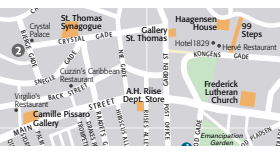

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VIRGIN ISLANDS' TOP 10



Top 10 Highlights of the Virgin Islands

Mere specks in the Caribbean, the US and British Virgin Islands sit within eyesight of each other. The Stars and Stripes flutters over St. Croix, St. John, and St. Thomas and the Union Jack over Tortola, Virgin Gorda, and the outer islands, but all offer tropical sun, soft sand beaches, and turquoise sea. In both territories motorists drive on the left, a decidedly British practice, while the US dollar serves as legal tender. However, each island has its own ambience, from the bustle in St. Thomas to downright sleepiness in the outer BVI.



1 Historic St. Croix
First settled in 1625 by Holland and England, with other European countries following, this former Danish colony reveals its history at every turn of the road. The Danish influence is especially obvious in the island's two main towns, Christiansted and Frederiksted (see pp8–9).



2 Virgin Islands National Park, St. John
Established in 1956, this park occupies about two-thirds of this 20-sq mile (52-sq km) island. Besides a range of plants and animals, it features gorgeous beaches, hiking trails on its lush hillsides, interesting ruins along the hills and coasts, and water-sports galore (see pp10–11).



3 Stroll Through Cruz Bay, St. John

Tucked next to a pretty harbor, this cozy town stretches inland for several blocks. It offers eclectic shops, bars, restaurants, and people-watching within walking distance (see pp12–13).



4 Duty-free Shopping in St. Thomas

Good prices, thanks to a duty-free deal from the US government, and the variety of merchandise make this a shopping mecca (see pp14–15).

5 Historic Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas

Settled by Denmark in 1666, this town is the island's historical hub. Streets carry Danish names and many buildings date back several centuries (see pp16–17).

8 Sailing in the British Virgin Islands

Year-round balmy weather, gorgeous scenery, and pristine anchorages just a day's sail from each other make this one of the top sailing destinations in the world (see pp22–3).



6 Coral World, St. Thomas

This marine park connects visitors with the undersea life around the islands. Watch colorful fish in tanks or up close on underwater adventures such as Sea Trekkin' or Snuba (see pp18–19).



9 Dive & Snorkel Trips

Reefs teeming with colorful fish and coral provide interesting diving no matter where you go, but the best diving is found offshore on a boat trip (see pp24–5).

7 BVI National Parks & Scenic Spots

History, hiking, diving, and lovely sea views greet visitors who seek out these special places. Some are off the beaten path, but all are worth the effort (see pp20–21).



10 Beach Resorts

Total calm and laziness by the sea or an abundance of activities – Virgin Islands' top resorts offer everything to make your holiday a dream come true (see pp26–7).



Top 10 Historic St. Croix

Once divided into 224 estates, St. Croix has a plantation past that continued long after the end of slavery in 1848, as indicated by its many 18th- and 19th-century great houses and sugar mills. Since 1625, five of the big European colonial powers have raised their flag here. The most influential were the Danish, who ruled from 1733 to 1917, when the island, along with St. Thomas and St. John, became a US territory.

Except for Christiansted and Frederiksted, you will need a rental car or taxi tour to see the sights. Make sure you get a free map at your hotel, rental car agency, or the tourism office. Gas stations do not sell maps.

You will find a range of restaurants in Christiansted and Frederiksted, but bring lunch or snacks for a picnic. St. George Village Botanical Garden and Whim Plantation Museum make lovely choices.

1 Historic Christiansted

Named after the then Danish king, this gracious town's (right) construction started in 1735. Centered on the harbor, it has streets running uphill from the waterfront and distinctly 18th-century European architecture (see p57).

2 Christiansted National Historic Site

Operated by the National Park Service, this waterfront area features several historic buildings. Apart from Fort Christianvaern, there are the Scale House where sugar was weighed, Customs House, and Post Office. The Steeple Building (right) has a small museum (see p57).



3 Fort Christianvaern

The centerpiece of the Christiansted National Historic Site, this imposing yellow edifice at the water's edge dates to 1749. Its dungeons, ramparts, and cannons (above) provide interesting exploring. Park rangers answer questions and offer tours (see p57).



4 Government House

Now the seat of the territorial government, Government House dates from 1747. It was originally erected as a home for a Danish merchant. The building's sweeping welcoming-arms staircase, a traditional element in stately Danish-era homes, leads to a second-story ballroom. The courtyard is open to visitors.

5 Judith's Fancy

The remains of a great house and tower sit in the heart of this posh neighborhood, named after the woman buried near the ruins. Christopher Columbus halted at nearby Salt River Bay in 1493 (see p40).

6 St. George Village Botanical Garden

Around 1,500 varieties of leafy plants and flowers surround the ruins of a 19th-century sugar plantation village. Its gardens (right) include examples of each of St. Croix's eco-systems ranging from an arid cactus garden to a lush rainforest (see p58).



7 Whim Plantation Museum

Restored by the St. Croix Landmarks Society, this estate boasts a fine 18th-century great house. The oval-shaped mansion is filled with antiques, including a four-poster bed and old photos of St. Croix. Outbuildings include a kitchen, sugar factory, and windmill (see p58).



9 Carl & Marie Lawaetz Museum

This circa 1750 gem was the home of the prominent Lawaetz family. Often, a Lawaetz family member conducts tours that include stops at the four-poster mahogany bed (left) shared by Carl and Marie, the dining room with its hand-painted china, and the gardens that fed the family for generations (see p58).

8 Estate Mount Washington

The extensive stone ruins of this old sugar plantation include a mill and a rum factory. The ruins were discovered underneath foliage by the owners of the adjacent house.

10 Historic Frederiksted

Charming Frederiksted dates to 1751 (see p58). Fort Frederik, near the cruise ship pier, is the town's historical focus. Here, freedom was granted to the island's slaves on July 3, 1848 (see p48).



Top 10 Virgin Islands National Park, St. John

Green mountains meet white, sandy shores at this showcase of the National Park Service, which occupies two-thirds of St. John's area. A mix of native and introduced species thrive among its varied vegetation, which ranges from moist subtropical forests to semi-arid scrublands. The park's inhabitants include gecko and iguana lizards, sea turtles, bats, reef fish, and more than 30 species of tropical birds. Visitors can swim, snorkel, and scuba-dive pristine reefs, or hike past stone ruins left from the days of sugar and slavery.

1 The park's beaches are open 24 hours, but for safety's sake, limit your visit to daylight hours. Explore the park during the cooler morning or late afternoon hours. The midday tropical sun burns bright at this latitude.

2 While you'll find restaurants in Cruz Bay and Coral Bay, options inside the park are limited to pricey restaurants at Caneel Bay Resort and more pedestrian ones at Cinnamon Bay Campground and Maho Bay Camps. Trunk Bay has a snack bar that sells burgers. Bring your lunch or snacks for a picnic under the palm trees.

1 Virgin Islands National Park Visitor's Center

Start your visit to the park here (below). Rangers are on hand with maps and brochures, and advice on how best to use your time. Displays explain the park's natural and cultural history. A small store sells books and gift items.



2 Salomon Beach

Hike downhill from behind the Visitor's Center for 20 minutes to the only beach within walking distance of Cruz Bay. Worth the effort for a few hours at the soft, sandy beach or snorkeling the nearby rocks and reefs. Map D2



3 North Shore Road (Route 20)

Don't miss a drive along this gorgeous route. Overlooks let motorists safely view the spectacular sea and mountain vistas (see p40). Pick up a map at the Visitor's Center before setting out. Map D2



4 Hawksnest Bay
Seagrapes and palm trees fringe this stunning strand of sand. Snorkel the patchy reefs that sit just offshore, stroll along the water's edge, or simply while away hours on your beach towel. Facilities include basic toilets, a changing room, and simple pavilions (see p63).



9 Reef Bay Hike
With park rangers, trek down this trail to the old Reef Bay Estate, past flora, fauna, and a natural pool inscribed with ancient petroglyphs (above). A boat meets hikers for a ride back to Cruz Bay (see p67).



5 Trunk Bay Beach
The park's busiest beach, Trunk Bay (left) features an underwater snorkel trail with signs to explain the sights. It's popular with cruise ship tours, so come early or late for solitude (see p63).

6 Annaberg Plantation
A huge stone windmill (right) is the centerpiece of this restored 18th-century sugar plantation, which includes a sugar factory, a tiny jail, and the remains of a slave village. Ranger talks here highlight the island's agrarian past (see p64).



7 Salt Pond Bay
Sun or snorkel at this sandy beach, or, for some adventure, hike up Ram Head for its fine views (above). Follow the signs on the beach's south side. The only facilities here are an outhouse and picnic tables. ☺ Map F2

8 Lameshur Bay & Beach
It's a bit of a drive to Lameshur on a mostly paved road, but it's worth the trip if you crave a sparsely populated beach. The snorkeling, particularly on the east side of the bay, is superb, while the ruins in the west are fun to explore. An outhouse provides the only facilities. ☺ Map E2



10 Explore the Nooks & Crannies in a Kayak
Rent kayaks at Cinnamon Bay Campground or Maho Bay Camps (see p115) to explore the park's nautical byways (left). Kayaks are easy to maneuver, and you won't mind a spill because the water is warm. Pull the kayak up on shore to spend time snorkeling.



10 Stroll Through Cruz Bay, St. John

St. John's main town welcomes visitors with a palm-fringed scimitar of white sand that belies the bustle of its streets. With its narrow roads and traffic that moves at a crawl, it is a stroller's paradise. The streets run on a grid inland from the picturesque harbor, and are lined with interesting boutiques, bars, and fine restaurants. Lovely Cruz Bay Park near the waterfront is perfect for people-watching. Necessities such as the bank, the post office, and the tourism office lie within a block or two of each other in this charming tropical town.

Cruz Bay can get unpleasantly busy during morning and evening rush hours. If you are driving, avoid the waterfront.

There are restaurants in Mongoose Junction and Wharfside Village shopping centers and throughout Cruz Bay. Outdoor tables adjacent to the VINP Visitor's Center provide a nice picnic spot.

1 Ferry Dock

Unless they come by private boat, all visitors arrive via ferry at the public dock next to a stretch of beach where smaller boats are moored (below). Porters will carry your luggage to the transportation area. A take-out spot just steps away from the dock sells sandwiches, snacks, and drinks.

2 Battery

Visible from Cruz Bay harbor, the red-roofed Battery was built in 1825 as a courthouse and prison for the island's slaves. The cannons and jail cells remain. It now serves as the local government seat. You can explore the lovely grounds.

3 Tourism Office

The local government's tourism office sits tucked away in a small park next to the post office. This is the place to go for maps and brochures on places to stay and various activities available in St. John.



4 Post Office

This tiny branch of the US Postal Service is the only place in St. John to mail postcards. The lines at the counter can be very long, so be sure to come early in the morning to enjoy a quicker service.



5 Virgin Islands National Park Visitor's Center

Stop by here (*right*) for maps, brochures, and information on the latest park activities. The center also features exhibits about the park's history, flora, and fauna (*see p10*).



6 Mongoose Junction Shopping Center

Built of stone with steps and pathways on several levels, this quaint shopping center (*left*) has an eclectic set of shops and restaurants, as well as a parking lot and public facilities (*see p68*).



7 Elaine I. Sprauve Library

Named after a dedicated government employee, the library is housed in the 1757 Estate Enighed great house (*below*). As well as a range of locally written books, it features a small museum with archeological photographs and historic artifacts.



8 Nazareth Lutheran Church

Dating to 1720, this small church (*below*) is home to one of the island's oldest congregations. Its doors are open during the day – feel free to peep inside. For a glimpse of local life, attend Sunday services.



9 Wharfside Village Shopping Center

Sitting on Cruz Bay Beach, this is an attractive shopping center with flowers fringing its walkways. You'll find a watersports center, several good restaurants, and many shops.

10 Cruz Bay Park

Benches shaded by old trees and attractive gardens beckon strollers to sit for a while in the small park across the street from the waterfront. A statue of a man blowing a conch at the park's edge commemorates the July 3, 1848 emancipation from slavery (*see p48*).

at 10 Duty-Free Shopping in St. Thomas

A shopper's delight, St. Thomas's duty-free status dates to Danish days, when the Danish government made it a free port. This is what helps lure nearly 1.5 million people to the island each year. You can shop till you drop, or spend only a few hours strolling Charlotte Amalie's old shopping district, or make a quick dash into the nearest mall or hotel gift shop for a bottle of duty-free liquor or a trinket to take back home.

Travelers from the US can take home \$1,200 worth of goods from St. Thomas without paying duty. UK travelers may bring home goods of the value of £145 from St. Thomas, along with fixed quantities of liquor, cigarettes, perfume, and eau de toilette. Travelers from other countries should check before they leave home to see how much duty they'll have to pay to shop in the USVI.

1 Main Street, Charlotte Amalie

Stores sit cheek-by-jowl along Main Street (*below*) in old stone buildings that once served as warehouses for the sugar trade, providing a delightful ambience for shopping. Interesting bargains, especially for items such as perfume and jewelry, are possible, thanks to the territory's duty-free status. Map N2



2 Havensight Mall

Sitting next to the cruise ship docks at Havensight, this busy alfresco mall (*above*) caters to cruise ship passengers and shoppers who don't want to brave the crowds filling Main Street, Charlotte Amalie. Many Main Street stores have branches here.

3 Kmart

Shop with the locals at Kmart, a US department store chain, for bathing suits, shorts, t-shirts, beach sandals, sunscreen, and other incidentals at prices much lower than those at hotel gift shops. Its liquor store has a large selection at very reasonable duty-free prices.



5 A.H. Riise Department Store

This venerable store has its roots in the A.H. Riise Pharmacy, which opened in 1840. The only place in the island to sell Rolex watches, this one-stop store carries vast lines of quality goods, including china, crystal, and jewelry (*left*).

6 The Art Scene

St. Thomas has a huge art scene, with galleries (*below*) scattered around the island and on Main Street. Quality varies, but there are some excellent local artists. Most works have a tropical feel, but occasionally artists depart from the norm.



4 Vendors Plaza

Colorful umbrellas shade vendors at this outdoor market across from the Charlotte Amalie waterfront. There's everything from crafts to designer handbags, but watch for knockoffs that carry fake designer labels.



7 Made in the Islands

Instead of a t-shirt, take home gifts that reflect the Caribbean. Stores all over the islands carry inexpensive jewelry, ceramic pieces, artwork, packaged foods, and more, hand-made by local artisans.

8 Jewelry

St. Thomas's duty-free position usually makes jewelry a bargain. Many stores carry pieces with a variety of gems and worth thousands of dollars, but you can also find less expensive articles. Some jewelry stores will design items to your specifications.

9 Electronics & Cameras

While merchants tout bargain prices on electronics and cameras, you might do better at your hometown discount store. However, you may find models and accessories not easily available. The knowledgeable sales people can help you pick the right equipment.



10 Liquor

Spirits are sold in many different types of stores, including supermarkets, convenience stores, and department stores. While you can buy quality brands of the usual gin and scotch, try a Caribbean liqueur like Coco Lopez or a bottle of St. Croix's Cruzan Rum for a take-home treat (*left*).

10 Historic Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas

At the heart of St. Thomas's history, this city was settled by the Danes in 1666. Its name was changed from *Tap Hus* (Beer Hall) to honor the wife of Danish King Christian V. Pirates used the city as a hide-out until the mid-18th century, when merchants began to open shops on Main Street. It gained in importance after becoming a free port in 1764 and served as the West Indian sugar trade center until the mid-19th century.

The historic sites are spread out and require some walking. To see them all, you will need a full day.

1 Fort Christian

Standing proud near the waterfront, the huge rust-colored Fort Christian (right) is the oldest building in St. Thomas. Built by the Danes to protect the island, its construction began in 1672. A small museum within has artifacts from the island's past.

2 Legislature Building

Originally a Danish police barracks, this building later housed the high school. It is now home to the territory's 15-member political body. You can attend sessions if you are wearing appropriate attire.



3 Emancipation Garden

This park commemorates the 1848 emancipation of the slaves. A bust of King Christian V (above) and a replica of Philadelphia's Liberty Bell sit among shaded benches, which provide a respite for tired sightseers. ☎ Map P3



4 Frederick Lutheran Church

Built in 1820 as the Danish state church, the building (left) retains much of its original Neo-Classical and Gothic Revival character. Its gracious front steps allow folks to peek inside at its lovely stained-glass windows and bell tower. Visitors are welcome to the 9am Sunday services.

5 Old Warehouses
Main Street's stores originally served as warehouses in the sugar and rum trade. There was no waterfront highway, and ships used to back right up to the warehouses to take on cargo. Map N2



6 Government House
Built in 1867 for the Danish Colonial Council, this pretty building (*left*) now serves as the governor's office. The lower level, which displays four works by Impressionist painter and native son, Camille Pissarro, is open to visitors.

7 St. Thomas Synagogue
With a congregation that dates back to 1796, this synagogue (*above*) is the second oldest in the Caribbean. The gracious building dates to 1833 (two earlier buildings fell victim to fire). Its sand floor signifies the flight of Jews from Egypt.



8 Seven Arches Museum
The owner of this private home (*above*) welcomes visitors for a glimpse of early Danish life. A typical 18th-century Danish West Indian house, it features an expansive "welcoming arms" staircase supported by seven arches, and period pieces.

10 Haagensen House
This restored 19th-century home belonged to Danish banker and merchant Hans Haagensen. The bedrooms, sitting room, and veranda are furnished in period pieces. Typical of its time, it has a cookhouse and other outbuildings. You can also explore the adjacent herb garden.

99 Steps
Built in the 18th century to connect the upper and lower parts of town, this staircase (*right*) actually has 103 steps of yellow shipballast brick. Continue up Government Hill for grand views from the old tower of Blackbeard's Castle, now part of a hotel (see p113). Map P2





at 10 Coral World, St. Thomas

Much more than an aquarium, Coral World gets you up close and personal with sea life without getting wet, although some of its activities afford adventurous opportunities for those willing to go into the water. While you can see it all in a couple of hours, it's a great place for both adults and kids to spend the whole day. In addition to its huge undersea observatory, tank exhibits, and shark-feeding experience, Coral World serves as a center for rehabilitating turtles and breeding seahorses, and has an extensive mangrove replanting project to help improve the eco-system in its neighborhood.



Parasailing

For an unusual experience, drop your postcards in the Underwater Observatory mailbox – they'll be stamped "Mailed Underwater at Coral World."

1 Undersea Observatory

Coral World's centerpiece takes you 100 ft (30 m) out into the ocean and 15 ft (4 m) deep (right). Look into the ocean through 24 huge windows and enjoy the ever-changing scene as colorful fish swim by.



2 Shark Shallows

A wide variety of Caribbean sharks, which may include lemon, reef, nurse, and Atlantic black-tip, swim in a large tank, viewable from the top and one side (above). Children get a chance to pet a baby shark when staff members do their daily feeding.

3 Stingray Pool

It takes a careful eye to see a stingray buried in the sand, but those with patience are rewarded. Stingrays occasionally glide around the pool, looking like giant dinner plates gone adrift. Visitors are invited to feed the stingrays with the help of an aquarist.





4 Marine Gardens

Twenty-one aquariums are home to an abundance of marine species (*above*). Take your time to spot such creatures as the camouflaged scorpionfish, and look for crabs, tubeworms, and sea anemones on the reef.

5 Caribbean Reef Encounter

In this 80,000-gallon (303,200-liter) tank that replicates the reefs just offshore Coral World, visitors can explore a huge variety of marine life. Interpretive panels explain how reefs form and the role they play in keeping fish alive.

6 Sea Lion Swim

Experience the magic of swimming with a South American sea lion. Accompanied by a marine mammal trainer, the sea lions demonstrate their intelligence as they entertain, shake your hand and give you a kiss.

7 Sea Trekkin'

Don a helmet hooked up to an air hose for this easy adventure on the ocean floor (*below*). Your face and hair stay dry as you stroll around a reef in your bathing suit. There is a handrail to keep you on track.



8 Snuba

A Snuba adventure is a good way to go underwater without the fuss of scuba-diving. Swim over the ocean floor with ease on this half-hour tour, wearing mask, fins, and an airhose attached to a central supply.

9 Parasailing

Get a bird's-eye view of the ocean below as you soar 600 ft (180 m) up in the air while tethered to a boat. You won't get wet, but if you want to dip your toes in the sea, the captain is usually willing to oblige.

10 Scuba, Snorkel, or Swim at Coki Beach

Sitting adjacent to Coral World, lovely Coki Beach (*above*) is the ideal place to spend time sunning after your Coral World visit. If you want to be more active, rent dive and snorkel gear from Coral World's dive shop.



Top 10 BVI National Parks & Scenic Spots

Except for downtown Road Town, unspoiled is an apt word to describe the British Virgin Islands. There are scenic spots galore, but some merit special mention because the BVI government has taken serious steps to make sure they stay in their pristine state despite an increasing number of visitors. These small, special parks are for travelers who like to get off the beaten path. Poke about the land parks or take a dive trip to the parks' showcase, the Wreck of the Rhone.

1 Sage Mountain National Park, Tortola

At 1,716 ft (515 m), Sage Mountain is the tallest in the Virgin Islands. Most of the park (*below*) sits above 1,000 ft (300 m), which allows rainforest species to grow. Hike the paths that crisscross its 92 acres.



2 J.R. O'Neal Botanic Gardens, Tortola

This small garden provides a shady respite from the rigors of touring Road Town. Formerly the island's agricultural experiment station, the park is home to over 62 species of palms as well as many other varieties of tropical plants. The grounds include a cactus garden.

3 Mount Healthy National Park, Tortola

Dating to 1798, this estate has an old stone windmill as its heart, the only one left in the BVI. Nearby are ruins of the overseers' quarters and boiling house, overlooking Tortola's north shore. Map H4





4 Callwood Rum Distillery, Tortola

Privately owned, this tiny distillery (*above*) dates to the 18th century. It is the only place in the BVI that still produces rum. Stop by for a tour and bring home a few bottles.

5 Long Bay, Beef Island

This lovely beach offers acres of solitude, particularly at its western end. Shell aficionados can while away a few hours scouring the beach. You'll see Little and Great Camanoe as well as Marina Cay and Scrub Island across the water. Map J4

6 Coppermine National Park, Virgin Gorda

Cornish miners worked the mines here in the mid-1800s, but there's evidence of earlier use by the Spanish. The ruins of a copper mine chimney stand by the shore (*below*) with a boiling house, cistern, and mine shaft nearby. Map L4



7 Spring Bay National Park, Virgin Gorda

A gorgeous strand of sand and calm coves make this the perfect place to stop for a swim. Snorkeling is excellent as well. The beach has a swing set and picnic tables. Map L4

9 The Baths National Park, Virgin Gorda

Boulders (*below*) as large as 40 ft (12 m) form caves that can be explored on foot and with snorkel. This is a busy area, a 10-minute hike down from the road. Map L4



8 Gorda Peak National Park, Virgin Gorda

The wooden tower on the 1,370-ft (410-m) Gorda Peak extends the views as far south as St. Croix, some 50 miles (80 km) away. The park has several species of flora and fauna, including the Virgin Islands gecko. Map L3



10 The Wreck of the Rhone National Park, off Salt Island

The mail ship *Rhone* went down in 1867 when a hurricane dashed it against the rocks off Salt Island. Any treasures have long since been looted, but swim through its hulk for a great show of marine life (*above*). Map J5



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10 Sailing in the British Virgin Islands

One of the world's premier sailing destinations, the BVI offers mariners the opportunity to drop anchor at pristine, deserted harbors as well as popular ones with a thriving bar and restaurant scene. The waters are warm, the seas usually on the calm side, the trade winds normally brisk, and the scenery gorgeous. Sail bare boats, which put you at the helm, or crewed ones, which come with a licensed captain and chef to conjure up gourmet meals in the boat's galley.



The Baths, Virgin Gorda

Major companies such as The Moorings and Sunsail, as well as smaller ones in Tortola, rent both bare and crewed sailboats. Look on the Internet for a suitable charter broker. Your local travel agent can also book these trips.

Charter brokers will match you with a like-minded captain and crew.

If you are chartering a bare boat, the charter company will provision your boat for a fee.

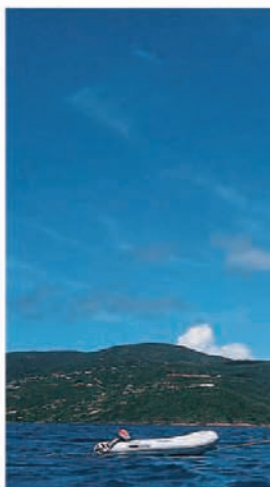
1 The Dogs

While sailing between North Sound, Virgin Gorda, and Jost Van Dyke, stop by the small island group known as the Dogs for a peaceful anchorage with good diving. The best anchorages are in the bays west of Kitchen Point on George Dog and on the south side of Great Dog. Map G3



2 Jost Van Dyke

Foxy's bar at this tiny island (above) is legendary, but there are many other similar spots at Great and Little Harbours and White Bay. You can clear BVI Customs at Great Harbour (see p91). Map G3



Sailing, North Sound

3 Marina Cay

Nestled in a sheltered, emerald-green lagoon and ringed by soft, white sand, Marina Cay (left) is home to Pusser's Restaurant (see p116), which attracts sailors as well as landlubbers who catch the ferry from Trellis Bay for salty camaraderie and good food. The island is fringed by coral; boats enter through the north side channel (see p90). Map J4





4 Sandy Cay

Make a day stop at this deserted island for great snorkeling and strolling on the white beach. Deep water almost to the shore allows boats to come in close. Summer anchoring is best since winter swells can make it a jolly stay (see p91). Map H3

5 Norman Island

Rumored to be a site of buried treasures, this island (above) features a popular anchorage known as the Bight, home to the floating William Thornton restaurant and the shoreside Pirates Bight. Enjoy good snorkeling here (see p90). Map H6

6 Cane Garden Bay, Tortola

One of the islands' hottest anchorages, Cane Garden Bay (below) has several popular bars and restaurants as well as the historic Callwood Rum Distillery (see p21). A great stop for stretching your sea legs along the long, sandy beach (see p82). Map G4



7 Salt Island

Use the moorings near the offshore wreck of the *Rhone* to explore the undersea wreck with mask and fins. Or go ashore at Salt Island's Lee Bay or Salt Pond Bay to visit ancient salt ponds still in use for harvesting salt (see p90). Map J5

8 Cooper Island

Drop anchor at Cooper Island's Manchioneel Bay, for lunch or dinner at the very casual Cooper Island Beach Club (see p113). The small resort has a dinghy dock to make access easy for sailors and a glorious beach ideal for sunbathing. Map K5

10 North Sound, Virgin Gorda

North Sound is home to a handful of resorts, all with bars and most catering to sailors. Distances between resorts are small, so it's easy to bar-hop in your dinghy. But designate a nondrinker to take the helm (see p89 & p91). Map M3

9 The Baths, Virgin Gorda

While the Baths (right) can get quite crowded with dinghies going back and forth to boats, it's worth a stop to snorkel among the huge boulders that form small grottos. Swells from the north may make overnight anchorages somewhat unpleasant during the winter months (see p89). Map L4





Top 10 Dive & Snorkel Trips

The Virgin Islands are a diver's dream come true. While snorkeling gives you a bird's-eye view of the vividly colored reefs below, diving lets you get close to the marine life on the reefs. Wave your finger near a sea anemone and watch it close, look a tarpon in the eye, or glide through a school of fry. Near-shore reefs allow for beach dives while many companies run boat trips for an off-shore experience. Some offer diving and snorkeling on the same trip, making a perfect combo for groups with divers and non-divers who want to snorkel.

Dive operators offer both one- and two-tank dives. Companies also rent all gear. While you'll need certification from PADI or NAUI to go on most dives, novices can take dive courses, called resort courses. Divers can take advanced courses that include rescue diving.

1 Buck Island Reef National Monument, St. Croix

Located about 5 miles (8 km) offshore from Christiansted, this marine garden is reached only by charter sail or power boat. While you can dive its colorful reefs, this site provides a perfect learn-to-snorkel experience. Charter boats also stop at Buck Island's sandy beach on the west end. Map E4



2 Frederiksted Pier, St. Croix

Marine life abounds, but seahorses are the main reason to dive this site. For safety's sake, take a trip with one of Frederiksted's dive operators. The dive master will help you find the seahorses. Map A5

3 The Wall, St. Croix

The coral- and sponge-covered Wall (left) runs along the island's north shore. It drops off from about 30 ft (9 m) to thousands, luring divers with varying degrees of ability. In some places, it runs so close to the shore that you can do a beach dive. Map B4





4 Carval Rock, off St. John

Located about 4 miles (6 km) north of St. John, Carval Rock (*left*) juts up into the ocean looking like an old-time ship called a carval. Fish swim among dramatic rock formations and bright coral reefs at depths of 20 to 80 ft (6–24 m). Map D1

5 Grass & Mingo Cays, off St. John

Part of a small chain of cays north of St. John, these tiny islands are surrounded by a kaleidoscopic marine life. Turtles visit often (*below*). Little or no current keeps visibility high. Map D2



6 Cow & Calf, off St. Thomas

Barely breaking the water off the southeast end of St. Thomas, these two rocks feature tunnels, archways, and overhangs, all at depths less than 40 ft (12 m). Multihued fish or the occasional nurse shark swim along with you as you navigate this dive site. Map C3

7 Wreck of the WIT Shoal II, off St. Thomas

Explore the interior of this 327-ft (98-m) World War II landing ship (*above*), sitting off St. Thomas's south side. The coral-encrusted wreck is home to shiny fish. Map A3



8 Wreck of the General Rogers, off St. Thomas

Located off St. Thomas's north coast, this 120-ft (36-m) wreck of a US Coast Guard boat houses a rich marine life, including tube sponges, hard and soft corals, and bristleworms. Look out for barracuda. Map C2

9 Wreck of the Rhone, off Salt Island

Sitting in two parts at 15 to 75 ft (4–22 m) deep after it sank in 1867, this wreck (*above*) attracts undersea explorers from both the USVI and BVI. A good diving and snorkeling site (*see p21 & p90*). Map J5

10 The Indians, BVI

Near Peter and Norman Islands, four jagged pinnacles, with a base sitting 50 ft (15 m) down, break the surface. Swim through canyons and grottos that contain brilliant corals, house varieties of fish, and are visited by hawksbill turtles. Map H6





Top 10 Beach Resorts

Placing glorious beaches right at your doorstep, the resorts strung out along the islands' shorelines run the gamut from exclusive luxury hotels to campgrounds where you can rough it out. Package deals abound in these places, many of which are family-oriented. Most have so many amenities that you need not leave the resort at all. Spend lazy hours sunning on soft white sands or enjoy the range of watersport activities as well as the fine or casual dining your hotel offers.

Beach resorts run from posh to casual, so pack accordingly. Some require a jacket for men after 6pm; at others you can get by with shorts and t-shirts no matter what the time of day.

When picking a resort, it really pays to do your homework. If you want lots of activities included in your room rate, look for that specific information. Most resorts include things such as snorkel gear, sailboat, and kayak use, but some charge a small fee.

1 The Buccaneer Hotel, St. Croix

The hillside rooms have better views, but the beachfront ones put you closer to the sand. With Christiansted close by, shopping excursions are easy as well (see p112).

2 Caneel Bay Resort, St. John

With seven great beaches – one for each day of the week, as the resort says – a stay at Caneel (left) provides superb vacationing. Most rooms are on the beach, with a few in the gardens. There are three fine restaurants (see p112).

3 Cinnamon Bay Campground, St. John

This beachfront campground in the Virgin Islands National Park has tents, cottages, and bare sites for campers who bring their own tents. Facilities are close to the accommodations. Apart from swimming, snorkeling, and other watersports, it offers hiking and a casual restaurant (see p115).



4 Bolongo Bay Beach Club, St. Thomas

The all-inclusive and semi-inclusive options at this casual beachfront resort (*left*) provide good value for families. All-inclusive plans include all meals and drinks. With semi-inclusive, you get an extensive continental breakfast. Both plans include a wide array of watersports. Rooms at this appealing resort range from motel-style to condominiums (*see p115*).

5 Mango Bay Resort, Virgin Gorda

With its white sandy beach, spacious villas and fantastic views, this resort offers everything you need to relax. The tropical-style villas are well equipped with all the amenities of home (*see p112*).



6 Fort Recovery Beachfront Villa and Suites Hotel, Tortola

Tucked between the road and the beach on Tortola's south shore, this small resort has an old stone fort as its centerpiece and lush foliage all around. En suite kitchens make this a good choice for independent travelers.

Three beaches, excellent snorkeling, tennis, and lovely views are on offer at this small resort. Rooms and villas climb the hills above the beach. Even the least expensive rooms have mini-kitchens, a plus for visitors who like to eat in some of the time (*see p117*).

7 Little Dix Bay, Virgin Gorda

A staff that attends to every detail ensures that a stay at Little Dix Bay provides the ultimate in tropical vacations. You'll find tennis, watersports, a fitness center, and nightly movies, but many guests spend their days in a chaise (*see p112*).



10 Peter Island Resort & Yacht Club

With five beaches on its own island, this resort (*left*) attracts guests who like privacy. Enjoy watersports or a massage during the day and fine dining every night in its sophisticated tropical ambience (*see p112*).

TOP 10 Big Splurge Restaurants

1 Kendrick's, St. Croix
Innovative cuisine is the hallmark of Kendrick's, a cozy bistro tucked into a downtown courtyard. The chef dresses up simple fare such as king crab cakes with a *habanero* tartar sauce and veal *scallopini* with a pepper zinfandel glaze (see p61).

2 Restaurant Bacchus, St. Croix
A sophisticated ambience, an excellent wine list, and an imaginative menu make for a tempting restaurant choice. Go for dishes such as baked chicken with crimini mushrooms or pork wrapped in bacon with rum sauce (see p61).

3 Asolare, St. John
The contemporary Asian-inspired cuisine focuses on seafood dishes such as tuna with coconut rice and apple salad. The food alone makes it a must-do, but go also for the feel of this old stone house overlooking Cruz Bay and the spectacular sunset views (see p69).

4 Zozo's Ristorante, St. John
With lovely contemporary Italian cuisine, Zozo's is the place to go for sunset views and mango martinis. Enjoy appetizers like the bruschetta of the day before launching into a main course of grilled pork chops with rosemary-roasted potatoes (see p69).

5 Hervé Restaurant, St. Thomas
Hervé conjures up fine French food with a Caribbean flair at this hillside restaurant in downtown Charlotte Amalie. Rabbit loin with tomato, rosemary, and white wine is excellent, but try the yellowtail snapper with Creole sauce or the Caribbean lobster with drawn butter for a bit of local flavor (see p79).

6 Virgilio's Restaurant, St. Thomas
Located in an old stone warehouse in Charlotte Amalie's shopping district, this is where the island's movers and shakers dine. Eavesdropping is a fine art here.

Pasta comes in many forms – the seafood and linguine is a sure bet. Or try the chicken served in lemon sauce (*see p79*).

7 Romano's Restaurant, St. Thomas

The neighborhood isn't much, but step inside Romano's for North Italian cuisine at its best. With white tablecloths and owner Tony Romano's artwork on the walls, the atmosphere is equally fabulous. The chicken breast with mushrooms, garlic, mozzarella, white wine, and tomato is divine (*see p79*).

8 Sugar Mill Restaurant, Tortola

Food writers Jeff and Jinx Morgan have created one of the island's most enchanting restaurants in an old sugar mill. The food matches the alfresco air, with Caribbean-inspired dishes predominating. The menu changes daily, but poached lobster and salad niçoise often appear (*see p85*).

9 Brandywine Bay, Tortola

Candlelit tables and an extensive view serve as the backdrop for Tuscan-style food. The chef uses plenty of fresh herbs and foods to create exquisite dishes. Try the local swordfish if you're in the mood for fish or the duck with a fresh berry sauce (*see p85*).

10 Little Dix Bay Pavilion, Virgin Gorda

A sophisticated menu that highlights fish, chicken, and veal accompanied by inspired side dishes and sauces attracts more than just hotel guests. Stunning ambience and attentive service. 📍 Map L4 • Little Dix Bay, outside Spanish Town • 284-495-5555 • www.littledixbay.com • \$\$\$\$

Crunchy on the outside and creamy on the inside, these spicy conch and batter morsels are deep fried. While they're traditionally served as first courses or snacks, light eaters can make a meal of them. Every cook prepares them differently, but the more conch the better.

2 Goatwater

You'll find this tasty goat stew on the menu at only the most local of West Indian restaurants in the islands. Cooked with the same type of goat you see wandering along the roadsides, its other ingredients include onions, garlic, tomatoes, and the cook's own special spices.

Conjured up in local kitchens, hot sauce adds extra bite to any dish. It's made of fresh hot peppers, onions, and whatever else strikes the cook's

fancy. Every one is different; try several of them. A bottle keeps forever in your refrigerator even though the color may change.

4 Kallaloo or Callaloo

The islands' famous spicy soup *kallaloo* has as many spellings as ingredients. With greens, usually spinach or whatever's available, as its base, the soup also includes a generous dose of okra, maybe ham or fish, and of course, whatever seasonings the cook likes to use.

5 Lobster

Caribbean lobsters lack the claws of their northern cousins, but they're still a sweet, succulent seafood, served in several ways

in the Virgin Islands. The simplest lobster dish, just drizzled with melted butter and served in the shell, may be the best, but many people prefer it stuffed with crabmeat.

Locating Local Food

Look for local cuisine at tiny, tucked-away West Indian restaurants. Events such as Carnival celebrations on all the islands are a good bet. At those festivals, you'll find dishes seldom featured on the menu no matter how local the restaurant. To find the best food, look for the longest line out front.



6 Maubi

A spicy drink, *maubi* is fermented from *maubi* bark with generous helpings of sugar, dried orange peel, cinnamon, and cloves added. It's an acquired taste, and folks either love it or hate it. *Maubi* is found on the menu only at local restaurants.

7 Patés

Not the creamy meat dish made of goose or duck found in fine restaurants, Caribbean patés are turnovers stuffed with a spicy lobster, conch, chicken, or beef filling, then deep fried. Not for the cholesterol-shy, these delicious treats make great quick lunches or snacks.

8 Ole Wife

Usually served boiled with onions and spices, ole wife is officially called triggerfish or moonfish. Most cooks just take a little of this and some of that to conjure up their version of this tasty catch of the day.

9 Johnnycake

Found on just about all West Indian menus, this staple is simply a deep-fried, flattened biscuit (dumpling). Johnnycakes are usually served hot, but residents take them cold in their lunches. If you happen on an event with food demonstrations, you may see cooks rolling them out in the kitchen.

10 Tarts

Tarts are the Virgin Islands' word for one-crust pies, often filled with coconut, guava, or other fruits. A word of caution: Caribbean cooks have a heavy hand with the sugar, so tarts are often sweeter than you expect.

Top 10 Rums

1 Appleton

The Jamaican company Appleton has several rums, including the premium 21-year-old Appleton Estate rum.

2 Don Q

One of Puerto Rico's gifts to the rum industry, Don Q manufactures many varieties – its Light is quite popular.

3 Cruzan

Light and Dark are staple Cruzan rums but this St. Croix-based company (see p57) also makes higher quality rums.

4 Callwood's Arundel

Found only in Tortola, this 80 proof spirit, brewed at a beachfront distillery (see p21), packs quite a punch.

5 Flavored Rums

With additives such as vanilla, coconut, pineapple, and many others, flavored rums make popular apéritifs.

6 Mount Gay

The Barbados-based Mount Gay has many varieties, but its Eclipse is most often found on island shelves.

7 Myer's

Of its numerous rum varieties, the Jamaican Myer's Dark is one of the most popular with rum connoisseurs.

8 Pusser's

Sold only at Pusser's stores in Tortola and Virgin Gorda, this rum gained its reputation in the British Navy.

9 Rhum Barbancourt

Made in Haiti, this premium rum comes in many varieties, which depend on the length of aging.

10 Ron del Barrilito

Limited in distribution, this Puerto Rican company makes rum eagerly sought by rum aficionados.

While you can spend hours at the gaming tables in the Divi, the only casino in the USVI, it is also one of the hottest nightspots around with live music almost every night. TOP 10 Things for Kids

1 Fort Christianvaern, St. Croix

With lots of space to roam, the centerpiece of Christiansted National Historic Site gives kids a glimpse into history and a place to expend some energy. The park rangers are quick to answer children's questions (*see p8 & p57*).

2 Day Sail to Buck Island Reef National Monument, St. Croix

A day sail is the perfect way to introduce children to sailing. Kids get to hoist sails and assist the captain at the wheel. Once at Buck Island, the crew will help them explore the reef with a snorkel, mask, and fins (*see p60*). ☎ Your hotel will recommend their favorite charter captain

3 Hike Cinnamon Bay Ruins Trail, St. John

This easy half-mile (1-km) loop trail across from Cinnamon Bay Campground on the North Shore

Road takes you through sugar factory ruins and past an old cemetery that dates to Danish times. Make stops at the numerous labeled examples of the island's vegetation to add to your child's botanical knowledge (*see p67*).

4 Snorkel Trunk Bay, St. John

With lifeguards on duty and underwater signs pointing out the features of its underwater trail, Trunk Bay provides easy snorkeling for novices. Kids with a bit more experience can snorkel off Trunk Cay. Rent snorkel gear near the snack stand, where you can get burgers if you haven't brought lunch (*see p11 & p63*).

5 Coral World, St. Thomas

Coral World provides the ideal introduction to the under-sea world that surrounds the Virgin Islands. With easy-to-understand exhibits, kid-friendly staff, and a nearby beach, this

marine park is a must-see for visitors to St. Thomas. It's a great place to spend the entire day (*see pp18–19*).

6 Fort Christian, St. Thomas

Kids can clang the jail cell doors, climb the stairs to the fort's ramparts, and play tag in the huge parade grounds. The small museum has some nifty artifacts for children keen on history. While the kids are letting off steam, adults can enjoy the rampart views (*see p16*).

7 St. Thomas Skyride, St. Thomas

A trip on the St. Thomas Skyride allows your children to enjoy a bird's-eye view of St. Thomas. When they get to the top, they can stroll around the nature trail and watch exotic birds perform (*see p76*).

8 Learn to Sail, All Islands

Several resorts in the USVI and BVI have children's learn to sail programs. The summer program at the Bitter

End Yacht Club in Virgin Gorda gets lots of accolades. Kids learn on small, easy-to-handle boats. They must be able to swim (*see p92*).

9 Learn to Dive, All Islands

Kids over 10 can experience the underwater world through a basic diving course or spend more time to receive their diving certification card. Instructors are child-friendly and understand their limitations. There's no better way to add that wow factor to a USVI or BVI vacation.

10 Look for Shells, All Islands

Kids as well as adults can spend delightful hours strolling along a stretch of beach, picking up shells and exploring the water's edge as they go. Rocky and reefy beaches are good bets because they get less traffic and the tide pools are home to an interesting array of creatures.

Queen Conch Shells

Hold a queen conch shell to your ear to hear the sound of the sea.

A bit romanticized, yes, but a good reason to scour USVI and BVI beaches for this prized shell.

Also called pink conch after its interior color, the queen conch shell is usually found at beaches that front on bays with lots of seagrass beds to serve as shelter. Get hold of a shell book to identify the variety of shells found on tropical beaches.

TOP 10 Drives & Views

1 North Shore of St. Croix
Windswept vistas greet drivers who make this out-of-the-way drive from Salt River to Davis Beach. Turn north off Route 75 onto Route 80, which runs along Salt River Bay and the North Shore. On clear days, you can see St. John to the north. The road twists and turns past old sugar mills and sprawling estates such as Rust Up Twist and La Vallee. 📍 *Map C4*

2 Judith's Fancy, St. Croix
Splendid views of Salt River and the sea, plus a stroll through plantation ruins dating to around 1750 (see p9), reward motorists who drive through this gated neighborhood of upscale homes. Just check in with the guard first. Follow Hamilton Avenue to the end for glimpses of Salt River Bay. Turn off onto Caribe Drive to see the ruins, which include those of a great house

and a tower. This is a small neighborhood, so don't worry about getting lost. 📍 *Map C4*

3 Ham's Bluff Road, St. Croix
Running north from just outside Frederiksted to the end of the paved road, this appealing drive (Route 63) takes you past gracious old homes and to the west, magnificent sea views. If you're up for a dirt-road drive, connect with Scenic Road (see p59) near the end of the drive. 📍 *Map A4*

4 North Shore of St. John
If you only do one thing on St. John, make it this drive from the outskirts of Cruz Bay to Annaberg along the North Shore Road (Route 20). Stunning vistas of white beaches and turquoise seas unfold at Caneel Bay, Trunk Bay, and Maho Bay overlooks. A part of the BVI chain of islands is visible to the north. 📍 *Map D2*

5 Bordeaux Overlook, St. John

Stop at this busy overlook for gorgeous views of the sea, Coral Bay, and in the distance, the BVI. There's a tiny gift shop where you can buy some interesting souvenirs to take home. A snack shop makes this a good break on your round-the-island tour (see p65).

6 Centerline Road Overlook toward Whistling Cay, St. John

As you head from Cruz Bay toward Coral Bay, take time to stop at this small overlook midway between Catherineburg Ruins (see p65) and Bordeaux Overlook. A National Park sign points out the features spread out before you. Map E2

7 Drake's Seat, St. Thomas

Stellar panoramic views of Magens Bay and the BVI highlight this overlook. According to legend, the 16th-century explorer Sir Francis Drake kept watch on his fleet from this spot.

A seat on the inland side of the overlook commemorates this event (see p74).

8 Ridge Route, St. Thomas

With a map in hand, drive this route for lovely sea views to the north and a glimpse of some of St. Thomas's luxurious homes. Start at Crown Mountain, following Route 40 east, through Estate Elizabeth and Wintberg to Route 42, ending at Tabor and Harmony. The route passes through small communities along the way. It's easy to get lost – just stop and ask directions if you do. Map B2

9 North Coast/Ridge Road, Tortola

Rural Tortola reveals itself as you make your way from Long Bay to Long Look along this road. Goats and cows wander at will as you pass villages such as Carrot Bay and Cane Garden Bay, historic ruins, and breathtaking sea views. Beachfront restaurants along the route make nice stops for lunch or drinks. Map G5

10 North Sound Road, Virgin Gorda

Take this route along Virgin Gorda's spine from Savannah Bay to North Sound for spectacular ocean and beach views. You can make a stop along the way for a swim or walk where you might just be the only visitor. There are no services until you reach North Sound. Map L3

1 **All mash up**
Broken. Your vehicle gets *all mash up* when you hit a wrong-side-of-the-road tourist who forgot to drive on the left.

2 **Bahn har**
Born here. Virgin Islanders, particularly those *bahn har*, put great stock in where they were born.

3 **Bush**
The woods or any place outside of developed areas. He *gone bush* means he has disappeared.

4 **Jeese and bread!**
A benign swear word or exclamation. *Jeese and bread*, it sure is hot today!

5 **For true?**
Really? This is a response to a questionable statement. It's gonna rain. *For true?*

6 **Gut**
A gully or ravine. In heavy rains, water from the hillsides rushes down *guts* to the sea.

7 **Limin'**
Hanging out. When you go out on Friday nights, you don't go anywhere special. You're going *limin'*.

8 **Meh son**
A generic phrase inserted in sentences. I had to walk miles, *meh son*, and it was very tough.

9 **Melee**
Gossip or rumor. The rumor mills run overtime in the islands, with residents taking to radio talk shows to air the latest *melee*.

10 **Walk with**
Take. Don't forget to *walk with* your passport or other identification when visiting the islands.

**TOP 10 Moments in History****1 Christopher Columbus Arrives in USVI & BVI**

Sailing through in 1493 on his second trip to the New World, Columbus stopped at Salt River, St. Croix, to skirmish with the Carib Indians. The many islands he saw prompted him to name the archipelago after St. Ursula and the 11,000 Virgins.

2 Slave Rebellion in 1733, St. John

In their first attempt to gain freedom, slaves used cane knives to attack the Danish garrison at Coral Bay. They subsequently held the island's planters hostage for six months, killing many of them. The siege ended with help from French soldiers based in Martinique.

3 Emancipation, BVI

After Great Britain set the stage by outlawing slavery in 1808 and then seized a number of slave-carrying ships in BVI waters, this British colony finally freed its slaves on August 1, 1834. The former slaves continued life as paid laborers.

4 Emancipation, USVI

Rioting slaves marched on Frederiksted, St. Croix, in 1848, forcing Danish Governor Peter Von Scholten to declare from the ramparts of Fort Frederik that "All unfree in the Danish West Indies are from today emancipated." His decree also included St. Thomas and St. John.

5 Earthquake

While the region witnesses frequent minor earthquakes, none were as disastrous as the one that hit in November 18, 1867. A huge tsunami emptied the harbor in Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas, leaving fish lying on the ocean floor. It then surged back, killing many people who had gone out to collect the fish.

6 Fireburn, St. Croix

Years of poor crops, hurricanes, and other calamities pushed agricultural laborers to the brink, leading to the October 1, 1878 Fireburn. Frederiksted and other parts of St. Croix went up in flames on the only day of the year laborers were allowed to sign new work contracts.



7 Transfer of Danish Colonies to US

After years of negotiations, Denmark sold St. Thomas, St. John, and St. Croix to the US for \$25 million. The Danish flag came down to make way for the Stars and Stripes on March 31, 1917.

8 Virgin Islands National Park Opens

Laurance Rockefeller bought up many acres of St. John land and donated them to the federal government in an act of foresight that has helped preserve St. John's natural environment. The park, and Rockefeller's posh Caneel Bay Resort (*see p112*), opened December 1, 1956.

9 Royalty Visits the BVI

Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip visited Tortola on February 23, 1966 and again on October 26, 1977, riding in a motorcade through the island's streets. The late Princess Margaret visited on March 8, 1972.

10 Disastrous Hurricanes Hit USVI & BVI

Both territories suffered massive devastation when Hurricane Hugo hit on September 17 and 18, 1989 and Marilyn on September 15 and 16, 1995. Other hurricanes in the late 1990s caused further damage, prompting strengthening of the infrastructure against future catastrophes.

Top 10 Virgin Islanders

1 Alexander Hamilton, St. Croix

Born in Nevis but raised in St. Croix, Hamilton became the first secretary of the US Treasury in 1789.

2 Bennie Benjamin, St. Croix

The St. Croix-born Benjamin co-authored the 1952 musical hit, "Wheel of Fortune."

3 Tim Duncan, St. Croix

Born April 25, 1976, the St. Croix native plays basketball for the San Antonio Spurs.

4 Peter Holmberg, St. Thomas

Silver medalist in sailing (Finn class) at the 1988 Olympics.

5 Emile Griffith, St. Thomas

This fighter born in 1938 holds professional boxing titles.

6 Elrod Hendricks, St. Thomas

Played baseball, mainly for the Baltimore Orioles (1968–79).

7 Camille Pissarro, St. Thomas

A major French Impressionist painter, Pissarro (1830–1903) was born in St. Thomas.

8 Richard Humphreys, Tortola

A Tortola-born Quaker, Richard Humphreys' 1837 bequest of \$10,000 funded the US's first black college, now Cheney University in Pennsylvania.

9 Samuel Hodge, Tortola

The first black man to receive Britain's Victoria Cross, this Tortola native fought in the 1866 Ashanti wars.

10 William Thornton, Jost Van Dyke

The Jost Van Dyke-born Thornton designed the US Capitol building in 1792–93.

TOP 10 Animals & Birds

1 Bananaquits
So small they would fit in your hand, these tiny yellow birds dart in for a quick taste of sugar or flower nectar. They're also known as sugar birds and yellow breasts. If you listen closely, you can hear them chirp.

2 Donkeys
Used as transportation until cars became commonplace in the 1950s, the ubiquitous donkeys now roam island by-ways. The largest population lives in St. John's Virgin Islands National Park and its environs. Their braying can keep you awake at night. Don't get up close and personal with them; they can deliver a mean kick.

3 Iguanas
Looking like prehistoric creatures, bright green baby iguanas and the darker adults thrive all over the US and British

Virgin Islands, but trees in dry areas see greater populations. They're somewhat elusive in most areas, and a sighting is a special event.

4 Goats
Eaten by residents in a variety of dishes, goats roam where they want in the St. John's Coral Bay area and throughout the BVI. Their eating habits cause extensive erosion problems and their droppings make paths slippery. They're also noisy creatures, particularly when a baby goes astray.

5 Herons
Several varieties of herons are found all over the Virgin Islands. Look for little blue herons, West Indian green herons, and rarely, great blue herons, near the shorelines. Their nests sit on shrubby trees and are made of sticks.

6 Hummingbirds

With wings flapping at phenomenal speeds, hummingbirds hover over flowers to dine on their nectar. Mostly green in color, they're easy to spot as they dart here and there. They're so well loved that residents make homes for them in feeders made of coconut shells.

7 Migrating Birds

The USVI and BVI sit in the flyway for migrating birds heading south for the winter from the US mainland. So many arrive that the Audubon Society and private groups conduct annual Christmas bird counts on several islands.

8 Mongoose

Originally imported to control rats, mongooses are now well settled in the islands. You'll see these long, brown, and furry animals scurrying across the road or poking around garbage cans. Mongoose Junction Shopping Center in St. John is so named because the creatures gathered at garbage cans located nearby.

9 Pearly-Eyed Thrashers

Called trushies by locals, these common brown birds will make moves on your picnic lunch if you're not careful. You'll hear them crawl-crawling all over the islands. They're particularly prevalent at beaches where people carelessly discard food.

10 Pelicans

With a big splash, these broad-billed brown sea birds dive under the water's edge for a fish dinner. Watch out if you're snorkeling over schools of small fish. They seldom crashland on snorkelers' heads, but when they hit the water, the noise can give you a good scare.

Top 10 Undersea Creatures

1 Blue Tang

Schools of this small, round, deep blue fish swim near reefs and rocks. Fun to watch while snorkeling.

2 Conch

This mollusk lives in seagrass beds. If you find an empty shell on the beach, hold it to your ear to hear the sea.

3 Dolphin

Dolphins usually live in deeper water, so look for them a bit offshore as they arc in and out.

4 Whales

If you're visiting in the spring, watch for whales cavorting offshore on your day sail or fishing trip.

5 Lobster

It takes good eyes to spot this crustacean poking its antennae out of its hidey hole on the reef.

6 Sea Cucumbers

Looking a lot like their namesake vegetable, sea cucumbers slink along the ocean floor as they feed.

7 Spiny Sea Urchins

Black with long, protruding spines, these undersea creatures live on the reef.

8 Starfish

Look along the ocean floor for yellow-gold starfish. They're not that common, so it's a real treat to find them.

9 Tarpon

Large, silvery tarpon swim near schools of baby fish, called fry. They're harmless, despite their size.

10 Barracuda

Teeth bared, this long, slim fish looks like it's waiting to attack, but it will ignore you if you don't bother it.

These plants, officially called epiphytes, drip from the crooks of trees all over the islands. The long, thin leaves sprout from a center that looks slightly like that of a pineapple. Air plants get their sustenance from decomposing leaf matter caught in their leaves and moisture from the air.

2 Allamanda

This lush green plant carries a yellow trumpet-shaped flower, leading to its other name, golden trumpet. The leaves are thick, smooth, and pointy and its milky sap is poisonous. Popular with landscapers and home gardeners, the plant usually grows in vines or hedges.

3 Anthurium

This unusual flower is one of the islands' loveliest. Its waxy, heart-shaped flower comes in shades of pink, white, or red. A tapered shoot protrudes from the center. While anthurium grow in the wild, you can buy them as cut flowers from stalls by the roadside.

4 Bougainvillea

In colors that range from basic magenta to every spectrum of the red, orange, and white family, this Caribbean staple decorates yards and gardens across

the islands. The plants can grow to an enormous size, but most serve as hedges.

5 Bird of Paradise

These exotic and flamboyant flowers look like bright red or orange birds sitting on deep green leaves. You'll find them mainly in well-tended gardens, but in some moist places, they grow in the wild.

6 Hibiscus

The workhorse of Caribbean gardens and roadsides, this shrub bears flowers in myriad hues. Red is the most common, but there are literally thousands of varieties with single, double, and even triple blooms. Picked blooms stay open all day.

7 Night-Blooming Cereus

When night falls during the summer months, the waxy white flowers of this cactus-like plant give off an exquisite sweet aroma. The large, showy flowers are simply lovely to watch as they open at dusk. After they close the next morning, the flowers develop into tasty fruits.

8 Oleander

Gardeners all over the islands usually prune the pink- or white-flowered oleander into rows as a hedge. The wood is

poisonous to animals so folks often plant them near more fragile plants to keep foraging goats and donkeys away.

9 Spider Lily

Most of the year, spider lilies look like rather pedestrian green-leafed plants growing along the roadside, but summer sees them burst into bloom all over the islands with a shower of white flowers. If you are very patient, you can watch them open at dusk. The lilies last only a few days before drying up.

10 Ixora

With large, rounded scarlet blooms made up of individual flowers and set on green leaves, ixora looks somewhat like a geranium. This year-round bloomer is popular with home gardeners and landscapers who use it as a hedge.

Top 10 Trees

1 Bay Rum Tree

Fragrant bay rum trees grow in woody areas. The leaves are often used to make aftershave.

2 Broom Palm

The only indigenous palm, this short tree has thin fronds that form a larger circular leaf.

3 Calabash

Artisans use the gourd-like fruit to make bowls and musical instruments. It grows quite tall in forested areas.

4 Flamboyant

Come summer, bright red and orange flamboyants bloom all over the islands. You may also see a gold variety.

5 Ginger Thomas

This tree grows in such profusion on hillsides and roadways that its yellow blossom serves as the USVI territorial flower.

6 Lime Tree

Bearing yellow-green fruits used in everything from ice tea to tarts, lime trees grow wild and in gardens.

7 Mahogany

Stretching skyward, stately mahogany trees grow mostly in parks. Craftspeople use its wood to make furniture.

8 Manchineel

Watch out for this tree found near beaches. It bears poisonous red fruits and the sap is extremely toxic.

9 Palms

From tall coconut-bearing trees to shorter feathery varieties, palm trees are found all over the USVI and BVI.

10 Turpentine Tree

Residents call them tourist trees because their bark is red and peels. These tall trees grow all over the islands.

St. Croix

AN ISLAND OF CONTRASTS, *St. Croix* combines a rural feel with excellent dining choices, great golf courses, and airport access. Beachfront resorts of all sizes, a handful of small hotels tucked away in the island's two towns, numerous condominium complexes on the beach and up in the hills, old sugar plantation ruins, and an oil refinery all share its 58 sq miles (150 sq km) of rolling hills and undulating coastline. Its size makes it large enough for some interesting drives, but small enough to find the perfect patch of island sun. In short, *St. Croix* combines the best of the other USVI islands sitting 40 miles (64 km) to the north, with a pace not as slow as *St. John's* but with less bustle than *St. Thomas*.

Christiansted

1 Christiansted
History and commerce come together in this charming town. Historic Fort Christianvaern casts its shadow over Christiansted National Historic Site, but the past permeates the entire town (see p8). Stroll by pastel buildings dating from the 18th and 19th centuries, then segue off to a delightful lunch at a fine or casual restaurant. 2 Point Udall

Hovenssa

Unlike St. John and St. Thomas, St. Croix does not rely solely on tourism for its economy. The huge Hovenssa refinery directly employs more than 1,000 people. Its contract work force adds hundreds more, making it the largest employer in the USVI. Built in 1966, the refinery is off Melvin Evans Highway (Route 66).

Isaac Bays starts off from near the parking lot. The bays' inaccessibility makes them safe for hikers who worry about undesirable elements lurking at the next bend in the trail.

3 Sunny Isle
With a shopping center that's home to a Kmart department store, grocery stores, movie theaters, and fast food places, Sunny Isle and its environs are the heart of the island's economy. Go there for a gander at island life. 4 Cruzan Rum Distillery
A stop at the Cruzan Rum Distillery gives you a glimpse into the island's rum-based history as well as the present. The distillery, now owned by a liquor conglomerate and using modern methods, still has enough old buildings to make it a worthwhile visit. Your tour through the rum-making process ends with a free rum tasting; you can also shop for rum (see p35), rum cakes, and t-shirts at its store. 📍 Map B5 • West Airport Rd, Estate Diamond • 340-692-2280 • Adm



5 St. George Village Botanical Garden

Built on the ruins of a 19th-century plantation, this lovely 16-acre spot features more than 1,500 native and exotic species of plants, including 60 stunning orchid species. Even if you're not into botany, the plants are beautiful to look at and the location tranquil. Those keen on history will enjoy exploring the workers' village, factory, and other buildings standing since sugarcane grew in the surrounding fields.

6 Whim Plantation Museum

The showpiece of the island's plantation history, Whim Plantation Museum (*see p9*) typifies plantations established by the Danish West Indian Company in the 1730s. Planters first grew cotton, but records show that by 1754 sugar was the main crop, a status it enjoyed until the 1920s. Refurbished by the St. Croix Landmarks Society, the plantation has an oval great house full of antiques. The outbuildings

Slavery & its Legacy

Much of St. Croix's history, like that of other Caribbean Islands, is based on slavery. Captured in Africa, the slaves were transported across the Atlantic to work on St. Croix's 100 or so plantations. While this profane practice ended when slaves rioted to gain their freedom on July 3, 1848, the windmills built during this era still dot the island's countryside.

7 Frederiksted

St. Croix's second town, Frederiksted (*see p9*) is more like a sleepy village that seems to come alive only when a rare cruise ship pulls up to the pier. That makes its waterfront Strand Street and the few other streets ideal for strolling. The huge Fort Frederik is a good place to start. It has a few exhibits and the usual guns, but it is also home to an exhibit

on the 1848 emancipation. The park out front is a good spot for a break. 📍 *Map A5 • Fort open 8:30am–4:30pm Mon–Fri*

8 Carl & Marie Lawaetz Museum

Take a trip back in time to the Lawaetz family estate (*see p9*) in Little LaGrange, managed by the St. Croix Landmarks Society with Lawaetz family members often serving as tour guides. Carl Lawaetz, originally from Denmark, bought the property in 1896 after serving six years as its overseer. Marie arrived from Denmark in 1902 after Carl courted her long distance. Their gardens and furnishings, now

antiques, remain to remind visitors of another era. 🗺 *Map B5*

9 Scenic Road
 Leading uphill along the island's ridge, Scenic Road (Route 78) runs east–west from Route 80 near Salt River to Ham's Bluff Road outside Frederiksted. It intersects paved roads several times, so you don't have to make the entire 8-or-so-mile (13 km) of this mostly dirt road. Rent a vehicle with four-wheel drive and high clearance to navigate Scenic Road. You'll find no development along this route, just forest flora and fauna with an occasional fine view. The solitude is stunning.

10 Salt River Bay National Historic Park & Ecological Preserve
 Almost undeveloped, this 948-acre seaside park is where Christopher Columbus sent a party ashore to look for fresh water on his second trip through the New World in 1493 (*see p48*). A skirmish with the Carib Indians resulted, with Columbus's men getting the worst of it. A small hill on the eastern side of the parking area is what remains of an old Dutch earth fort. For more historical information, follow the signs to the Visitor's Center.

An Easy Day

Morning

🕒 Get up early to watch the sun rise at **Point Udall**, at the island's easternmost tip. Sunrise varies by season, so check with your hotel's front desk to find out what time to depart. After snapping a few photos of the sun peeking over the horizon, head west to the **Buccaneer Hotel's** (*see p112*) attractive dining room for its scrumptious breakfast served buffet style and the fabulous sea views.

The point of a St. Croix vacation is not to shop till you drop or tour till you're bored, but rather to see the sights at a slow pace and spend some time in a chaise. So after breakfast, head back to your hotel for a few hours at the beach. Don't forget the sunscreen. When the sun gets high in the sky, head off to Christiansted for lunch at **Café Christine** (*see p61*), where you can sit in blissful shade at the alfresco porch tables.

Afternoon

🛍 Walk off your lunch with a stroll around **Christiansted**, stopping at its small shops and taking in the town's historic ambience. A halt at **Christiansted National Historic Site** (*see p8*) will help you understand the island's history.

Pause for a few moments at one of the benches strategically placed along the waterfront boardwalk to enjoy the sea view.

Wrap up your afternoon with a sunset sail from the Christiansted waterfront, or simply return to your hotel for a nap.

St. John

THE TURQUOISE WATERS, verdant hills, and white sandy beaches of Virgin Islands National Park lure nearly one million people a year to St. John. Some spend their entire holiday at this tranquil island while others are day-trippers who come here to get away from the bustle of St. Thomas. But it's not only about peace and quiet – the small but busy towns of Cruz Bay and Coral Bay offer several good restaurants and shops. The island boasts two posh hotels and numerous condominiums, as well as two campgrounds, but many visitors opt for a more independent route and rent one of the 350 or so villas that dot the island. If you prefer a laid-back pace and don't mind that the infrastructure doesn't always work perfectly, this is the island for you.

1 Cruz Bay

The busy ferry port at Cruz Bay is most visitors' first impression of the town and the island. But don't let the cacophony of ferry noise and taxi drivers put you off. Outside the dock, the noise abates and the town unfolds. Small, with narrow streets carrying no discernible names, Cruz Bay offers visitors the Virgin Islands National Park Visitor's Center (see p10), restaurants, and shopping, but also serves as the heart of island life for St. John residents (see pp12–13).

2 Hawksnest Beach

A local favorite, Hawksnest Beach is a sandy stretch shaded by round-leaved seagrapes and towering palm trees. Keep a watch for falling coconuts. Part of the Virgin Islands National Park, the quiet beach has modest bathrooms and changing facilities, as well as shaded picnic pavilions. The snorkeling over the near-shore reefs is enjoyable, but experienced snorkelers may want to explore the rocks and pocket beach on the eastern shore. 📍 Map D2

3 Jumbie Beach

Another local favorite, this small, sandy beach calls for a hike down a flight of stairs. That's the easy part – you'll also have to huff and puff back up. Some trees offer shade for folk who want to go easy on their tan, and there's great snorkeling

at the reef sitting just offshore. However, the water at this beach can get rough when winter swells roll in from the north. 📍 Map D2 • Park across North Shore Rd (Rte 20)

4 Trunk Bay Beach

Hordes of cruise ship passengers and day-trippers vie for a patch on this long, white sand beach. Palms and seagrapes provide shade, and two lifeguards ensure safety. The beach has cool showers, flush toilets, covered pavilions, a snack bar, and snorkel rentals. Its underwater snorkel trail provides an easy introduction to snorkeling and the marine world, but there is more sea life around the small island, Trunk Cay, that sits in the middle of the bay. 📍 Map E2 • Adm charged from 8am to 4pm

Virgin Islands National Park

Occupying a full two-thirds of the island, Virgin Islands National Park is the engine that fuels St. John. The park opened in 1956 thanks to philanthropist Laurance Rockefeller who, along with conservationist Frank Stick, had begun buying up St. John land in the 1950s. Today, the pristine and varied landscape and its historic monuments attract plenty of visitors (see pp10–11).

5 Cinnamon Bay Beach

Home to the Virgin Islands National Park campground, this beach sees lots of visitors and tour groups. But, because of its length, the groups are less of a problem here than at other beaches. For solitude, head to the far ends or come early or late. The snorkeling is particularly good at the far eastern end and around Cinnamon Cay. There are showers, flush toilets, a convenience store, and a restaurant. 🗺 Map E2

6 Maho Bay Beach

While the beach at nearby Maho Bay Camps is also called Maho Bay, this stretch of greenery-fringed white sand sits adjacent to the road. There are no services, and consequently less people, which is why locals

and boaters who moor offshore, as well as independent visitors, prefer it. The snorkeling along the beach is barely mediocre, so head to the rocks along the north edge to see colorful fish. You might see a turtle or two swim across your path. 🗺 Map E2

7 Annaberg Plantation

A windmill towers over the 18th-century Annaberg Plantation, casting its long shadow on the jail cell, the old kitchen, sugar factory, the remains of the slave quarters, a garden, and other reminders of the days when slaves fueled St. John's agrarian economy. Although it can get crowded at times, most days you will find plenty of solitude and space to enjoy the plantation's fabulous view across the sea to nearby Tortola. In summer, red flamboyant trees add splashes of color to the landscape.

8 Coral Bay

The restaurants and shops in and around Coral Bay may seem like just a stop on your round-the-island tour, but if you look a little closer you will discover a real sense of community. Indeed, the Guy Benjamin School bears the name of a retired educator who lives just down the road. The boat yard may seem a tad on the ramshackle side,

but it's the center of life for the dozens of folks who live aboard their boats in Coral Bay harbor.

9 Bordeaux Overlook
From this popular overlook (see p41), you can admire Coral Bay below, and to the east the glorious turquoise sea, Norman Island, Peter Island, and the other islands along the BVI chain to Virgin Gorda. The area also has a few gift shops. A tour bus favorite, the Bordeaux Overlook can get quite busy with taxis and motorists trying to avoid pedestrians. Watch out for traffic at this curve in the road. 📍 *Map E2 • Centerline Rd (Rte 10)*

10 Catherineberg Ruins
Off the beaten path, but easy to get to, Estate Catherineberg served as headquarters for the Amina warriors during the 1733 slave uprising. The windmill and other ruins of this 1718 site are St. John's best-preserved examples of the period. To find it, turn off Centerline Road mid-island at a large Virgin Islands National Park sign. The sign is easiest to see if you're driving from Cruz Bay to Coral Bay. 📍 *Map E2 • Centerline Rd (Rte 10)*

Exploring St. John

Mid-Morning

While the air's still cool, spend an hour or two poking around snug **Cruz Bay's** few sights and numerous shops. You can pick up a bathing suit at **Bougainvillea** (see p68).

Take time to sit awhile on **Cruz Bay Park's** benches. The shady park with its flower-fringed walkways serves as the town's crossroads (see p13).

After shopping and people-watching take a break for lunch at the popular **Lime Inn** (see p69).

Afternoon

Gorgeous white sandy beaches fringe the coast. Pick the one that most appeals to you. If you'd like some quiet, **Maho Bay Beach** may be your best option. Just park along the road and stretch out on the beach for an hour or two in the sun or, more wisely, in the shade of the seagrape trees.

After a swim and a snorkel, make the brief drive along the North Shore Road to the **Annaberg Plantation** cut-off. A visit to the sugar plantation ruins will take about 20 minutes, unless you spend time absorbing the spectacular view of the sea and nearby Tortola or walking along the shore.

Late Afternoon

Continue along North Shore Road until you meet Centerline Road. Make a quick trip to **Coral Bay** for late afternoon drinks and a chance to mingle with the local folks at **Skinny Legs Bar & Restaurant** (see p69) before heading back to Cruz Bay.

Rent sailboards at breezy Cinnamon Bay Beach (see p64) for an exhilarating trip around the bay. The staff give lessons for novices or for those who want to improve their skills.

10 Short Hikes

1 Caneel Hill Trail
This 2-mile (3-km) trail leaves from near Mongoose Junction Shopping Center (see p68) in Cruz Bay, goes past a scenic overlook, and connects with the North Shore Road near Caneel Bay Resort (see p112).

2 Peace Hill
An enchanting spot with fine views in three directions reached by a short walk uphill, this is just right for a picnic. ☎ *North Shore Rd*

3 Cinnamon Bay Long Trail
Running downhill from Centerline Road to North Shore Road near Cinnamon Bay Campground (see p115), this 1.1-mile (1.7-km) trail offers superb views.

4 Cinnamon Bay Ruins Trail
Signs describing the flora, fauna, and historical features mark this half-mile (1-km) loop trail. It starts and ends at the sugar factory ruins near Cinnamon Bay Campground. ☎ *North Shore Rd*

5 Francis Bay Trail
With mangroves and salt ponds along the way, the half-mile (1-km) long Francis Bay Trail is a bird-watcher's favorite. ☎ *Off North Shore Rd*

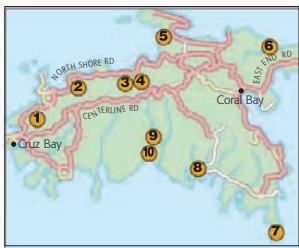
6 Brown Bay Trail
Hike about a mile (1.6 km) from Waterlemon Bay along the Johnny Horn Trail to reach the Brown Bay Trail, which leads to the bay and its remote snorkeling.

7 Ram Head Trail
Walk 1 mile (1.6 km) uphill from Salt Pond Bay across a rocky beach and hills of cacti to a spectacular view. A local favorite on full-moon nights. ☎ *Rte 107*

8 Lameshur
This area has three trails. The short Yawzi Point Trail leads from the beach to a promontory. The Lameshur and Bordeaux trails start just past the beach at the road's end; the first is 1 mile (1.6 km) to Reef Bay and the second runs about a mile uphill to Bordeaux Road. ☎ *Off Rte 107*

9 Reef Bay Trail
While you can trek the 2.2 miles (3.5 km) from Centerline Road to the ruins at the Reef Bay Plantation by yourself, a Virgin Islands National Park trip provides a boat ride back to Cruz Bay (see also p11). ☎ 340-776-6201

10 Petroglyphs
A short trail heads off the Reef Bay Trail to pools rimmed with petroglyphs, possibly inscribed by Taino Indians.

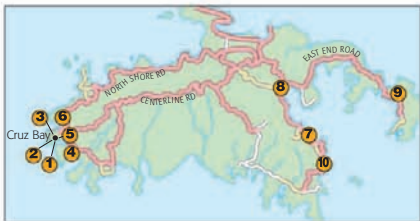

St. Thomas

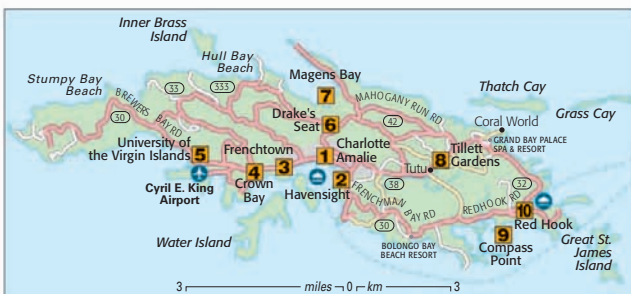
WITH LUSH HILLSIDES, white beaches, and boat-filled harbors, St. Thomas packs a lot into its 28 sq miles (72 sq km). Visitors can opt to stay at a casual, in-town guesthouse, a home-like condominium, or a posh beachfront resort. Restaurants run from bare bones to many stars. Fine beaches, excellent duty-free shopping, the exciting Coral World marine park (see pp18–19), and plenty of watersports beckon travelers. There is easy transportation to Virgin Islands National Park in St. John, nearby Tortola in the BVI, and, a bit farther afield, St. Croix. This pint-sized patch in the Caribbean can be most things to many people – spend one day at the beach, the next touring historic sites, the day after on a day sail, scuba dive, or sightseeing on a sister island. Or you may choose to do nothing at all.

Magens Bay Beach



1 Charlotte Amalie

This bustling town hides its history behind the doors of busy shops, but savvy strollers stop for a look at the buildings' interesting architecture and old stone walls. The town area is anchored by the huge red Fort Christian on the east and, to the west, the covered market where planters once bought slaves, now used as a produce and crafts market. To the south sits a lively harbor, and, to the north, hillside streets filled with colonial homes and other historic buildings (*see pp16–17*).

2 Havensight

Home to the island's largest cruise ship pier, the thriving Havensight area has a major shopping mall as its heart (*see p14*). Catering mainly to cruise ship passengers, the mall also attracts shoppers who don't want to head to the downtown Charlotte Amalie shopping area. Tourist shops selling jewelry, electronics, and gift items sit alongside a bank, the island's only real bookstore, and a handful of restaurants. More shops, a grocery store, and several restaurants line Havensight Road.

Cruise Capital

St. Thomas may just be the cruise ship capital of the Caribbean. On busy winter days, as many as eight or occasionally more cruise ships visit Charlotte Amalie. Most go to Havensight dock, while a few tie up at Crown Bay. Thousands of passengers go shopping, enjoy watersports, take tours, and just about stretch the island's tourism infrastructure to the limit.

3 Frenchtown

Located on the peninsula to the west of Charlotte Amalie, Frenchtown was settled several centuries ago by a tiny community of people from the French island of St. Barthélemy. Most Frenchtown residents earn their living from the sea. They sell their fish along the harbor front or to any of the many eateries that make Frenchtown so popular. Some of the island's best restaurants are found in this small, relatively quiet neighborhood, so it's worth your while to stroll the narrow lanes looking for an appealing dinner or lunch spot. If you're in Frenchtown around July 14, attend the Bastille Day celebrations – these are held every year at the ballfield. ☎ Map B2

4 Crown Bay

Only a few cruise ships tie up at the Crown Bay dock; most go to Havensight. Facilities are minimal around the pier, so you'll have to walk a few blocks to the Crown Bay Marina and shopping complex to find restaurants and a gourmet grocery. A few more restaurants and a couple of shops flank the busy road that runs from the pier to the Crown Bay Marina. If you are there in winter, visit the marina for a gander at the multimillion-dollar yachts that stop by St. Thomas.

5 University of the Virgin Islands

This seaside university offers associate, bachelor's, and graduate degrees to students from all over the Caribbean on a prestigious campus that served the US military during World War II. The school held its first classes in 1963 as a junior college. Attend performances that range from ballet to reggae at the school's Reichhold Center for the Arts (*see p45*), see games at the UVI Sports and Fitness Complex, take a swim at the white, sandy Brewers Bay Beach, or just stroll the spacious grounds. 📍 *Map B2* • *Brewers Bay Rd (Rte 30)* • www.uvi.edu

6 Drake's Seat

Legend has it that the 16th-century explorer Sir Francis Drake kept tabs on his troops

from this spot (*see p41*). Today, it's often busy with taxi drivers stopping to let passengers enjoy the stupendous view of Magens Bay, St. John, and the entire BVI chain to the east. A small parking lot sits on the north side of the narrow road, with the seat – not the original – just across the road. There can be a lot of traffic, so be careful crossing the street.

7 Magens Bay Beach

The most beautiful beach in St. Thomas, the long and spacious Magens Bay Beach is usually full of people. It's the number one spot visitors want to see. The beach has a restaurant, watersports rentals, a nature trail, bathrooms, showers, and on weekends, crowds of locals who come to party to amplified music. While all this activity may not be your cup of tea, if you find yourself there, just head to the far ends of the beach for some quiet. 📍 *Map B2* • *Rte 35*

8 Tillett Gardens/Tutu

An oasis of quiet in the busiest area in St. Thomas, Tillett Gardens is a courtyard filled with a handful of arty shops definitely worth a look. Back into the traffic and congestion that hallmarks the rest of the area, there are several large shopping malls with grocery stores, one of the island's two Kmart department stores (*see p14*), and other



chain shops. This area is also the heart of fast food eating in St. Thomas. The enclosed Tutu Park Mall has a small food court and public bathrooms. 📍 *Map C2*

9 Compass Point
The village of Compass Point is home to a small collection of shops and restaurants, which serve the dozens of old salts who live aboard or keep their boats at the marina as well as any visitors who happen to wander by. Park your car in the lot to the left as you reach the area. Rent watersports equipment down on the dock or people-watch as you enjoy your lunch at the snack wagon or dinner at one of the restaurants. 📍 *Map C2* • *Off Red Hook Rd (Rte 32)*

10 Red Hook
Busy Red Hook serves as the jumping-off spot for trips to St. John. The ferry dock hums with activity until midnight, when the ferries stop running. The strip of highway that runs through its several blocks is flanked with stores selling just about anything you'd need on an island vacation. You'll find a grocery store, a pharmacy, a gas station, a place to get your photos developed, a handful of restaurants ranging from take-out Chinese to seafood, and a gift shop or two. 📍 *Map C2* • *Red Hook Rd (Rte 32)*

A Leisurely Drive

Mid-Morning

🕒 Located at the eastern end, **Red Hook** makes the perfect starting point for your island tour. Pick your stops so you'll have time and energy to enjoy the island's main attraction – the beach. Follow Red Hook Road, perhaps pausing for a stroll around **Compass Point**, before heading to the busy **Tillett Gardens/Tutu** area. To watch artisans at work, pull into Tillett Gardens. Or stop at Tutu Park Mall for anything you need.

🛍 Shop for take-home gifts at the malls at **Haven-sight**, or wait until you reach **Charlotte Amalie**.

🍴 Once there, spend a little time poking around the shops housed in old warehouses and the historic sites before breaking for Caribbean-inspired French fare at **Hervé Restaurant** (see p79), located a flight of stairs uphill on Government Hill.

Afternoon

Keep along Veterans Drive, making side trips at **Frenchtown** for the seafaring ambience and at **Crown Bay** for the megayachts. Veterans Drive turns into Brewers Bay Road and takes you past the **University of the Virgin Islands** campus. Continue along the island's spine till you see the splendid views at **Drake's Seat**.

Late Afternoon

End your day with a swim at **Magens Bay Beach**. The crowds are gone, the beach is quiet unless it's the weekend, and the residents come out to enjoy the serenity.

Major hotels, beaches, and marinas have dive centers. You can also take a boat trip to scuba-dive around the reefs and wrecks that sit off St. Thomas (*see p25*).

8 Snorkeling

There's nothing simpler than snorkeling. Put on a mask, snorkel, and fins, plop into the water, and away you go over reefs and fish.

9 Tennis

Tortola

THE ISLAND OF TORTOLA BLENDS BUSTLE *with bucolic*. Its main town, Road Town, is the center of an off-shore banking industry, a port for cruise ships plying the Caribbean, and the jumping-off spot for trips to other BVI islands. It can get busy when office workers and tourists fill its lanes and shopping centers. However, the peace of rural Tortola is just moments away. The stunning palm-fringed beaches are rarely crowded, and only a couple of cars can be spotted moving along the narrow roads that crisscross the island's green hills. Enjoy the intimacy of its small hotels and the thrill of the vast array of watersports on offer. Indeed, the entire BVI is a major sailing capital of the world and many week-long charters depart from Tortola's many marinas.

Road Town



1 Road Town

The heart of the island's commerce and tourism industry, harborfront Road Town buzzes with cruise ship tourists and office workers crowding its streets for lunch or to shop. Its narrow Main Street is lined with small old wooden and stone buildings. Road Town spills out to the east with Wickhams Cay I, home to a couple of hotels, and numerous shops, restaurants, and offices, just a short walk from Main Street. Charter yachts pick up or drop off passengers here and at Wickhams Cay II, a mile (1.6 km) away along Waterfront Drive. 📍 *Map H4*

4 West End

This area gets busy when the ferries from St. Thomas, St. John, and Jost Van Dyke arrive. If you're arriving from outside the BVI, you'll clear BVI Customs and Immigration here. The area around the ferry dock has a couple of basic restaurants and

convenience stores. Soper's Hole marina with restaurants and shops sits within walking distance across the harbor. There are small hotels near the ferry dock and the marina. 📍 *Map G5 • Waterfront Dr*

2 Fort Burt

Now hidden behind a hotel façade, Fort Burt was built in the 17th century by the Dutch to protect Road Town. In 1776, the English rebuilt the fort and named it after William Burt, who then served as governor for the chain of Caribbean Islands known as the Leeward. In 1953, the fort was turned into a hotel. It's worth wandering in to see the thick walls and ramparts, stopping for a drink at the hotel bar. Parking is difficult – it's easiest to leave your car at the bottom of the hill and walk up.

3 Nanny Cay

While all things nautical are the focus at Nanny Cay and its marina, it also makes a pleasant stop for folks taking in the sights. It has a few restaurants and interesting shops. Wander the adjacent boat yard to watch boat owners and crews at work maintaining their spiffy yachts. To try out the lifestyle, book a charter

5 Smuggler's Cove

Put your Jeep in four-wheel drive for a ride down a rutted dirt road to this gorgeous beach. Just keep going past Long Bay Beach Resort (see p117) on the North Coast Road. Taxi drivers will drop you off with a promise to pick you up at the appointed hour. While it's a bit of an adventure getting there, the pristine beach and great snorkeling await you. Bring a picnic lunch. 📍 *Map G5 • Off North Coast Rd*

6 Apple Bay The waves sometimes roll at Apple Bay, particularly during the winter season, making this one of the better surfing spots in the Virgin Islands. When it's calm, the water is fine for swimming. Nearly a mile (1.6 km) in length with white sand as well as some rocks, Apple Bay Beach never gets crowded, so pull over and pick your spot. There are a couple of small but distinctive lodging and restaurant options located at either end of the beach, with the absolutely outrageous Bomba Shack bar (see p37) near the western end.

Brits Rule – Maybe

A good-sized British expatriate population calls Tortola home, lured by the tropical climate and the British flag flying overhead. While the schools and courts use the British system and you can buy British biscuits in the supermarkets, the influence stops there. The island has a decidedly American feel and American dollars are the legal tender, both thanks to the nearby US Virgin Islands.

7 Cane Garden Bay The North Coast Road runs right through Cane Garden Bay, a small community that's home to a handful of guesthouses, and a few casual West Indian restaurants that can really get hopping when music plays. Make a stop at the venerable Callwood Rum Distillery (see p21), where the Callwood family has brewed rum for decades. Boaters like to anchor offshore for a stretch on the long sandy beach and, of course, to enjoy the restaurants and nightlife together with hotel guests. 📍 Map G4 • North Coast Rd

8 Brewers Bay Make sure your brakes work before you drive way downhill to Brewers Bay. Both Brewers Bay East and Brewers Bay West Roads, leading to the bay, are super steep. The beach itself is a long stretch of sand with calm water that sees few people other than those visiting Brewers Bay Campground. This collection of tents and shelters nestles at the water's edge. The campground's small restaurant serves modest meals; but it's best to bring lunch and snacks because the



eatery keeps irregular hours. Excellent swimming and snorkeling are enough reasons to make the trip. 📍 *Map H4 • Brewers Bay W Rd*

9 Lambert Beach
Sometimes called Elizabeth Beach, this is a fine strand of palm- and seagrape-fringed sand where you may see a nesting leatherback turtle crawl up during the spring and early summer months. Take Ridge Road to Lambert Road, then turn left at the sign for Lambert Estates through an area of scattered upscale homes and a small resort. Stop for lunch at the alfresco Turtle Restaurant, located at Lambert Beach Resort. 📍 *Map J4 • Lambert Rd*

10 Beef Island
This small island is home to the BVI's largest airport, officially called Terrance B. Lettsome International Airport (see p96) after a former member of the BVI Legislative Council. Pay your 50-cent toll to cross the Beef Island Bridge by putting the money in a cup extended by the toll collector. Beef Island's long, lovely beach draws numerous swimmers and shellers. Its Trellis Bay is also the jumping off point for ferry trips to smaller islands, and has a small collection of shops and restaurants. 📍 *Map J4*

A Walk in Road Town

Mid-Morning

🕒 Center your stroll on Road Town, leaving busy places such as Wickhams Cay I to the office workers and frenetic shoppers. Start at the Post Office, where philatelists can buy the island's spectacular stamps. Meander up narrow Main Street, poking in and out of small shops selling essentials as well as knick-knacks. Main Street just about ends at **Sunny Caribbee** (see p43), where you can browse for Caribbean spices and jams and enjoy the colorful artwork at its sister gallery.

🛒 Cross the Waterfront Highway for a stroll through **Crafts Alive**, one of the best spots to shop for locally made crafts (see p43). The artisans are often on hand to discuss their wares.

Stop by the waterfront ferry terminal to watch islanders coming and going. Boats leave for the USVI and outer BVIs throughout the day, so you'll get an eye-opening view into island life as you watch folks lug groceries, huge boxes, and all manner of things onto the ferries. The air-conditioned waiting room provides a chilly respite if the warm weather has you dripping. Pick up a copy of the tourist publication, *The BVI Welcome* (see p100), for a good read while you rest.

🍷 Having no doubt worked up an appetite, amble along Waterfront Drive for cold drinks and delicious Italian fare at **Capriccio di Mare** (see p85), a hot spot for locals on their lunch break.

1 Day Sails

Crewed boats leave from Road Town, Nanny Cay, and Soper's Hole for an offshore cay, Jost Van Dyke, the Baths on Virgin Gorda, or Anegada.

2 Fishing

Fish in the North Drop and other locations. For bonefishing, Caribbean Fly Fishing is the best.

Boards can be rented to surf the island's North Shore when winter swells come in. Apple Bay is one of the better surfing spots on the Virgin Islands, and also has a beautiful beach to relax on. ☎ *Map J4* • *Hi Ho; Trellis Bay; 284-494-7694*

5 Kayaking

Many resorts offer complimentary kayak use for a paddle around their bay. Otherwise, you can rent them at Nanny Cay, Trellis Bay, or Cane Garden Bay for a paddling and snorkeling excursion.

6 Scuba

Many week-long or more sailing charters specialize in scuba-diving the wrecks that sit offshore. Or sign on with any of the marina-based dive operators for a day trip.

7 Snorkeling

If you don't have your own gear, you can easily rent mask, snorkel, and fins from watersports centers all over the island. Look for dark patches near the shore that indicate rocks, reefs, or seagrass beds.

8 Swimming

Enjoy great swimming off the

BVI – dive in from your charter boat or do laps off the beach for some easy and efficient exercise, or just float in the waters and enjoy the landscape.

9 Tennis

Long Bay Beach Resort (see p117), and Prospect Reef Resort (see p116) let non-guests play their courts for a fee. Play free at Moorings-Mariner Inn (see p116) if the court is not in use.

10 Windsurfing

Brisk trade winds, particularly at Trellis Bay, lure windsurfers to Tortola. Rent boards at Trellis Bay and Nanny Cay. You can also take lessons. ☎ *Map J4, H5*

Virgin Gorda & the Outer Islands

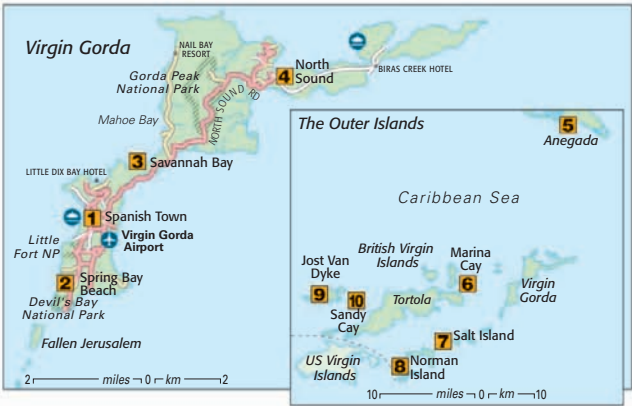
THICKLY FORESTED VIRGIN GORDA punctuates the string of volcanic islands that make up the USVI and BVI. Named the “Fat Virgin” by Christopher Columbus, the 8.5-sq mile (22-sq km) island with 3,000 inhabitants is the most populous of the 60 or so outer islands. Anegada sits 15 miles (24 km) to its east, a flat atoll fringed by a spectacular reef and home to only 173 hearty souls. Jost Van Dyke, to the west of Tortola, has 200 folks on its 3 sq miles (8 sq km). Many other islands are occupied by exclusive hotels and private homes. The rest are unpopulated, waiting for sailors to drop anchor at their harbors. Except for Virgin Gorda, access is difficult. But if you want some peace on a truly tropical idyll, it’s well worth the effort.

1 Spanish Town, Virgin Gorda

The heart of Virgin Gorda's commerce and transportation, Spanish Town is squeezed between the Atlantic and the Caribbean Sea. Most of its shops and restaurants are housed at Virgin Gorda Yacht Harbor. Lively Lee Road bisects the west side of town, with the tiny strip of an airport on the east. The ferry dock sits a short walk from Yacht Harbor. Residents often refer to Spanish Town as The Valley, but that is in fact the name of the island's southern part. 🗺 Map L4

2 Spring Bay Beach, Virgin Gorda

Very close to the busy Baths National Park (see p21), the white, sandy Spring Bay Beach provides a peaceful respite worth the five-minute walk from the road. Pretty natural pools created by huge boulders provide perfect swimming and snorkeling. Swings and picnic tables on a grassy lawn get you

out of the sand. You'll find a few restaurants at the nearby Baths and along the 10-minute drive to Spanish Town. 🗺 Map L4

3 Savannah Bay, Virgin Gorda

Breathtaking is the best word to use when describing this lengthy stretch of luscious white sand. The hillside overlook, just as you start down toward the beach entrance, provides terrific photo opportunities for shutterbugs. Pack a picnic lunch and bring plenty of water and sunscreen, as there are no facilities. While it's easy to reach and just a short drive from Spanish Town, the beach sees few visitors.

4 North Sound, Virgin Gorda

A handful of small resorts fringe North Sound's shoreline. Most are reached only by complimentary boat service from Gun Creek or in the case of Biras Creek Resort, from Beef Island (see p83). The majority welcome day visitors to their restaurants and shops. Protected North Sound serves as one of the BVI's hottest sailing destinations. Sailors on week-long charters out of Tortola and the USVI drop anchor here and head for the easy camaraderie of the bars. 🗺 Map M3

Island-Hopping the Local Way

To the uninitiated, inter-island ferry travel in the BVI's outer islands (see p96) can be very confusing.

There are usually no signs or ticket booths and crews are often reluctant to part with information. Ask people waiting for the ferries for directions. You'll see all manner of objects on board – refrigerators may sit cheek-by-jowl with a big dog on his way home from the veterinarian.

5 Anegada Beaches

Spectacular white sand beaches, providing superb sunning and snorkeling, rim this 15-sq mile (39-sq km) atoll. The reef fringing the island keeps the waters calm and the fish plentiful. Some beaches have fanciful names such as Cow Wreck, so named because a ship full of bones destined to become buttons washed up on the reef. Casual restaurants serving seafood and more sit along the sands, well back from the water.

6 Marina Cay

This island served as the setting for *Two on the Isle*, a 1960s movie starring Sidney Poitier and John Cassavetes, which was based on a 1930s book by Robb White. The

8-acre Marina Cay is now home to a Pusser's Hotel and Restaurant (see p116). Take the complimentary ferry from Trellis Bay, Tortola, and spend a day visiting the bar and the beaches, snorkeling, or taking a stroll around the island. The home White built has been restored as a reading room and book exchange. 📍 Map J4

7 Salt Island

Islanders still harvest salt from the three natural ponds that dot this tiny cay. You're welcome to come ashore to inspect the salt ponds, stroll the beach, and enjoy the solitude. A popular dive site, the Wreck of the Rhone National Park sits just offshore. The *Rhone*, a 310-ft (94-m) royal mail ship, split in two when it hit Salt Island during an 1867 hurricane. The captain and most of the crew perished. 📍 Map J5

8 Norman Island

A mostly unpopulated island, Norman Island was reputedly the setting for Robert Louis Stevenson's book *Treasure Island*. The island's main harbor, the Bight, draws sailors to its Pirates Bight, a bar and restaurant located on the beach, and the floating William Thornton bar and restaurant. Around the Bight

sits a series of caves that make for great snorkeling. The anchorage can get busy with dinghies going to and fro, so be careful while in the water. 🗺 Map H6

9 Jost Van Dyke Home to a handful of hoppin' bars, some guesthouses, and a few small stores sitting along its sandy lanes, Great Harbour is the island's main settlement. If you're sailing and haven't cleared Immigration in Tortola, visit the BVI Customs and Immigration office on the waterfront. If you want a change of scene, take a stroll west to White Bay, the next bay over and home to Sandcastle hotel and restaurant (see p114). Head off to the east to Little Harbour, which offers more bars and restaurants. 🗺 Map G3

10 Sandy Cay An unpopulated speck off Jost Van Dyke perfect for those who love solitude, Sandy Cay is ringed with a desert-island style beach. With no protected harbor, it is best used during the winter season as a day sailboat anchorage or stopping spot for power boats. When calmer summer weather arrives, it makes a fine overnight halt. Swim in limpid water, sun on the gorgeous white beach, and stroll through the greenery that covers the interior of the island. 🗺 Map H3

Late Afternoon

🕒 Since you'll want your stomach well-lined before starting a busy night, head for the Bitter End Yacht Club's **Clubhouse Steak & Seafood Grille** (see p93) for sundowners and then dinner. To get there, park your car at Gun Creek, located at the end of a steep downhill road in North Sound, and take the complimentary ferry.

Evening

Drop in for after-dinner drinks and dancing at **Saba Rock Resort** (see p116), just a 200-yard (180-m) boat trip away from Bitter End Yacht Club. Call them at 284-495-7711 or VHF 16 for a ride.

Get back to Bitter End Yacht Club, to wind down at **The English Pub**. This bar stays open till very late, but remember that the last ferry to Gun Creek departs at 10pm.

Later

📺 If you have any energy left, stop by **The Restaurant at Leverick Bay** (see p93), located a short drive shore-side in North Sound, for a nightcap or cup of coffee.

Make sure someone in your group abstains from drinking throughout. On your drive back to the hotel, the twisting roads can be treacherous with a few drinks down the hatch.

Saba Rock Resort often closes in September and other places may have shorter hours during the summer and fall. Always do a last-minute check of opening and closing hours.

For a great day out, head to the bonefishing grounds. Ask for a guide at your hotel.

5 Flamingo Watching, Anegada
The island's salt ponds are the only places in the USVI and BVI

where pink flamingos roost. Look, but do not disturb. ☎ Map K1

6 Hiking
For great views from the top of Virgin Gorda's Gorda Peak, take the 15-minute hike off North Sound Road. Many outer islands have trails leading to their peaks.

7 Kayaking
Most hotels in Virgin Gorda and the outer islands provide free kayaks. If not, rent one at Virgin Gorda's Leverick Bay Watersports (see No. 1 for details).

8 Scuba
Hotels arrange scuba trips for their guests if they don't provide this activity at their watersports center. Otherwise, sign up for a trip with Dive BVI at Leverick Bay or Virgin Gorda Yacht Harbor. ☎ Map M3, L4 • Dive BVI • 284-495-5513 • www.divebvi.com

9 Snorkeling
With pristine waters and deserted beaches, this region provides some of the world's best snorkeling. At Flash of Beauty in Loblolly Bay, Anegada, dive down to explore caves. ☎ Map M1

10 Swimming
You'll be continually tempted to dunk in the crystal clear sea that surrounds Virgin Gorda and the outer islands. Savannah Bay and the Baths (see p23) in Virgin Gorda especially provide fantastic swimming.

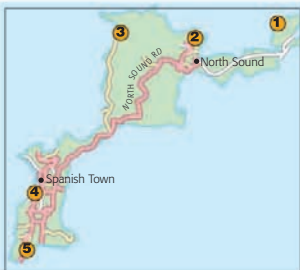

TOP 10 Arriving in the Virgin Islands

1 Getting There

Major airlines fly direct to St. Thomas and St. Croix from airports on the US mainland. Or you can fly into these islands, and also Virgin Gorda and Tortola, from the US, Europe, or South America via San Juan, Puerto Rico. Anegada can be reached from St. Thomas or Tortola. There are no flights to St. John; it is reached via ferry from St. Thomas.

2 Airfares

Airfares vary widely, depending on season and sales. Double check with the airline, Internet suppliers, and your travel agent to find the best price. Some wholesalers offer great airfare and hotel packages.

3 Henry E. Rohlsen Airport, St. Croix

An international airport near the western end of St. Croix near Frederiksted, this has a casual restaurant, a few shops, and rental car agencies. Flights arrive here from the US mainland and other Caribbean Islands.

4 Cyril E. King Airport, St. Thomas

Several hotels sit near this international airport, which is a 10-minute ride from Charlotte Amalie and about a half-hour ride away from Red Hook. It has a small restaurant, a gift shop, and rental car agencies.

5 Terrence B. Lettsome International Airport, Beef Island, Tortola

The airport handles only smaller planes arriving from San Juan, St. Thomas, and other Caribbean Islands. If you are stranded here, you can browse the few small shops or take the free ferry to Pusser's Restaurant on nearby Marina Cay (see p90).

6 Airports in Virgin Gorda & Anegada

With its Band Aid-sized runway, Virgin Gorda's airport is on the ramshackle side, but that is part of the charm of arriving here. Procedures are casual, too. A shack at the edge of the tiny runway, Anegada's Auguste George International Airport is served only by charter flights.

7 Seaplane

Island-hopping is fairly easy with Seaborne Airlines' flights between in-town waterfront locations in Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas, and Christiansted and Frederiksted, St. Croix. Midday rates are lower.

8 USVI to Tortola Ferries

Ferries connect Charlotte Amalie and Red Hook on St. Thomas with West End and Road Town on Tortola. From Cruz Bay, St. John, you can catch a ferry to West End.

9 Ferries to Virgin Gorda & the Outer Islands

Ferry connections (on the unreliable side) link Charlotte Amalie, Road Town, and Cruz Bay to Virgin Gorda, and to Jost Van Dyke from West End and Cruz Bay. Hotels on the outer islands and in remote locations run their own ferries from Tortola (see also p90).

10 St. Thomas to St. John Ferries

Ferries shunt between Red Hook, St. Thomas, and Cruz Bay, St. John, on the hour. There are also round trips to Cruz Bay from Charlotte Amalie several times a day.

TOP 10 Getting Around

1 Taxis

Taxi drivers in both the USVI and BVI are of two types – helpful or shockingly rude. Taxis are plentiful at airports, docks, and hotels on the more populated islands. If you plan to go off the beaten path, ask your hotel or villa manager to line up a taxi. It is pointless to argue about overcharging – chalk it up to the cost of vacationing.

2 Car Rentals

A few brand names such as Hertz and Avis operate in St. Thomas, St. Croix, Tortola, and Virgin Gorda, but most car rentals are local companies. Ask your hotel for recommendations. It is best to reserve before you travel. Rates are high.

3 Types of Vehicles

Get a vehicle with four-wheel drive and high clearance to drive on the dirt roads. Visitors to more populated islands should ensure their vehicles have a hard top and locks to prevent theft.

4 Motorscooters

Motorscooter rentals seem to come and go, particularly on St. John, but in general they are a bad idea. Traffic moves at a good clip and sudden rain showers make for slippery roads, both creating conditions that can lead to accidents. Do not be tempted by a price lower than a rental car.

5 Rules of the Road

Drivers in both the USVI and BVI drive on the left side of the road in left-hand drive vehicles. On all islands, drivers are prone to stop for a chat with someone walking along the road, causing dangerous traffic conditions as impatient motorists try to pass on a curve. Use caution.

6 Road Conditions

Roads range from a major highway in St. Croix to sandy tracks in Anegada, with every permutation in between. The roads on the mountainous islands twist and turn. On the more populated islands, the main roads and many secondary roads are paved, but you will find dirt roads everywhere.

7 Driver's Licenses

While your current driver's license will do to rent and drive a vehicle in the USVI, the BVI requires that all visiting drivers also purchase a temporary BVI license, available at all car rental agencies – you must present your regular driver's license for this.

8 Buses

The USVI has VITRAN buses, though the service is unreliable in St. Croix and St. Thomas. For patient folks, they're a good way to sightsee at minimal cost. BVI has no public bus service.

9 Hitchhiking

Hitchhiking is an accepted way to get around in the USVI and BVI, but think twice about it in St. Thomas and St. Croix. It is a bit safer on other islands, but use caution. Stick out your forefinger to indicate you want a ride, pointing in the direction you wish to go.

10 Addresses

Addresses in both the USVI and BVI are horribly confusing. In Charlotte Amalie and Christiansted, the buildings have numbers that often do not make sense. Out in the country, it is even worse. Make sure you have a map and written directions.

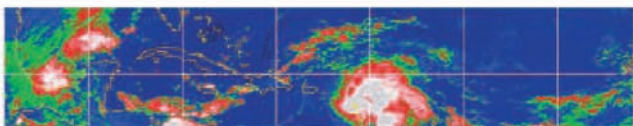

TOP 10 General Information

1 When to Go

The islands are a year-round destination, though more visitors come in winter than in summer. Daytime temperatures run in the low to mid-80s (27°C) in winter, with the summer months about 10 degrees (12°C) higher. It can rain at any time of the year.

2 Hurricane Season

Although hurricane season officially runs June 1 to November 30, it starts to ramp up in mid-August, reaching its peak in mid-September. The weather can be quite hot at that time. Hotel rates are temptingly low during this season, but you may have to cut your vacation short if a hurricane threatens.

3 USVI: Passports & Visas

Travel requirements are subject to change, and US citizens should check which documents they need ahead of traveling abroad. As of June 2009, everyone entering the US (including returning US citizens) is required to carry a passport. Citizens of some countries such as the UK need a passport but no visa for up to three months. They must also register with the Electronic System for Travel Authorization (ESTA) prior to departure; this can be done online at <https://esta.cbp.dhs.gov> or at a travel agent's.

4 BVI: Passports & Visas

Everyone visiting the British Virgin Islands needs a passport to enter. BVI residents with "belonger status" get preferential treatment at immigration. Stays of over a month require a visa. Visitors from some countries need a visa for entry.

5 USVI: Customs & Immigration

You do not have to clear Customs and Immigration on flights into the USVI from the US mainland and Puerto Rico, but you will when departing. Passengers arriving from Caribbean countries, including the BVI, must clear in. Fruit may be confiscated when arriving from Caribbean countries or when departing for the US.

6 BVI: Customs & Immigration

All arriving airline and ferry passengers except for those coming from other islands in the BVI must clear in. You may be questioned at Customs about objects such as cameras and computers.

7 Language

Most USVI and BVI residents born in the Caribbean speak standard English, as well as their native English Creole. It can sometimes be difficult to understand their accent, but don't be shy about asking them to repeat what they have

said. Keep in mind that they may have trouble understanding you too.

8 Time Zone

The USVI and BVI are on Atlantic Standard Time (GMT-4). In winter, this puts them an hour ahead of Eastern Standard Time, but when the US goes on Daylight Saving Time, the USVI and BVI do not change. This means that in summer, island time is the same as on the US East Coast.

9 Departure Tax

There is no departure tax from the USVI, but the BVI charges \$20 per person for airline passengers, \$5 per person for boat passengers, and \$7 per person for cruise ship passengers. This fee is often included in your fare when traveling on a cruise or with a group.

10 Etiquette

Some restaurants have no smoking sections. The legal age for drinking is 18 in the USVI and 16 in the BVI. Enforcement varies, but if you look younger than those ages, be prepared to show identification.

Top 10 Facts & Figures

1 Population

The USVI officially has 108,612 inhabitants, with 53,234 on St. Croix, 51,181 on St. Thomas, and 4,197 on St. John. The total count of people in the BVI is 28,213, with 83% on Tortola, 14% on Virgin Gorda, and 1% each on Jost Van Dyke and Anegada. The rest of the people are scattered about on small cays and boats.

2 Racial Distribution

The majority of USVI and BVI residents are black descendents of slaves brought over from West Africa. Only in St. John does the number of white residents approach that of black. The Hispanic population is fairly large in St. Croix, and is growing on other islands through immigration.

3 Political Status

The USVI is an Unincorporated Territory of the US. Its residents are US citizens, but cannot vote in presidential elections. The BVI is a Crown Colony of the UK. Its residents are British citizens, but may only vote locally.

4 USVI Congressional Representation

USVI voters elect a delegate to the US House of Representatives. She has no vote on the floor, but does vote in

committees and lobbies for federal funding for the territory. She has offices in Washington, St. Croix, St. John, and St. Thomas. The USVI is considered one district. It has no representative in the US Senate.

5 Island Top Officials

Every four years, USVI voters elect a governor and lieutenant governor. They also elect a 15-member one-house Legislature every two years. In the BVI, voters elect a 13-member unicameral Legislative Council every four years. The Queen appoints the BVI governor, who in turn appoints the chief minister from among the members of the Legislative Council.

6 Local Government

In the USVI, the governor appoints his cabinet members, who head different departments. Several semi-autonomous agencies oversee power and water generation, the ports and airports, and the university. In the BVI, members of the Legislative Council appointed to the cabinet by the governor oversee the various departments.

7 Churches & Synagogues

There are churches at nearly every bend in the road in the VI. Many are mainline denominations

such as Anglican, Catholic, and Moravian, but there are an increasing number of evangelical churches with no denominational affiliation. St. Thomas has a synagogue (*see p17*). Visitors are welcome at religious services, but wear your Sunday finery.

8 BVI Economy

While tourism is a mainstay and the most visible part of the islands' economy, the BVI's huge offshore banking industry is equally important. A total of 61,716 companies are registered in the BVI, but most of them merely funnel their paperwork through small Tortola-based companies set up to deal with multitudes of companies.

9 USVI Economy

Tourism is the heart of the USVI economy, although St. Croix does have the huge Hovensa oil refinery that employs more workers than any other private company. The island also has a few watch factories and a rum factory.

10 Tourism

More tourists visit both the USVI and BVI in winter. However, both can be visited year-round. The USVI sees 2.6 million visitors a year, with 2.4 million of them visiting St. Thomas/St. John. In the BVI, the vast majority of the 934,168 tourists visit Tortola.

TOP 10 Sources of Information

1 USVI Tourist Board

The government has offices in large cities across the US and in Canada, England, and Denmark. Call up or check the official website for access to information.

2 BVI Tourist Board

The BVI Tourist Board has a few offices scattered across Europe and the US, but the fastest way to get information is to call up the info line or access the Board's comprehensive website, which features some useful articles under BVI Islands Magazine.

3 Caribbean Vacation Planner

Check out this slick book of the Caribbean Tourism Organization. Its website is very useful; it provides an excellent overview of the Caribbean chain and specifics on each island as well as the latest on deals and events.

4 Travel Talk On-line

Visit this website to ask questions and find out what other folks have to say about your intended holiday destination. Easy to use, the website has useful information and a pleasant tone.

5 St. Croix This Week

This free publication with its familiar pink cover is chock full of information and advertisements

about St. Croix. You can find it at the airport, hotels, tourism offices, and other places. Subscriptions are available.

6 St. John Guidebook

With cartoons as well as the requisite advertisements, this small booklet provides a humorous insight into St. John life. Pick up a free copy at the Cruz Bay ferry dock or the tourism office, or order by mail. The online version isn't nearly as funny.

7 St. Thomas/St. John This Week

The granddaddy of all USVI and BVI tourism magazines, this free magazine with its well-known yellow cover is filled with information and advertisements about St. Thomas and St. John. Get a copy at the airport and numerous locations in the islands. You can also subscribe.

8 The BVI Welcome

This classy free publication, available at various locations, comes out every other month. In addition to the usual advertisements, it has articles on current events. The magazine's website is also very helpful. Subscriptions to the US are \$25 a year.

9 Bookstores

Find books about the USVI and BVI at gift

shops and bookstores in St. Thomas and St. Croix.

10 The Weather Channel

Cable television channels in the USVI and BVI carry this useful station with its frequent updates on local weather. Its Tropical Weather update at 10 minutes to the hour during the hurricane season is especially helpful.

TOP 10 Banking & Communications

1 Money

Both the USVI and BVI use US currency. US dollars were introduced in the BVI in the mid-20th century, when BVIers went to nearby USVI to work. This led them to abandon the barter system previously in use. The US dollar became legal tender in the BVI in 1959.

2 Changing Money

Changing foreign currency is difficult. Only Scotia Bank branches in St. Croix, St. John, St. Thomas, and Tortola will exchange small amounts of some currencies. You must show identification. It is easier to change money into US dollars before you leave home or in major airports.

3 Credit Cards & Traveler's Checks

Most shops, restaurants, car rental companies, attractions, and hotels take credit cards, but in the outer BVIs you may find an occasional one that doesn't. Traveler's checks are usually accepted, but small businesses may not be able to make change for large denominations.

4 ATMs

ATMs accept cards from most systems, but there is usually a charge. Find ATMs at banks and supermarkets in St. Croix, St. John, St. Thomas, and Tortola. Outer BVI islands do not have banks.

5 Post Offices

Except for the tiniest islands in the BVI, all USVI and BVI islands have post offices. Outer island hotels often have boxes at the front desk to drop off your postcards home. Do not expect speedy delivery.

6 Cell Phones

Some systems work, some don't. Your chances are better in the USVI if you have a US company such as AT&T. In the BVI, you may get lucky if you phone from high elevations or along the coast. Visitors can buy AT&T and Sprint cell phones in the USVI, and Cable and Wireless cell phones in the BVI, though local cell phones are not likely to work any better.

7 Pay Phones

There are pay phones on most islands. Most phones charge 25 cents, but some privately owned phones are 35 cents. A phone card, available at pharmacies, department stores, and gift shops, is your best bet for making long distance calls. BVI phones only use phone cards bought in the BVI.

8 Internet

Internet access is available in unlikely places like restaurants, bars and business offices. Many larger hotels provide complimentary Internet service at their business center. Check with your

Internet Service Provider if they have a number to use in the islands. Otherwise, you will be faced with expensive international phone rates.

9 Newspapers

The *Daily News* and *St. Croix Avis* in St. Croix and St. Thomas cover international events as well as USVI news. St. John has two papers, the *St. John Times* and *Tradewinds*, both carrying local news. In the BVI, read local news in the *Beacon*, *Island Sun*, and the *BVI Standpoint*.

10 Television/Radio

While most hotels in the USVI and Tortola have at least a basic cable television service, those in Virgin Gorda and the outer islands may not. Hotels without television service may provide a DVD player to watch movies. Car radio stations play everything from reggae to classical.

TOP 10 Surviving the Tropics

1 Sunburn

Slather on sunscreen to prevent sunburn. The tropical sun burns brightest between 10am and 2pm, so try and keep in the shade during those hours. Wear a hat, lightweight long-sleeved shirts, and long pants, and remember to keep your feet covered.

2 Bugs

Bugs are a fact of life in the tropics. While larger hotels annihilate bug populations with chemical sprays, you will not find that so everywhere. After a few days of rain, the mosquitoes come out. A nifty device, called a mosquito whacker, found at hardware stores and supermarkets, is quite handy.

3 Rain

Brief showers occur quite often, but occasionally you can get deluges that last for days. While this can put a damper on your vacation, it helps keep the island green. Carry an umbrella and bring some good books to while away the rainy hours.

4 Hospitals

Roy L. Schneider Hospital in St. Thomas and Juan F. Luis Hospital in St. Croix are the best equipped and can handle everything from heart attacks to broken legs. Tortola has Peebles Hospital. St. John, Virgin

Gorda, Jost Van Dyke, and Anegada all have small clinics, but serious cases go by air or ferry to the hospitals.

5 Doctors

You will find qualified doctors in both the USVI and BVI, but it is a matter of luck. Ask at your hotel for their recommendations. Some hotels have affiliations with doctors they trust.

6 Hyperbaric Chamber

Roy L. Schneider Hospital in St. Thomas has the only hyperbaric, or decompression, chamber in the USVI and BVI. The chamber helps divers who have got the bends to decompress. A spell in the chamber takes the excess nitrogen out of the diver's blood. Without the chamber, the bends can be painful, and sometimes fatal.

7 Pharmacies

Find full service pharmacies in St. Croix, St. John, St. Thomas, Tortola, and Virgin Gorda. While pharmacists will usually fill prescriptions issued outside the islands or will contact your doctor if necessary, your best bet is to come with a large enough supply to last throughout your stay. Prices at island pharmacies are usually higher than you will find in other locations.

8 Dentists

Good dental care is available in the USVI and Tortola, but ask your hotel to recommend one. Dentists are usually willing to fit in emergency cases. If you are used to having the dentist bill your insurance company for dental procedures, you may have to pay upfront and submit a claim to the insurance company.

9 Electricity

Outlets in both the USVI and BVI produce 110 volts. However, power surges and outages are common even in well-developed areas. Use a surge protector for your computer. Larger hotels have generators that flip on automatically during outages, but at smaller properties you will have to light candles. Bring a flashlight. When the power goes out, the toilet does not flush.

10 Water

Large hotels have reverse osmosis plants to desalinate sea water. The water is tested regularly to ensure its quality. Smaller hotels depend on cisterns to collect rainwater. The water may, or may not, go through a filtration system. If you are unsure, drink bottled water. Water may be in short supply, so you may be asked to limit your water usage.

TOP 10 Safety Tips

1 Avoid Unsafe Areas

St. Croix and St. Thomas have some areas that are decidedly unsafe for visitors even during daylight hours. Nighttime can also be problematic at some locations on the larger islands. Your hotel can advise you in both cases.

2 Use Hotel Room Safes

Larger hotels have room safes. Use them to protect your valuables while you are out of the room. It is worth the slight charge. Do not stash your wallet under the mattress or carry everything with you.

3 Don't Carry Drugs

It is illegal to possess or use non-prescription drugs such as marijuana, heroin, and cocaine in the USVI and BVI. Tourists are rarely approached to buy drugs, but it does happen. While enforcement is lax and penalties for simple possession small, getting caught could ruin your vacation.

4 Avoid Assault

Vacationers are seldom robbery, assault, or murder victims, but it can occur. If you are accosted, hand over your wallet or jewelry before the criminal is tempted to use his gun. Call the police immediately. If you are a single woman, do not leave bars or parties with men you have just met.

5 Carry Minimal Cash

With few exceptions, credit cards are accepted all over the USVI and BVI. You will find automatic teller machines, called cash machines, at banks and in some stores. Traveler's checks are also accepted at many businesses. Therefore, keep cash in your pocket to a minimum so you will not tempt thieves.

6 Don't Leave Valuables on the Beach

It is easy for thieves to snatch your valuables while you are in the water or asleep. Leave your expensive camera locked in your hotel room safe. If you must carry it around, lock it in your vehicle trunk before you park at the beach.

7 Use Waterproof Containers

Buy a handy cylindrical container on a string to stash your cash, jewelry, and other small valuables while swimming. The container hangs around your neck for wearing in the water. Dive and gift shops carry these objects in the section with beach accessories.

8 Don't Leave Valuables in Sight in Your Vehicle

Thieves have tools to quickly open your vehicle. Even if you are only gone for a minute, you could

return to find your stuff gone. Lock items in the trunk before entering the parking area. Thieves commonly watch parking lots at popular spots to look for ripe pickings.

9 Take Care on Deserted Beaches

Think twice before pulling over at that lovely deserted beach for a bit of solitude. On smaller islands, you will be fine, but in places such as St. Croix and St. Thomas, you may be asking for trouble. Check with your hotel on beach safety.

10 Be Careful on Back Roads

In general, getting off the beaten path is perfectly safe as long as you use common sense. If an area looks unsavory, keep driving. Do not linger if a suspicious looking character approaches your car. Make sure your vehicle has enough gas when you start your exploring so you will not be stranded.

TOP 10 Getting Married

1 Getting Married in the USVI

Apply for a marriage license at the Territorial Courts. The fee is \$50 for the application and \$50 for the license. You must wait eight days after the clerk receives the application. Licenses must be picked up in person.

2 Getting Married in the BVI

Apply in person for your license Monday through Friday at the Registrar's office in Tortola. The license costs \$110. You must wait three days to get married. You will need to arrange for banns to be published for three consecutive Sundays for a church wedding.

3 Officiates

In the USVI, a judge of the Territorial Court performs ceremonies at the court for \$200. Clergy will officiate in a church. Most couples opt for a ceremony by a person certified by a non-denominational church and licensed by the government. In the BVI, only the registrar (who charges \$35–\$100) or clergy can perform ceremonies.

4 Wedding Planner

Wedding planners help with finding a minister, rabbi, or registrar, hire reliable florists and musicians, and ensure a smooth ceremony. Many in the USVI are certified to perform ceremonies.

5 Packages

Many hotels offer packages that include the wedding ceremony and the honeymoon, and often have extras such as boat rides, and champagne dinners. Some places have packages that include accommodations for your wedding party and guests. Wedding planners also offer various packages.

6 Locations

Some people opt for a ceremony at one of the islands' small churches, but most head for the beach, a garden, or even a remote caye. Whim Plantation Museum and St. George Village Botanical Garden (see p58), both in St. Croix, make lovely wedding locations. Hotels with spacious grounds often have places set aside just for weddings.

7 Flowers

The bride's bouquet and groom's boutonniere are usually included in hotel or wedding planner packages. The islands' flora serves as a backdrop for your ceremony.

8 Photography

Your hotel or wedding planner will usually have a professional photographer on tap. Some packages include an album of photos sent later to your home, but many photographers give you the film to have developed at home.

9 Transportation

If you have always dreamed of arriving at your wedding ceremony in a stretch limousine, opt for a wedding in St. Thomas. Or you can drive yourself in a rental car to your informal ceremony at a beach or garden.

10 Music

You can hire a band if you are having a big shindig, but most couples have only a solo musician to entertain at their beach or garden ceremony. Your hotel or wedding planner will make recommendations if this does not come with your package.

TOP 10 Visitors with Special Concerns

1 Gay & Lesbian Travelers

There are small gay and lesbian communities on most islands. Gay bars seem to come and go, so ask at your hotel. St. Croix has a beachfront resort that caters to gay and lesbian visitors.

2 Seniors

Senior discounts are not common at Virgin Islands hotels and car rental agencies, but ask anyway. While ferry companies advertise senior fares, visitors are not eligible. Seniors worried about emergency medical care should stick to St. Croix and St. Thomas, which have hospitals.

3 Singles

Single vacationers can enjoy the busy bar scene on all islands. St. John's Virgin Islands National Park offers ranger-led hiking and snorkeling programs that draw a mix of visitors. Stay at small hotels or inns where the staff will make introductions.

4 Disabled Travelers

The situation is improving, but disabled visitors will not find uniform easy access. Some places have curb cuts, a few hotels offer rooms with wide doorways (see *Secret Harbour Beach Resort*), and some buildings have ramps, but these are rare cases.

5 Children

The islands are family friendly. Hotels offer kids' programs, there are many child-oriented attractions, and the beach is a great place for youngsters to let off steam. Spend Sunday at a popular beach to give your kids a chance to meet local children (see pp38–9).

6 Babysitters

Many hotels and vacation villa managers have lists of reliable babysitters. Check at the front desk or concierge of your hotel or ask your villa manager. Rates vary by time of day and number of children.

7 Alcoholics & Drug Abusers

Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, and other self-help groups meet on most islands. Check local newspapers for meeting times and places or call up. Alcohol and drug abuse are serious problems in the islands, and these groups have helped many people. Visitors are welcome at meetings.

8 Pets

Dogs and cats can enter the USVI with health and rabies certificates from their home veterinarian. A local vet must issue the same certificates when leaving. In the BVI, you need an Agriculture Department import permit. You may

have a huge surcharge added to your fare if you take your pet in a taxi.

9 Honeymooners

Both the USVI and BVI are honeymoon heavens, and many hotels offer special honeymoon packages. Palm-fringed beaches, starlight nights, intimate restaurants, and lazy days in a hammock promote romance, and some couples return year after year to celebrate their anniversary.

10 Rotarians

Many Rotary clubs meet weekly at restaurants throughout the USVI and BVI. Ask at your hotel for a meeting location near you. It will give you a chance to meet the islands' influential people.

TOP 10 Budget Tips

1 Carry Frozen Water

You can work up a major thirst in the hot tropical climate. If you have a refrigerator in your hotel room, do what islanders do – freeze bottles of water for use when you are out so you can drink the water as it melts. The bottles will sweat, so wrap in a washcloth and place in a plastic bag.

2 Pack a Picnic Lunch or Dinner

Instead of eating at the hotel's dining room, buy picnic fixings at the local supermarket. If you do not have a rental car, you may find a convenience store within walking distance of your hotel. Many hotels have their own convenience stores. Even if you must pay high prices at those stores, it is still cheaper than dining at a restaurant.

3 Rent a Condominium or Villa

Get more space plus save money by cooking meals when you rent a condominium or villa. Most come with a full set of kitchenware and gadgets. Even if local supermarket prices make you gasp, you will still save money over eating out. Useful option when traveling with children.

4 Camp

If island hotel rates are out of your price range, trying camping.

The Cinnamon Bay Campground in St. John (see p119) gives you the best deal for renting a space if you bring your own tent. Campgrounds also rent tents already in place as well as cooking gear and coolers.

5 Shop at Supermarkets

You can pick up the ingredients for a full-course dinner complete with a dessert at the islands' supermarkets, but it's their take-out sections that tempt most vacationers. While the prices are on the high side, most supermarkets sell full dinners hot and ready for eating. Don't look for extensive salad bars such as those you'll find at many US supermarkets.

6 Take the Bus

The USVI's VITRAN bus service is slower than molasses, but it gives you an unusual look at the islands. Bus stops are marked along major roadways. Check with the driver to determine its destination. The bus is also a low-cost way to see the islands and to mingle with the locals. There is no regular bus service in the BVI.

7 Use the Book Exchange

Rather than trying to find a good read at gift shops and the bookstores in St. Thomas and St. Croix, ask around for a book

exchange at hotels and marinas. There is no requirement to leave a book when you take one, but they are a good place to get rid of the already read books you brought from home.

8 Bring Small Quantities of Staples from Home

Pack small amounts of coffee, tea bags, and spices in your luggage to avoid paying top dollar at island stores for larger quantities than you can consume during your trip.

9 Eat at Places with Early Bird Specials

A few restaurants have early bird specials, but the menu will not be as extensive as later in the evening. However, you will have plenty to pick from, the restaurant will be less crowded, and you will have the rest of the evening to enjoy a stroll on the beach. Ask at your hotel for suggestions.

10 Go Before or After Hours at Beaches That Charge Admission

Trunk Bay in St. John and Magens Bay in St. Thomas charge a nominal admission fee, but if you have a family, the dollars add up. Wait until late afternoon, when the fee collector goes home, for a trip to the beach. In summer, you will still have several hours of daylight to enjoy the beach.

TOP 10 Local Quirks

1 Dress

Virgin Islanders put great store in appearances. Bathing suits are for the beach only. Even a cover-up over swimwear will not do for the islands' cities, towns, and shopping areas. Nudity is never allowed. You can get by with shorts and t-shirts at most casual restaurants, but more expensive places ask that you dress up a bit.

2 Manners

Remember to start your conversations with good morning, good afternoon, and good evening as the case may be. Islanders think such niceties are important. Hello and a smile doesn't quite do it. While folks are generally courteous to visitors, you may find some who go out of their way to be rude. Do not let it ruin your vacation.

3 Eye Contact & Handshakes

While you may be used to firmly grasping an extended hand and looking the other person square in the eye when saying hello, islanders may be more reserved. Handshakes are likely to be on the limp side and islanders almost never look you in the eye. Do not let this be a deterrent to making new friends.

4 Efficiency

While you do find pockets of efficiency,

some procedures will leave you gasping at the convoluted way things are done. The heat adds to the general slowness. Things are improving as more and more companies get computers, but in the meantime, just adapt to the slow pace.

5 Holidays

Both the USVI and BVI celebrate the usual festivals, but there are dozens of others you have never heard of that merit days off. When Carnival, or whatever name a particular island uses to designate the event, happens, the entire place seems to shut down.

6 Roaming Animals

Look out for stray beasts while driving – cows, goats, horses, dogs, and cats all roam at will. The Agriculture Department is cracking down on this, but progress is slow. Dogs and cats dart through some restaurants looking for handouts, and a cat or two may come begging at your vacation villa.

7 Walk on the Left

While it is easy to see that vehicles use the left side of the road, sidewalk procedures are less obvious. Walk on the left to keep foot traffic flowing. In places swarming with tourists, you may find the situation a bit confused as visitors used to keeping right continue to do

so while residents stick to their usual practice of keeping to the left.

8 Trash

Residents of both the USVI and BVI are just starting to catch on to the fact that trash strewn along the sides of the road looks unsightly. Yet, do not be surprised if you see a driver pitch a soda can out the window. They also throw out fruit skins, but that is not as serious a problem as the tropical heat rots them quickly.

9 Treatment of Animals

Animal rights societies are making strides, but many people continue to mistreat animals of all sizes. Pit bulls and other aggressive dog breeds are extremely popular, but their owners train them with abuse. If you see what looks like a bad case of animal mishandling, call the police – do not get involved personally.

10 Loud Ambience

Tropical life plays out at top volume and with the windows open. If you dislike loud music, make sure your hotel or vacation villa is not downwind of a place that has loud music until the wee hours. As for voice levels, what seems to be a heated argument between two islanders may merely be a casual conversation.

TOP 10 Shopping Tips

1 Bargaining

Bargaining usually only works at USVI and BVI markets or small stores where the proprietor serves as the salesclerk, but if you are buying in bulk or a slightly damaged item, it doesn't hurt to ask. Most prices in the USVI are already duty-free, as the sales people will be quick to point out when you ask for a discount.

2 Store Hours

Store hours vary, but most shops open at 9am or 10am. They usually close at around 5pm, but may stay open a bit later during the busier winter season. Most stores are closed Sundays and holidays except when cruise ships are in port. Stores near restaurants often stay open until around 9pm.

3 Carry Water

The tropics are hot, a lot hotter than you can imagine if you come from a cool climate. Even if you don't sweat, you're still at risk of dehydration. To shop healthy, carry a bottle of water and drink from it all the time. Residents know that you can keep going a lot longer if you regularly sip from a water bottle.

4 Wear Comfortable Shoes

While flimsy sandals look nice, shopping expeditions call for sturdy

shoes. Sneakers with socks are fine. The socks help keep blisters at bay and soak up the sweat. If you don't like the idea of enclosed feet, consider sturdy sandals with thick soles. These will help you navigate the often uneven sidewalks in shopping areas.

5 Sales Tax

Shoppers pay no sales tax in the USVI and BVI. However, unseen taxes imposed by the governments abound. Store owners in the USVI pay a 4 percent gross receipts tax on all sales, and they pass that cost on to you. In the BVI, merchants must pay import duties, which again are ultimately paid by the customer.

6 Shop at Home First for High-priced Purchases

If you plan to buy an expensive camera or piece of pricey jewelry, check prices at home before you head to the USVI and BVI. Prices on those items can be lower in the USVI, thanks to the territory's duty-free status, but sometimes you can do better at your hometown discount or warehouse store or by shopping on the Internet.

7 Knockoffs

When shopping in places like Vendors Plaza in St. Thomas or at fairs and festivals, make sure

that Gucci bag or Rolex watch is the real thing. While the government has clamped down on vendors selling knock-offs, it still happens sometimes. If the price looks too good to be true, it probably is.

8 Souvenirs

Both the USVI and BVI have numerous gift and jewelry stores to tempt you to part with big bucks. If you are looking for bargains, shop at discount stores such as Kmart, which carry calendars with island scenes and all sorts of bric-a-brac ideal for taking home.

9 Sales

Stores seldom have big blowout sales advertised in the local newspapers or sidewalk sale days. Instead, look for bargain racks, particularly on clothing and linen, during the summer and early fall months as stores strive to get rid of last year's merchandise.

10 Shipping

Many stores will ship your purchases nearly anywhere in the world for a fee. This makes sense for breakables, since the store assumes responsibility. If you want to do so yourself, ask for a box at a grocery store, buy tape, and head to the post office. Shipping to the US mainland is much cheaper in the USVI than the BVI.

TOP 10 Food & Drink

1 Supermarkets

Your best bets are the Plaza Extra stores in St. Croix and St. Thomas, Starfish Market in St. John, and Riteway or Bobby's in Tortola. Virgin Gorda has a few small grocery stores, including Buck's Food Market. The outer BVI islands do not have supermarkets.

2 Warehouse Stores

While the warehouse stores in St. Thomas and St. Croix pale in comparison to those found on the US mainland, they do sell items in bulk and often at lower prices than the supermarket. Cost-U-Less in these two islands has no membership fee.

3 Fresh Fruits & Vegetables

If you shop right after a shipment arrives, you may find crisp vegetables and fruit. But shipping takes its toll and the farther you get from St. Thomas and St. Croix, the more wilted the produce. You can get local produce at roadside stands, but supply is erratic.

4 Delicatessen

Some supermarkets have delicatessen counters that whip up sandwiches to go. They often have take-out foods ideal for picnics or meals at your vacation abode.

5 Flexibility

If you are cooking at your condominium or

vacation villa, do not fix your menu until you go shopping. Sometimes all the stores are out of an item that may be essential to your favorite dish.

6 Liquor Stores

Liquor is sold at duty-free prices in the USVI. Tourist areas have a few liquor stores, but you will find a large selection and usually lower prices for common items such as gin at supermarkets and warehouse stores.

7 Convenience Stores

Convenience stores carrying snacks and basic staples are scattered around the larger islands. In the outer BVI islands, these stores are the main shopping spots; unless you want to use precious vacation time heading to the larger islands, you will have to make do with them for your needs.

8 Take-out Stands

Gaily painted trucks sit along the roads on larger islands, stocked with all manner of West Indian food. A few have tables outside, but usually you will have to take your lunch elsewhere to eat.

9 Getting Provisions for Yachts or Villas

If you are chartering a bare boat (see p22), the company will stock it with foods of your choosing. Your villa manager

will usually do the same. This saves you time and possibly money since the provisioners often deal with wholesalers.

10 Private Chefs

Islands with large rosters of vacation villas have private chefs to cook tasty meals at your villa. They will create just what you ordered, and they will clean up too.

TOP 10 Accommodation Tips

1 Pick Your Location

Some islands have overall cheaper prices than others, with St. Croix having the lowest rates. You will need to pay more for the privilege of staying on the beach on any island. A room with an ocean view is more expensive than one with a garden or city view, and in the few high-rise hotels, the top floors will probably cost you more.

2 Rates

Rates drop drastically around April 15 and go up again around December 15 when folks from colder climates escape to the tropics. Rates at some hotels are at their peak between Christmas and New Year. In the USVI, hotel rates are high in mid-February when schools on the US mainland close for the week that includes the national holiday, President's Day.

3 Deals

During the slower summer season, hotels often offer packages that include some meals and extras such as champagne, massages, day sails, scuba dives, and car rentals. They can be great deals if you take advantage of the extras.

4 Making Reservations

If you plan to visit during the busier winter season, it pays to book in advance if you are picky

about where you stay. Reservations are essential if you are visiting a BVI outer island. Note that some hotels have mailing addresses on other islands.

5 Arriving Without Reservations

If you do not have a hotel reservation, call hotels from the airport or ferry terminal. You can check out the free tourist magazines and the hotel advertisements in those places. If you are taking a taxi, booking your room before you leave the airport is a must. Taxi drivers are usually unwilling to drive from hotel to hotel for you to find a room.

6 Tipping

In the USVI, tip between 15 and 20 percent in restaurants, depending on how pleased you are with the service. A service charge of anywhere from 10 to 15 percent is included at most BVI restaurants and hotels. A few USVI hotels also add a service charge. If they do not, leave the maid a few dollars a day depending on the service.

7 Phone Expenses

Some hotels charge for local phone calls and many charge for connecting to a long-distance carrier for credit card calls. Long-distance charges can be very high.

You will definitely save on long-distance calls if you use a phone card and the lobby phone. Your cell phone may or may not work.

8 Parking

Most hotels have free parking, but it may not be next to your room. Parking in Charlotte Amalie, Christiansted, Cruz Bay, Road Town, and Spanish Town's Virgin Gorda Yacht Harbor can be very tight. Only Charlotte Amalie and Christiansted have paid parking lots where you can usually find a space.

9 Air Conditioning

Many hotels have air conditioning. However, smaller places and many vacation villas have windows open to the breeze. Unless your hotel room is in a pocket where the breezes do not blow or you prefer chilled air, you probably will not need to turn on the air conditioner.

10 Hotel Tax

Both the USVI and BVI tack a hotel occupancy tax onto your rate. In the USVI, you will pay an additional 8 percent, and some St. John hoteliers also ask for a voluntary \$1 a day donation. The St. John Accommodations Council uses the money to pay for good works. In the BVI, the hotel occupancy tax stands at 7 percent.
