding vows...before she died in my arms.”

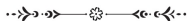
Sven dropped him straight into the snow, hard.

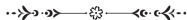

“Are you ready?” Elsa was asking the crowd. She raised her arms, swirled them in the air, and created a beautiful ice rink!

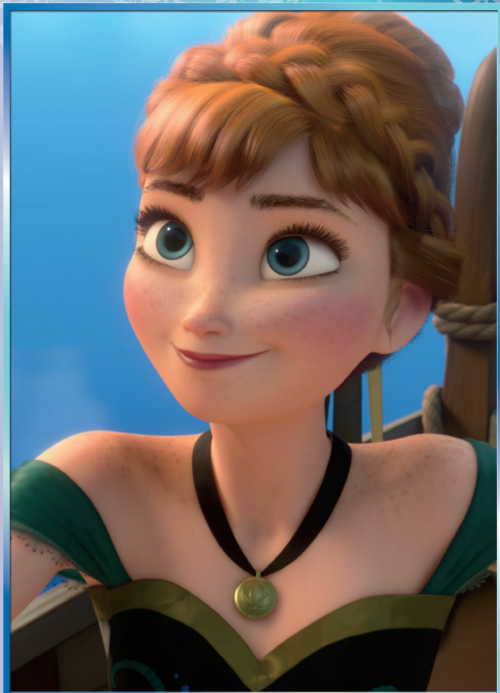
Anna ran to her sister. “The gates are open,” she said. “I like it.”

and it sounds VERY large.



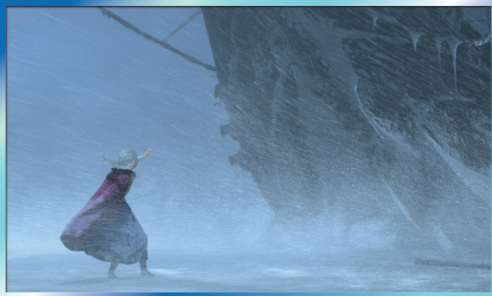
Kristoff and Anna are chased by a giant snowman that's protecting Elsa's ice palace!
