Introduction

Ready, Set, Go!

Whether you're a certified diver or a non-swimmer, the Cayman Islands are the place for you to act out your fantasies. If that means scuba diving à la Jacques Cousteau, shopping until you drop for baubles from around the globe, mingling with the jetset crowd at a luxurious resort, or just finding a quiet piece of sand to call your own for the day, these islands have got you covered. Just over an hour's flight from Miami and less than two hours from Houston, the Cayman Islands are one of the easiest Caribbean destinations to reach. That easy access combined with a high standard of living, low level of crime, and plenty of sun and sand, continues to draw record numbers of travelers. Many come again and again, and some returnees even invest in their own slice of paradise with one of the many condominiums located here. Others choose the islands, one of the top banking capitals in the world, as a base for their businesses and corporations.

We enjoy the Cayman Islands for a variety of reasons: the spectacular waters, the peace and quiet, and the rich marine and bird life. Shopping in George Town is another plus as is the variety of dining found along Seven Mile Beach.

Most especially, though, we enjoy the security and laid-back atmosphere of these islands. Dressing up for dinner usually means putting on a fresh T-shirt and pair of shorts. Beach strolls are uninterrupted by vendors of any kind. We've vacationed with our family in the islands and enjoyed the security of walking from our hotel to Seven Mile Beach restau-



rants, the ease of getting around the islands, and the home-away-from-home atmosphere.

Often just referred to as “Cayman,” this destination is actually three distinct islands. Grand Cayman, the showy big brother, is home to most of the tourism, as well as the banking industry. The Sister Islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman, each favored by scuba divers, as well as anglers (and those looking to get away from it all), are about 80 miles east-northeast of Grand Cayman and are separated from each other by seven miles of ocean. Cayman Brac covers about 14 square miles and Little Cayman, 10 square miles. Whatever island you select, you’ll be happy. Grab some sunscreen and make your way to this luxurious destination where peddling is prohibited, and the living is definitely easy.

 DID YOU KNOW?

Although it's often called "the Caymans," technically there is no such place. It's either "Cayman" or The Cayman Islands."

The Cayman Islands keep drawing vacationers, in spite of an exchange rate that's not in Americans' favor. The secret of these little islands? Here's why you might consider a vacation here:

The Best Island For You

So which island do you visit? They aren't identical triplets; each has its own distinct personality, one that you'll want to match to your own. If you are interested in duty-free shopping, gourmet dining, and luxurious accommodations (either hotels, condominiums, or villas), make **Grand Cayman** your base.

If, on the other hand, you plan to spend most of your time looking for that secluded strip of sand where you never see another set of footprints, then **Little**



Cayman should be your destination. This tiny island reaches just 40 feet above sea level at its highest point and is home to fewer than 100 residents. It's little changed from a century ago, a perfect place to get away from it all and spend your day on a bicycle pedaling along empty roads, snorkeling in pristine waters, or looking for that perfect beach.

If you are interested in watersports, you've got a tougher choice. Each of these islands is great for scuba divers, each well known in the world of diving. Bonefishing is also a top draw, especially on Little Cayman and **Cayman Brac**. Here you'll also find caving, bird-watching, and plenty of places for quiet walks.

Whichever your preference, you're never limited to just one destination in the Cayman Islands. Island-hopping is easy! These isles are much smaller than such easterly neighbors as Cuba and Jamaica, so don't choose only one area to explore – choose several!

The Alive Price Scales



Accommodations

Prices change as quickly as the sand shifts on a Caribbean beach. For that reason we avoid dollars-and-cents figures. Aside from the constantly changing prices, accommodations offer a wide variety of steps in their price scales as well: partial ocean view, full ocean view, oceanside, garden view – the list goes on and on. Each has its own price based on the month and the day of the week; when you make your reservation ask about all the categories. Our price scale is designed to give you a ballpark figure for a typical stay during peak season (December 15 through April 15). We've based these estimates on a

standard room for two persons. These figures don't take into account additional amenities such as meal plans, dive packages, etc. Prices are given in US dollars.

A 10% government tax is charged on all accommodations. Most hotels add gratuities ranging from 6% to 10% to this amount.

All our hotel selections take major credit cards, are air-conditioned and have private baths, except in the case of the few guest houses where noted.

Restaurants

For dining, we've set up a price scale based on a three-course dinner, including appetizer or soup, an entrée, dessert and coffee. Cocktails and wine are extra. Price estimates are per person in US dollars.

★ TIP

Some restaurants add a 15% gratuity to the bill, so make sure you don't inadvertently tip twice.

A Capsule History



The 16th & 17th Centuries

Recorded Caymanian history begins, not with Grand Cayman, but with the Sister Islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman. These islands were spotted by **Christopher Columbus** on his last journey to the New World on May 10, 1503. The explorer was actually on his way from Panama to Hispaniola (now home of the Dominican Republic and Haiti), when he was blown off-course, a detour that brought him within sight of the Sister Islands. Columbus named these islands *Las Tortugas* after the many sea turtles he found here. Later maps referred to the islands as *Lagartos*, probably a reference to the large lizards (possibly iguanas) seen on the island. Later, the name became *Caymanas* from the Carib Indian word for the marine crocodile.

DID YOU KNOW?

On a 1585 voyage, Sir Francis Drake reported sighting “great serpents called Caymanas, large like lizards, which are edible.”

A few years later, a French map showed Cayman Brac with crocodiles in its waters and a manuscript described the reptiles. There's no need for modern visitors to worry about those toothy lizards. In 1993 an archeological dig did discover the skeleton of one on Grand Cayman, followed by another three years later on Cayman Brac, proving the existence of the crocodiles. But no living version has been spotted.



DID YOU KNOW?

Turtles are still a symbol of Cayman: the unofficial mascot is “Sir Turtle,” a peg-legged, swashbuckling turtle. The turtle even appears on the Cayman Islands flag. Turtles drew sailors to the region for years in an attempt to prevent scurvy. Their ships visited the islands, and they slaughtered and salted the turtles to feed the crew.



The 18th & 19th Centuries

Slowly, human population rose and the first royal land grant in Grand Cayman came in 1734, marking the first permanent settlement. Through 1800, the population continued to grow with the arrival of shipwrecked mariners and immigrants from Jamaica. Cayman Brac and Little Cayman remained primarily uninhabited, visited only by turtle hunters during season (some records show the tiny islands were settled but residents were attacked by pirates). For years, the Cayman Islands served as a magnet for pirates. Buccaneers such as Sir Henry Morgan enjoyed its sunny shores for at least brief stopovers. During the American Revolution, American privateers challenged English shipping, aided by the war

ships and merchant ships of France, Spain, and Holland. By 1782, peace came to the seas and buccaneering drew to a close. In 1832 the citizens of the Cayman Islands met at what is today the oldest remaining structure on the island: St. James Castle. Remembered as the “Birthplace of Democracy” in Cayman, this site witnessed the first vote to create a legislature of representatives.

WRECK OF THE TEN SAILS

According to research, in 1794, a great maritime tragedy took place on Grand Cayman. “The Wreck of the Ten Sails” is legendary, recalling the tragedy of the *Cordelia*, part of a convoy of merchant ships headed to Britain from Jamaica. The *Cordelia* ran aground on the reef at the East End and frantically sent a signal to the other ships to warn them off the dangerous coral. Sadly, the signal was misunderstood and, one by one, the tall ships sailed into the reef. Residents of East End were later commended by King George III for their quick actions that left no life unsaved. Various stories explain that the king granted the islands freedom from conscription, and other versions say that the king gave the islands freedom from taxation.

By 1835, slavery had been outlawed by Great Britain and the islands led a quiet existence, many of the population working as turtle fishermen or building turtling boats. The sea provided a livelihood for most residents, who then traded for agricultural items that couldn’t be grown on the island. Palm thatch was transformed into marine rope and offered a good barter for daily staples. During this

time, shipbuilding became a major industry as well. (Palm thatch played such an important role in Cayman's history it even appears on the Caymanian flag.)

The Islands Today

For the next century, the Cayman Islands remained relatively isolated. Residents continued their old traditions but hurricanes, tidal waves, and a depletion of the green turtle supply forced some residents to sail to Cuba, Honduras, and Nicaragua to earn a living. The merchant seamen navigated the waters and this sustained the economy of the islands until tourism and finance rose to prominence in the 20th century. During this time the islands were cut off geographically and had limited communication with the outside world until the first wireless station was built in 1935.



DID YOU KNOW?

These islands are a dependent territory or a British Crown Colony of the UK. They are led by the Governor, an appointee of the Queen. The Governor leads the Executive Council, which includes three official and four elected members. The unicameral legislature consists of 15 members. The government offices are on Elgin Street in George Town.

The plunge into the 20th century was aided by commissioner **Sir Allen Cardinall**, who served from 1934 to 1940. Linking the public buildings of Grand Cayman with a network of roads, the commissioner was also the first public figure to recognize the tour-

ism potential of the islands, even noting that this area held “the most perfect bathing beaches in the West Indies.” In 1953, the first airfield in the Cayman Islands was completed with the Owens Roberts Airport on Grand Cayman. A year later, an airstrip opened on Cayman Brac. Within three years tourism began taking hold on Seven Mile Beach, Grand Cayman. By 1957, dive operator Bob Soto began the islands’ first recreational diving business and introduced the world to these pristine waters. The islands continued as a dependency of Jamaica, both under the protectorate of Great Britain until 1962 when Jamaica became independent. The Caymanians had a far different view of the Union Jack than their Jamaican neighbors, however; in 1962 a vote overwhelmingly favored remaining a British dependency.

He Hath Founded It Upon The Seas



The motto of the Cayman Islands, “He hath founded it upon the seas,” describes this destination perfectly. The sea is an integral part of life here, both for residents and vacationers. And it is never more than a short distance away, no matter where you are on the islands.

The People

The three Cayman Islands boast a total population of just over 35,600, most of whom live on Grand Cayman. About 34,280 people reside on the largest island, followed by 1,200 residents on Cayman Brac and a scant 120 people on Little Cayman.

It’s a varied population, with cultures from around the globe. About a third of all residents are non-Caymanians. Most of those are from the US, Can-

ada, the UK and nearby Jamaica, although a total of 113 nationalities are represented.

Environment

These islands are low and fairly dry, especially when compared to neighboring Jamaica. On Grand Cayman, the elevation is only about 60 feet above sea level at its highest point. The Sister Islands are each amoeba-shaped and small. Cayman Brac soars to a nosebleed level, by Caymanian standards, of 140 feet above sea level.

These three islands are actually the peaks of a submarine mountain range, the **Cayman Ridge**, part of a chain running from Cuba to near Belize. The islands are in fact limestone outcroppings with little soil, so vegetation is not as lush as on some islands.

There are two types of limestone: **bluff limestone**, formed about 30 million years ago, and **ironshore**, created 120,000 years ago, combining limestone with coral, mollusk shell, and marl. Ironshore accounts for the pocked surface that holds little pockets of soil (and makes walking barefoot just about impossible) on much of these islands. You won't hear us complaining about the rough ground here, though. The limestone and little soil means that there's very little runoff. The result? Crystal-clear waters directly offshore.



Flora

The Cayman Islands are not as lush as neighboring Jamaica but still boast a good variety of tropical flora and fauna. The **wild banana orchid** is the national flower, one of 27 indigenous orchid species. Blooming in April and May, it is found on all three islands in different varieties. Five of the orchid spe-

cies here are found nowhere else. The national tree is the **silver thatch palm**. The palm has a silvery underside with light green upper fronds. For all its beauty, this plant has far more than ornamental value, though. It has been used by islanders to form roofing, belts, baskets, rope, and more. Palm rope has long been a bartering tool, traded for staples.

The **mango** is the most plentiful fruit in the Cayman Islands, ripening in the month of June and continuing to produce through September. The islands harvest about 65,000 pounds of this tropical treasure every season. There are 15 different varieties of mango; you'll find it at roadside stands and farmers' markets.

⚡ WARNING!

Manchineel trees present an unusual danger. These trees, often found near water, have highly acidic leaves and fruit. Rainwater dripping off the leaves can cause painful burns and the tree's tiny, poisonous apples will also burn when stepped on. In most resorts, manchineel trees have been removed or are clearly marked, often with signs and with trunks painted red.

Fauna



Animals & Reptiles

The Cayman Islands don't have a lot of wildlife, but there are some small animals that can be seen.

A shy resident of these islands is the **agouti**, a rabbit-sized rodent once hunted for meat. Intro-

duced by the early settlers, the agouti is a Central American native. Once kept as a pet and raised for food, today the rodent is rarely seen in the wild. A family of agoutis can be viewed at the Cayman Turtle Farm on Grand Cayman. The agouti has long, thin legs, hoof-like claws with three toes on its hind feet and five toes on its forefeet. The **hickatee**, a freshwater turtle, is found in freshwater and brackish ponds here and in neighboring Cuba.

Although the Cayman Islands have no poisonous snakes, you might spot one of the harmless indigenous species such as the **grass snake**, which feeds on frogs and lizards. Their numbers have been reduced by the **mongoose**, which was introduced to control rats. (Unfortunately, rats and mongoose keep different hours, so the mongoose feed on the snake – the natural predator of the rat – causing the rat population to swell.) A favorite sighting is the **blue iguana**, a vegetarian species that can grow to five feet long.

Little Cayman is home to over 2,000 iguanas (check out the “iguana crossing” signs around the island). On Grand Cayman, you can see a large male on display in the Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park.



Birds

Bird lovers flock to these islands to see parrots, ducks, cuckoos, herons, and other species. One of the most exotic species is the national bird, the **Cayman parrot**. Look for these birds in early mornings and late afternoons when they return to roost in the stumps of palm trees. (Sadly there are no parrots on Little Cayman. That bird population disappeared in 1932 with the Great Hurricane and never returned.) These parrots eat fruit, flowers and seeds in the dry woodlands.

Another commonly seen bird is the **Zenaida dove**, a cooing dove that feeds on dried seeds. The colorful **bananaquit**, a yellow and black bird that's not shy about begging for crumbs (and its favorite treat: sugar) is another common sight.

Red-footed boobies are easily sighted on Little Cayman. Here you'll find 7,000 boobies, about 30% of the Caribbean population. This beige bird, about 25 inches long, nests high in the trees. Its young are pure white. Boobies construct a rough nest of sticks that's easy to spot.

Magnificent frigate birds are also sighted around these islands. With a wingspan of over seven feet and wings sharply angled like boomerangs, the black bird is fairly easy to spot as it soars high over the sea.

Little Cayman in particular is a favorite with birders, who come to the tiny isle for the chance to spot **West Indian whistling ducks**, **cattle egrets**, **black necked stilts**, **snowy egrets**, and **tricoloured herons**, as well as the red footed boobies, magnificent frigate birds and others. Cayman Brac is favored for its **parrot** viewing, with a large reserve dedicated to these colorful birds. Grand Cayman is also home to several protected areas and ponds where both migrating and resident birds thrive.

Undersea Life

These islands are a destination known for their underwater attractions, with many of the best dive sites on the globe, waters with a clarity second to none, a diversity of dives to interest even the most jaded diver, and a variety of marine life that can't be beat. Divers and snorkelers will find marine playgrounds around each of the islands. Fishermen



wrestle wily **bonefish** in the shallow flats or struggle with **blue marlin**, **yellowfin tuna**, or **wahoo** from deep-water charter boats. Those looking for a more leisurely pace enjoy sunset sails or long walks along powdery beaches.

The green sea turtle is an integral part of Cayman culture and a symbol of these islands. Even in their current protected state, only one turtle out of 10,000 eggs laid reaches maturity. The turtles are threatened by birds, animals, marine life, and, of course, humans. Even so, the turtle has continued to thrive in Cayman waters.

Green sea turtles can stay underwater for several days without surfacing for air. The Cayman Islands have taken strict measures to protect the marine life of these waters. Today the sea turtle is protected and no one may disturb, molest, or take turtles in Cayman waters without a license.

Each of the Cayman Islands is surrounded by coral reefs, producing some of the best snorkeling and scuba diving in the Caribbean. Divers have a chance at spotting a wide array of marine life, partly because of the deep water nearby. The Cayman Trough, the deepest waters in the Caribbean, lies between here and Jamaica, with depths that plunge into inky blackness over four miles beneath the ocean's surface.

WARNING!

Whenever you are snorkeling or diving, watch out for fire coral. There are many varieties, all edged with white. If you accidentally brush against the coral it will defend itself and burn you like fire!

Climate

The weather in these islands can be summed up in one word: perfect. Blessed with cooling trade winds, the Cayman Islands enjoy a temperate climate year-round. You'll find the temperatures warm enough to enjoy a dip in the sea all year through, but cool enough to encourage you to get out and explore the island, stroll George Town for a few hours of shopping, and dine outside comfortably. There's no need to run from air-conditioned car to air-conditioned hotel lobby on these islands.

The coolest month is February. July and August are the hottest, with highs approaching 90° (although high humidity levels can make it feel much warmer).

Water temperatures vary slightly during the winter months. In the cooler season, the sea ranges from 78° to 82°, rising about five degrees during the summer months. Rainfall varies with the seasons. Generally, rainstorms are heavy but brief. The islands receive about 46 inches of precipitation annually. The driest times are March and April.



Hurricanes

Mention weather and the Caribbean in the same sentence and, quite predictably, the topic of hurricanes arises. These deadly storms are officially a threat from June through November, although the greatest danger is during the later months, basically August through October (September is the worst).

Hurricanes are defined as revolving storms with wind speeds of 75 mph or greater. These counterclockwise storms begin as waves off the west coast of Africa and work their way across the Atlantic, some eventually gaining strength and becoming tropical depressions (under 40 mph) or tropical storms (40 to 74 mph). Excellent warning systems keep islanders posted on the possibility of oncoming storms. Radio Cayman broadcasts current storm reports in the islands. Keep in mind, however, that the Caribbean is a large region. We were on Grand Cayman when Hurricane Luis picked up strength on its way to batter St. Martin and Antigua in 1995, but we never saw surf over ankle-high. More recently, we were on Grand Cayman while a hurricane battered Jamaica causing rainslides and flooding. The result on Grand Cayman was occasional wind gusts until the hurri-

cane began its movement over the island, when it weakened and produced nothing more extensive than rain.

Planning Your Trip

When to Visit



The peak (read: most expensive) time to visit the Cayman Islands is from mid-December through mid-April. This is the busiest time of year, a season when Americans and Canadians are looking for a warm weather refuge, if only for a few days, and when hotels and condominiums can charge their highest rates.

Summer months are the cheapest – look for rooms at 40% to 50% off their peak rates. Late summer can bring the possibility of hurricanes, but it's a minor threat, and good forecasting systems keep travelers aware of any impending storms days in advance.

Late summer (August and September) traditionally is a slow season throughout the Caribbean due to increased storm threat, warm weather throughout the US, and back-to-school preparations. The Cayman Islands, however, is offering plenty of summer temptation with deep discounts on airfare, hotels, attractions, restaurants, watersports, and auto rentals.

You'll find equally pleasant weather conditions in the "shoulder" seasons – fall and spring. Prices are somewhat lower than peak rates during these

months, and reservations are easier to obtain. In the fall, the busiest time is late October, when the annual Pirates Week blowout fills hotels with merry-makers.

 WARNING!

Grand Cayman is a favorite spring break destination for many college students so, unless you enjoy a serious party atmosphere, avoid late March and early April. While the crowding is not as severe as that found in Nassau or Cancún, it's enough to keep Seven Mile Beach bustling. Spring breakers don't hit Little Cayman and Cayman Brac so these islands maintain their peaceful atmosphere year-round.

For the past several years, the Department of Tourism has offered extensive **discount programs** during the summer and through the end of October. A recent promotion, available only through travel agents, was "Get Re-Energized in the Cayman Islands." Discounts included a 20% fare reduction for direct flights on Cayman Airways, Delta, Air Jamaica, and American Airlines. Accommodation discounts were available on each of the three islands. As part of the promotion, many properties allowed kids to stay free and families to buy four nights and get a fifth night free. The package also offered discounts on meals at many hotels and stand-alone restaurants, discounted admission at some attractions, and for car and Jeep rentals. While the details of each summer's promotion varies, it's worth keeping this in mind when you plan your travels.

Entry Requirements

US and Canadian citizens need to show a **passport**, or other proof of citizenship such as a **birth certificate**. Visitors must also show a **return airline ticket**. Travelers can remain in the islands for up to six months; to extend your visit you must obtain permission by writing the **Chief Immigration Officer**, Department of Immigration, P.O. Box 1098, Grand Cayman. On-island, the immigration offices are found at the Government Administration Building on Elgin Avenue in George Town.

Visas are not required of citizens from member countries of the Commonwealth, the US and Canada, or from Andorra, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Irish Republic, Italy, Japan, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, San Marino, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland.

Customs

US Customs

The Cayman Islands are a duty-free port, so after 48 hours out of the States, Americans can return home with up to US \$400 in purchases without paying duty. (Families can pool their exemptions: a husband and wife can take an exemption of \$800; a family of four, \$1,600.)

Each visitor can return with one carton of cigarettes and two liters of alcohol (only those visitors age 21 and over). Additional liquor purchases result in a duty approximately 15% above the duty-free cost.

Turtle products – shells, steaks, lotion, and shell jewelry – sold on the island cannot be brought back into or through the US. Skip these items at the Cayman Turtle Farm gift shop.

★ TIP

Before your trip, get a copy of the *Know Before You Go* brochure (Publication 512) from the US Customs Service at your airport or by writing the US Customs Service, PO Box 7407, Washington, DC 20044, www.customs.ustreas.gov.

Canadian Customs

If you are a Canadian citizen, you can return home with CI \$300 in goods duty free if you have been away from Canada for seven days or longer (see page 31 for exchange rates). This exemption is good once per year. If you've been away more than 48 hours, you can claim an additional exemption of CI \$100 per calendar quarter. (You can't claim the yearly and the quarterly exemptions within the same quarter.)



What to Pack

We're happy to say that you won't need to pack a steamer trunk for a vacation in the Cayman Islands. No matter what your planned activities, you'll find that these are casual islands. Unlike some other Caribbean islands, which recall a more proper British standard of dress (especially during high season), Cayman adheres to American standards of casual comfort, due in large part to the high number of American ex-pats that now call this land home. Shorts and T-shirts are the uniform of these islands. Be sure to bring along at least two swimsuits (the high humidity means that clothing takes extra time to dry). Swimwear is appropriate only for the beach, so you will want a cover-up, no matter how casual, for lunches and quick excursions.

Evenings are relaxed, too. We've worn shorts and sandals to many al fresco restaurants on these islands. There are some establishments on Grand Cayman where you'll feel more comfortable in long pants, a collared shirt, or a simple dress; we've indicated these in the text. Nightlife is also laid-back – leave the sequined dress for a trip to San Juan or Aruba. Sundresses, polo shirts, and sandals are seen in the islands' nightclubs and comedy clubs; most evening activity, however, takes place in the beach bars, where you'll feel most at home in those shorts once again.

And if you forget something? Don't worry. Grand Cayman has everything you'll need – clothing, medicines, watersports gear, camera equipment, you name it – albeit at prices somewhat higher than you might find at home.

 TIP

If you'll be making Little Cayman or Cayman Brac your home base, we recommend double-checking your packing list. Remember, these are remote islands with few stores. You'll find the basics, but the selection will be slim.

Tourist Offices

Although three out of four Cayman Islands visitors come from the United States, the European market makes up a significant segment of arrivals. Regardless of the home base, the target market for the Cayman Islands remains the same: "affluent travelers with a sense of adventure," according to Jonathan Sloan, Senior Account Manager with McCluskey & Associates, the London-based public relations firm for the Cayman Islands. UK tour operators include Airtours, Airwaves, American Connection, Barefoot Traveller, British Airways Holidays, Caribbean Connection, Caribtours, Elegant Resorts, Get-away Vacations, Goldenjoy Holidays, Harlequin Worldwide Travel, Hayes and Jarvis, International Charters, Key to America, Kuoni, North America Travel Service, Regal Holidays, Scuba Safaris, Seligo, Sport Abroad, Sunworld Beach Villas, Thomas Cook Holidays, Tradewinds, Virgin Holidays, and Worldwide Fishing Safaris. "The list for US and European wholesalers is quite extensive and includes all the major recognized wholesalers," says Sloan.

By Air

Most air travelers arrive in the Cayman Islands at Grand Cayman's **Owen Roberts International Airport**, a modern facility that includes a tourist board desk with brochures and maps, as well as plenty of duty-free shopping. The airport received a substantial facelift just a few years ago to enlarge and improve all the visitor areas, as well as baggage claim and customs.

By Cruise Ship

Cruise ship passengers arrive by tender in George Town at either the **North** or **South terminal** (just steps apart). These terminals are right in the heart of George Town, just a stroll from shopping and dining. The clean waterfront brims with shops featuring fine jewelry, black coral, artwork, leather goods, and other goodies.

Grand Cayman limits the number of cruise ships in port at any one time to three or four, with a maximum capacity of 6,000 passengers. This limit ensures that visitors have a good experience while on

the island and never feel overcrowded in George Town. For information on cruises to the Cayman Islands, call the cruise lines listed below.

Cruise visitors arriving for the day will find drivers outside the cruise terminals. These “guides” offer trips to Seven Mile Beach, as well as island tours. You’ll find plenty of organized tours (typically to the

Turtle Farm, Hell, and Seven Mile Beach). To experience the island without the rush of a crowd, consider hiring a driver by the hour. A taxi stand is at the terminal and a knowledgeable driver will take up to four persons for US \$37.50 per hour. If you'd rather spend your time on the beach, take a taxi directly to Seven Mile Beach, about three miles from town. Taxi fare runs about US \$4 per person each way; a steady flow of taxis from the hotels to town insures that you'll have no difficulty returning to the ship before departure time.

 TIP

Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday are generally the busiest days for cruise ships in George Town. To avoid crowds, hit the beach or other attractions on those days.



Inter-Island Travel

Many travelers, especially those returning to Grand Cayman, spend at least a day or two exploring the Sister Islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman. Although the distance is too far to be covered by ferry, inter-island flights are relatively inexpensive and easy to arrange. Flights are available through **Island Air** (☎ 345-949-5252, fax 345-949-7044; www.islandair.ky, iair@candw.ky) with scheduled twice-daily service between Grand Cayman, Little Cayman and Cayman Brac. Flight time is about 45 minutes. Fares from Grand Cayman to Little Cayman or Cayman Brac are US \$154 round-trip or US \$110 for the day-trip (there and back in one day). Flights between Cayman Brac and Little Cayman are US \$40 round-trip. Special fares are available for children under 12. Flights are also available

from Grand Cayman aboard **Cayman Airways** (☎ 800-422-9626).

Currency

The **Cayman Islands dollar** is legal tender. The dollar is exchanged at a rate fixed to the US dollar (CI \$1 equals US \$1.25). The Cayman Islands dollar is issued in units of \$100, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5 and \$1 with coins of 25¢, 10¢, 5¢ and 1¢.

There's no need to exchange your money upon arrival. US dollars are readily accepted on the Cayman Islands. You may receive change back in Caymanian currency.

Telephone & Internet

The Cayman Islands have excellent telecommunications service thanks to **Cable & Wireless (Cayman Islands) Ltd.** You'll find dependable, modern phone and Internet service on each of the islands.

Due to the influence of the banking industry, reliable telecommunications have long been a necessity; these islands once had the largest per-capita number of telex machines in the world. Today you can count on **fax** services at just about every accommodation in the islands.

The cost for local calls within Grand Cayman is 9¢ for the first three minutes, 3¢ for each additional minute. Calls within either Little Cayman or Cayman Brac are charged a flat fee of 9¢ per minute. Calls between Grand Cayman and the Sister Islands are 3¢ per minute. Calls between Little Cayman and Cayman Brac are 9¢ per minute. You'll find many public phones throughout the islands. Some accept coins only; others accept phone cards only; some accept both. You can purchase phone cards in denominations of \$10, \$15 and \$25 at the Cable and Wireless office in Anderson Square on Shedden Road in George Town, at the Cayman Brac office, and at most service stations.

Internet Connections

You'll find good service here. Connections can be made by dialing (locally) ☎ 345-976-4638; the cost is CI 12¢ per minute. You'll find an internet café along Seven Mile Beach at **P.D.'s Pub**, Galleria Plaza, West Bay Road, ☎ 345-949-7144.

Time Zone

The Cayman Islands are in the **Eastern time zone**, five hours behind Greenwich Mean Time. The Cayman Islands do not observe daylight saving time.



Electrical Current

Throughout the islands, the current is 120 volts at 60 cycles. US appliances will not need adapters. The standard US flat pin prongs are used.

Crime

We're happy to say that the Cayman Islands enjoy a low crime rate. With the islands' excellent economic position, crime is rare. You can walk on public beaches or stroll along busy West Bay Street after an evening meal without worrying about being mugged. But no destination is completely crime-free. Use the same common sense precautions you would exercise at home. Don't walk alone on the beach at night. Also, don't leave valuables on the beach while swimming. Invest in a waterproof pouch for keys and necessities and lock other items in your car or hotel room.

★ TIP

Many of the Cayman Islands' rental vehicles are open-air Jeeps; to guard against theft leave your possessions in your hotel room when you venture out.

Drugs

Be warned that the islands have strict anti-drug laws. Marijuana is an illegal substance and possession can result not only in large fines but also in a prison term. There is no hassling by beach vendors, and we have never been bothered by a drug dealer, which can be a problem on many other islands.

Media

Television

At most hotels and condominiums, you'll find as many television channels as you would at home,

thanks to satellite broadcasts. The islands also have three local television stations: **CITN** (channel 27), **CTS** (channel 24) and **CCT**, Cayman Christian Television (channel 21).

Radio

Four local radio stations can be enjoyed as you drive around the islands. **Radio Cayman**, owned by the government, is broadcast on all the islands. **Z-99** broadcasts on Grand Cayman and **ICCI-FM**, at the International College of the Cayman Islands, also serves the largest island. Christian radio is heard on **Heaven 97**.

Newspapers

Grand Cayman has a daily paper, the *Caymanian Compass*. You'll also be able to pick up US newspapers such as *The New York Times*, *USA Today*, and *The Wall Street Journal* at newsstands and hotel shops.

★ TIP

Avoid the high cost of imported newspapers by asking your hotel or condominium if they subscribe to *The New York Times* fax service, a digest of the day's news.

Culture & Customs

What to Expect

The Cayman Islands has a very American atmosphere; you'll feel at home instantly. Recognize, though, that there are some subtle cultural differ-

ences. With its long history of British rule, there is a slightly more formal atmosphere in personal relations – people are often introduced as Mr. or Ms. Also, as in most of the Caribbean, it's traditional to greet others with “Good morning” or “Good afternoon” and a smile rather than just launching into your question or request.

Language

English is the primary language in the Cayman Islands, and it is spoken with a unique lilt, one a little different from accents in other areas of the Caribbean. It's a reminder of the islands' earliest ancestors with Welsh, Scottish, and English heritage. You'll often hear Jamaican patois as well.



DID YOU KNOW?

Although English is the official language, you will quickly notice that it follows British, not American, spellings in words such as *colour*, *travelers*, *harbour* and *centre*.



Holidays

During public holidays, expect all government offices and most retail establishments to close.

The Real Cayman

Many visitors find that Cayman festivals present excellent opportunities to get to know the “real” Cayman Islands, apart from the glitz of Seven Mile Beach, branded properties like the Westin, Hyatt and the Ritz-Carlton, fast food restaurants, and its glamorous past as a set for the movie *The Firm*, starring Tom Cruise.

The festivals remind travelers that the Cayman Islands also has a real history and a culture all its own. With permanent settlement dating back to the early 1700s, the islands have long been home to a people who relied on the sea many years before tourism reached these shores. In those times, residents looked to the sea and to the island's indigenous plants for their diet, used the plants to create everything from rope to roofing material, and developed dances and music to celebrate when the work day was done.

Cuisine, Crafts & Carnival

Several attractions, restaurants, and tours throughout the islands remind visitors of the history of the islands – first named *Las Tortugas* by Christopher Columbus because of its large population of sea turtles. The marine creatures are still an important symbol of the islands. For years, turtling remained an important part of the Cayman economy. Today the best look at these creatures is at the **Cayman Turtle Farm** (☎ 345-949-3893, www.turtle.ky), the world's only such farm.

The turtle has also long played a part in the Cayman diet, and today turtle still shows up on the menus of many restaurants that feature Caymanian dishes. George Town's **Lobster Pot** (☎ 345-949-2736), **Benjamin's Roof Restaurant** (☎ 345-945-4080), the North Side Inn's **Red Ginger** (☎ 345-947-1431) and the elegant **Grand Old House** (☎ 345-949-9333) are a few of the restaurants that offer turtle entrées. For a more casual dining experience, eateries like George Town's **Billy's Place Restaurant** (☎ 345-949-0470) and **The Heritage Café** (Boggy Sand Road, West Bay, no phone) serve Caymanian dishes such as fish tea, conch stew, and oxtail.

Travelers who would like to experience a traditional Caymanian dinner in the privacy of their condominium or villa can hire a private caterer. On Grand Cayman, Burton Ebanks at **AA Catering** (☎ 345-949-7222 or 949-6598, aatours@candw.ky or chef@candw.ky) can prepare a traditional meal for visitors. The price for one to six adults (over the age of 12) is US \$181.25. Additional charges include the cost of groceries, a 15% service charge, and a shopping charge of US \$50. Visitors who are interested in learning how to cook Caymanian-style are welcome to watch the chef and learn preparation tips.

Caymanian dishes are also spotlighted at local festivals. The **Cayman Brac Cook-Off**, scheduled to take place in early June, features seafood, chicken, and dessert dishes. The public is invited to a barbecue and tasting sponsored by the Sister Islands Tourism Association and held at the Brac Reef Beach Resort. For more information, contact Steve Reily (☎ 345-948-1323, bracreef@candw.ky).

Pirates Week, in late October, is known for its swashbuckling fun, but the theme of Caymanian heritage is also emphasized during this festival. Reenactments of an old-time Caymanian wedding, thatch craft, and more have entertained and educated visitors at past festivals. Local foods, such as stewed conch, fish tea, and coconut rundown are served, and traditional quadrille dancing is highlighted. For more information, call ☎ 345-949-5078 or 5859, fax 345-949-5449, www.piratesweekfestival.com.

Two spring festivals also highlight heritage. In late April, the annual **Rotary Batabano Carnival** on Grand Cayman fills the island with carnival music including soca and calypso bands. Many Caymanian and Caribbean dishes tempt visitors. Travelers are welcome to bring their own costumes and partici-

pate in the parade, although only costumes designed and made in Cayman are eligible for judging. Contact Donna Myrie (☎ 345-945-5982) or Bonnie Anglin (☎ 345-914-2124).

Also in April, **Cayfest** is a national festival of the arts of the Cayman Islands. It includes theater, dance, painting, pottery, architecture, photography, and more. For more information, contact the **Cayman National Cultural Foundation** (☎ 345-949-5839).

Apart from the festivals, more and more travelers are seeking to find genuine Caymanian spirit in other ways. “We are seeing a trend toward people getting away from the heavily trafficked Seven Mile Beach to the other areas,” notes Nikki McCoy, public relations manager for the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism. “We’ve seen a growing interest to get away and get more of an island feel.”

An easy afternoon excursion east of George Town is to **Pedro St. James National Historic Site**. Remembered as the “Birthplace of Democracy” on these islands, this site witnessed the first vote to create a legislature of representatives. This historic building has been renovated and is now open to the public. The site is at the center of a 7.65-acre landscaped park atop the 30-foot Great Pedro Bluff. Today, the three-story greathouse is home to a 49-seat multimedia theater and a café.

Pedro St. James is the most famous but far from the only historic site on Grand Cayman. **Silver Thatch Excursions** (☎ 345-945-6588, fax 345-949-3342, silvert@hotmail.com) offers guided tours of the island to introduce travelers to the real Cayman Islands. “Let’s face it: Cayman has beautiful beaches, but there is more to a vacation (and life) than sitting on the beach. Besides, you can’t honestly say you’ve seen an island if you’ve only been ‘sitting on the

edge!” You’ve got to get out beyond the beach and see what we’re really about! Picturesque villages and gardens, beautiful roadside scenery and historic treasures are hidden in side roads waiting to be discovered,” according to Geddes Hislop.

For travelers interested in seeing the history of Grand Cayman, take the Silver Thatch Excursion called the **Eastern Experience** for a look at the Wreck of the Ten Sails Monument; Old Prospect, site of the first fort; and Bodden Town, for a walking tour to see early Caymanian architecture. A second historic tour starts with a walking tour of **West Bay**, including a stop at Old Homestead to learn more about early Cayman life. Travelers then head to George Town for a walking tour of the capital city and a visit to the site of Fort George and Elmslie Memorial Church, built by a shipwright, with a ceiling constructed to resemble a schooner’s hull. The tour continues on to Old Prospect and the Old Savannah Schoolhouse.

Reservations are required for all tours and must be made 24 hours ahead; reservations can be made by e-mail to silvert@hotmail.com. There is a minimum of two persons per tour; groups of four or more receive a 10% discount. Tours are commissionable to travel agents. Agents can hold 15% as a deposit and commission; clients can pay the balance in cash or travelers check directly to the tour. Along with guided tours, Geddes and his wife, Janet, also offer private tours at US \$40 per hour.

Specialty Tours

For travelers looking to combine Caymanian culture with watersports, it’s an easy order to fill with a little preplanning. “**Conching trips** are something more Caymanian and down home,” explains Nikki McCoy. The crew and guests dive and snorkel for

pink queen conch, a shellfish that's then prepared as an appetizer, sliced and marinated in lime juice, onion and seasonings.

On Little Cayman, **McCoy's Dive Lodge** (☎ 345-948-0026, 800-626-0496, www.mccoyslodge.com.ky) will arrange conching trips with advance notice for a minimum of two persons. Trips can be planned any day and in any season; cost is US \$25 per person.

On Grand Cayman, **Bayside Watersports** (☎ 345-949-1750) offers a full-day package from 9 am to 3 pm for US \$62.50. The package includes free transport and use of snorkel gear. Guests dive for conch (a six- to eight-foot dive), snorkel at Stingray City and the Coral Gardens, then enjoy a fresh fish lunch at Kaibo Beach near Rum Point. This trip is not offered daily, so prior arrangements are necessary.

Weddings

Getting married in the islands is a simple affair. Non-residents need a special **marriage license** granted by the Governor and once that license is obtained there is no residency period. A marriage license costs CI \$150, plus a stamp duty.

Grand Cayman

Just what makes Grand Cayman grand? Grand Cayman is, as the name suggests, the largest of the three Cayman Islands. This is true not only in terms of size, but also in the number of attractions it offers. The 76-square-mile island, approximately 22 miles long and eight miles at its widest point, is chock-full of luxurious hotels and condominiums, beach bars, fine restaurants, duty-free shops, and plenty of soft adventure ranging from sunset cruises to scuba diving with stingrays.

This is the center of Cayman's tourism industry, the destination of most travelers. Within the island, most vacationers head to **Seven Mile Beach**, home to the lion's share of hotels and condominiums. This legendary beach is one of the best in the Caribbean.

Offshore Banking

One of the first things you'll notice about Grand Cayman is its affluence. Don't look for beach vendors or hair braiders along Seven Mile Beach – they're prohibited in this nation. The Cayman Islands enjoy one of the highest standards of living in the hemisphere, so expect to see nice cars, well-maintained streets, and signs of prosperity.

Much of that affluence comes from its successful tourism industry, 70% of its national product. Most visitors arrive from the States, although which part of the US varies by time of year. During the winter season, many come from the East and Midwest; in hot summer months a great number of Texans and Southerners make their way to these islands, which are cooler than their own home states during that time.

Grand Cayman is the fifth-largest financial center in the world, with over 500 banks, so currency exchange and ATMs are not a problem.

Offshore financial services play an integral role in the islands' success as well. Grand Cayman has over 500 licensed banks (including 47 of the 50 largest banks worldwide). Banking secrecy laws passed in 1966 laid the groundwork for this profitable industry that today ranks the small island as the fifth largest financial center in the world, surpassed only by London, Tokyo, New York, and Hong Kong.

Offshore insurance companies are also a growing business. Nearly 400 offshore insurance or captive insurance companies make their base here (captive insurance companies are set up by a company or a trade association to serve its members or employees). Thanks to Cayman Islands' generous tax-free status, many other companies choose to incorporate in the islands; currently almost 30,000 companies are registered here.



A Cayman Bank Account

Just what is a Cayman bank account? Some are, as might be expected, multi-million-dollar accounts, while others are much smaller in scale. Both take advantage of the tax-free status and confidentiality laws. These laws protect all reputable transactions as a means for earning tax-free interest. You can open an account once the Caymanian bank receives a reference from your home banker, then you can deposit funds (in US dollars, if you like). Unlike some countries, there is no exchange control and your money can be moved in and out of the country freely and privately.

Because of the banking and offshore insurance industries, you'll notice that Grand Cayman has a different atmosphere than many other Caribbean islands. Here you'll find many returning guests, folks who are required by corporate charter to meet

several times a year on the island (what a tough break!). You'll meet many Americans who own property on Grand Cayman and live part of the year on the sunny isle. You'll also see many people combining a business trip with a few days of R&R.

But don't think that this is a suit-and-tie island; Grand Cayman is as laid-back as any other fun-in-the-sun site.

So where to start? If you arrive by air or cruise ship, you'll start off in George Town, the capital of the island and the center of its business, transportation and shopping industries. From George Town, most visitors head to Seven Mile Beach, the center of the tourism industry, filled with luxury hotels, condominiums, restaurants, dive operators, and more. 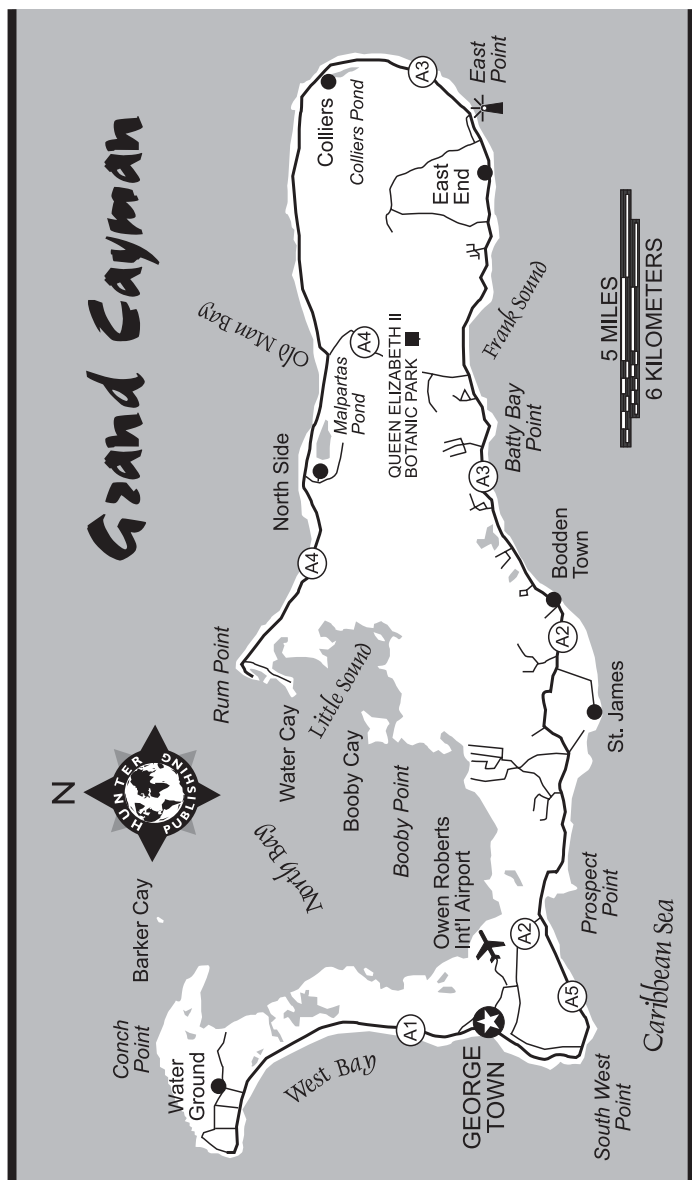
Getting Here



By Air

Lucky travelers arrive on Grand Cayman by day, which affords them the perfect chance to see the varying colors of the waters that surround the small island, an indication of the shallows and depths that tempt scuba divers and snorkelers. From the air you'll also see the North Sound, home of Stingray City, and the white sands of Seven Mile Beach. Take a deep breath – you're almost there.

Located near George Town, **Owen Roberts International Airport** is a modern facility that has recently enlarged its baggage claim and immigration areas.



★ TIP

Despite improvements, we still suggest scooting off the plane as fast as you can because lines at Immigration do back up.

Once you're through immigration and customs, you'll find a tourist board office near baggage claim. Here you can load up on brochures and maps plus two-for-one coupons for some of the restaurants.

★ TIP

At the tourist desk be sure to pick up a copy of the free *Key* or *Destination Cayman* magazines for information on shopping, dining, and nightly entertainment. *What to Do Cayman* and *What's Hot! in Cayman* also offer information on places of interest to visitors. And in case you didn't fly in on Cayman Airways, you can pick up a copy of their magazine, *Horizons*.

Step outside the airport to meet your ride or get a taxi to your hotel. Many car rental agencies are across the street.

Finding Your Hotel

Travelers bound for Seven Mile Beach will find that they're just minutes from their hotel after arriving at the airport. And if you're staying on the East End of the island, you'll be in for a quiet, leisurely drive (the traffic dies out once you leave George Town) and



the chance to unwind a little before hitting the beach.

The hotels of Seven Mile Beach are a 10-minute drive from the airport. Taxi fare runs about US \$4 per person, each way.



Getting Around

On Wheels

The low crime rate and excellent road system of the Cayman Islands encourage visitors to get out and explore. On each of the three Cayman Islands, attractions, beaches, small restaurants, and interesting sites are scattered, tempting vacationers to travel the countryside. Although taxi service is widespread on Grand Cayman, the easiest and most economical way for independent travelers to see the island is by rental car.

★ TIP

On Cayman (unlike some other Caribbean islands), we always rent a car. Why? Although rates aren't cheap, they are more economical than taxis if you will be exploring the island. With good roads, great weather, and safe conditions, there's no reason not to do some exploration. Don't limit yourself to one area of Grand Cayman; check out the entire island!

By Car

Car rentals begin at about US \$30 per day for a compact car; expect to pay US \$75-\$85 per day for a Jeep. Prices are lowest in summer months, rising during peak winter demand. Along with the rental fee, drivers will need to purchase a temporary driver's license. Licenses can be obtained by presenting a valid driver's license to the rental agency and paying the US \$7.50 fee. A major credit card or cash deposit is also required. Renters must be age 21 or over; some agencies require renters to be 25 years of age.

The selection varies with location, but the greatest choice of rental cars is found on Grand Cayman. Here, 4x4 vehicles are commonplace and many travelers enjoy driving around the island in the open-air vehicles. Air-conditioned sedans are also commonplace and often a better choice for families and those who want to secure their valuables while at the beach or in town. Most agencies feature American and Japanese models. Some offer unlimited mileage, free pick-up and drop-off, and free airport transfers.

Driving Tips

In true British tradition, traffic travels on the **left side** of the road. This can be confusing on your first day behind the wheel so start off a little slower than usual. Most cars are right-hand drive, so that will also necessitate a few adjustments (on our first excursion we turned on the windshield wipers every time we tried to give a turn signal!).

In George Town, keep an eye out for **one-way streets**, as well as pedestrians. Remember, many pedestrians, like you, are accustomed to cars being

on the right side of the road and may step out at the wrong time.

Watch for yellow lines in the road. These indicate **no parking** areas. Be sure to stop behind any bus; doors open out in the center of the road. Watch for speed limits and note that driving under the influence is a serious offense in the Cayman Islands.

The toughest driving is along Seven Mile Beach as it makes its way into George Town. This island has a real rush hour both mornings and evenings, so budget a little (make that a lot) of extra time during those peak periods. During the evening hours, drive especially carefully along this stretch as well. It is packed with pedestrians strolling from hotels to restaurants, as well as vacationers out and about in cars.

Rental Agencies

Many car rental agencies offer the seventh day free.

On Grand Cayman, rental agencies are found at the airport, just across the street from the terminal building. Many rental agencies are also located in George Town and adjacent to major hotels along Seven Mile Beach.

By Scooter

If you want to buzz around the island on a scooter, **Cayman Cycle** has rentals at Treasure Island Resort (☎ 345-949-8711), the Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman (☎ 345-949-1234, ext. 3050), and Coconut Plaza (☎ 345-945-4021). **Soto Scooters** (☎ 345-945-4465) at Soto's Plaza on Coconut Plaza also offers rentals. Scooter rental averages \$25 per day. A permit is required to drive a scooter, and riding experience is necessary.

By Bicycle

With its relatively flat grade, the Cayman Islands are a good destination for bicyclists. On Grand Cayman, however, note that along West Bay Road traffic can be extremely heavy during morning and evening rush hours. Prices vary, but average about \$12 per day for a 10-speed bike and \$14 for a mountain bike.

Check with **Cayman Cycle Rentals** at Treasure Island Resort (☎ 345-945-4021), Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman (☎ 345-949-1234, ext. 3050), and Coconut Plaza (☎ 345-945-4021); or **Soto Scooters and Car Rentals** (☎ 345-945-4652) at The Strand on West Bay Road.

By Taxi

We think taxis are a great way to get the general layout of the island. On our first visit to Grand Cayman, we hired a taxi for a half-day of touring. We were able to enjoy our look at the island without worrying about driving on the left side of the road; we also learned some insiders' tips that might have taken us years to pick up on our own.

Taxi rates are based on a maximum of three riders. The minimum fee is CI \$4 for the first mile, CI \$1.75



for each additional mile. Waiting time is charged at CI 75¢ per minute. Taxis can be found at most of the major hotels, down alongside the cruise terminal in George Town. They congregate beneath the shade trees, waiting for fares.



By Bus

Grand Cayman recently launched its first public transportation service, a response to the increasing traffic found along Seven Mile Beach. Today a new bus terminal on **Edward Street** (near the Public Library) in downtown George Town serves as the hub for 38 mini-buses. Fares range from CI \$1.50 to CI \$2.

Eight routes serve the island and include service to **West Bay** (the most frequent service, running every 15 minutes), **Bodden Town**, **East End** and **North Side** (once an hour). A bus also serves stops within **George Town**.

Look for blue license plates on these buses. For questions and schedules, ☎ 345-945-5100.

Exploring the Island

Guided Tours

Experienced tour operators offer an in-depth look at the islands. Guides can provide a general overview, as well as specialized tours focusing on eco-tourism, plants, history, birding, and shopping.

General island tours are offered by several companies. "Tours are personalized to give the visitor an opportunity to expand his or her knowledge of the Cayman Islands and its people," says Burton Ebanks, owner of AA Transportation Services on Grand Cayman. Overviews of the island range from

2½ hours to all day. Typical tours include a drive-through look at the capital city of George Town, a photo stop at the Conch Shell House (a private residence made of conch shells), a cruise along Seven Mile Beach, a tour of the Cayman Turtle Farm (the world's only such operation), and a visit to the community of Hell. Full-day tours include the same stops as a brief tour but also take a look at the less-visited east side of the island. Tours often drive through Bodden Town, visit the Pirate's Caves, stop for photos of the Blow Holes, and swing around to Rum Point, a popular watersports area overlooking the entrance to the North Sound.

"The attractions of the Cayman Islands are obvious and easy to find," points out Lisette Usborne, operations manager for Tropicana Tours Ltd. Nonetheless, guided tours still represent a valuable service even for those who might have a rental car during their stay. "Our tours encompass interesting details that the casual observer may not be privy to, fascinating facts and folklore about Cayman's colorful history."

An excellent operation on Grand Cayman is specially geared to travelers interested in eco-tourism. Geddes Hislop and his wife Janet are the founders of **Silver Thatch Excursions**, a company that focuses on the history and ecology of the island. Vacationers with an interest in botany can select from two excursions. Silver Thatch Excursions also offers specialized bird-watching trips, departing at 6 am on Saturdays, include stops at the Governor Michael Gore Bird Sanctuary, a haven for waterfowl, as well as Meagre Bay Pond, Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park, and the Willie Ebanks Farm to view endangered West Indian whistling ducks. We can highly recommend this knowledgeable company if you have an interest in eco-tourism or history.



Tour Companies

Guided tours are an excellent way for first-time visitors to get a good overview. Guided tours are available from most taxi drivers for about US \$37.50 for four persons per hour; you can also check with your hotel tour desk for possibilities. Orientation



Grand Cayman is an easy island to navigate and most travelers find that within a day or two they're ready to do a little exploring. Getting from A to B,

whether on foot, by taxi, or in your rental car, is easy.

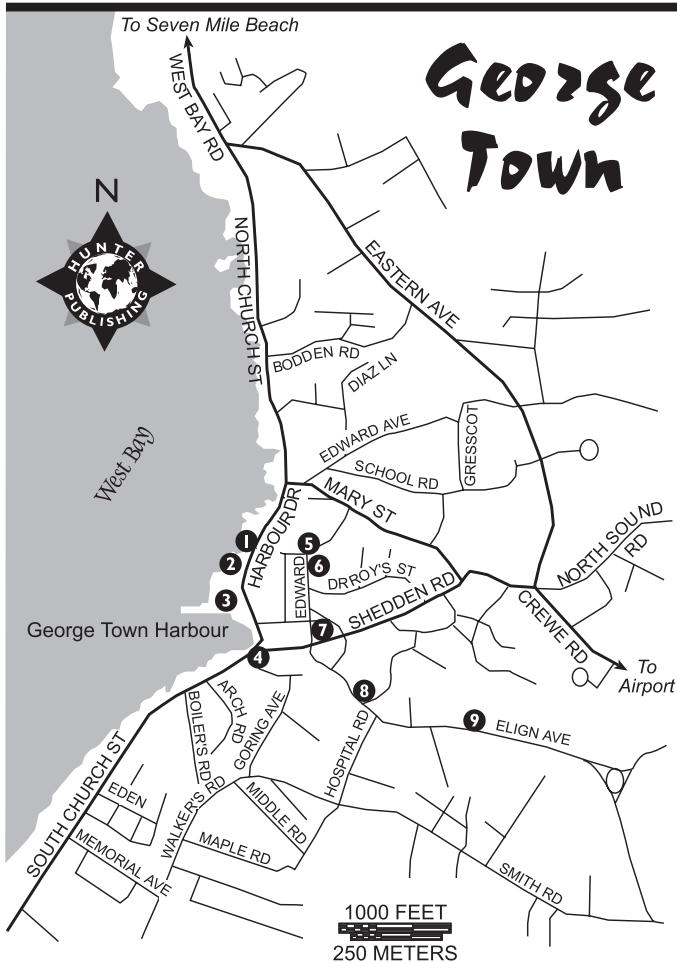
Good maps are available from the tourist board as well to help your discovery. The best way to get an overview on your first visit is an island tour (see above). Once you've got the lay of the land, you're ready for a more intense look at the people and places that make Grand Cayman such an international destination.

George Town

This is the hub of the island. To really know the island you've got to tear yourself away from the white sands of Seven Mile Beach (at least for a little while) and explore this community. As the capital of the Cayman Islands, it is home to over half of the 30,000 residents of Grand Cayman and the base for most of the business and government activity. Don't look for a bustling city, however; George Town is still very much an island community where you'll feel at home strolling the streets, eating at a seaside diner, and enjoying watersports just as you would in the resort areas of Seven Mile Beach.

George Town, on the island's southwest corner, faces west and overlooks **Hog Sty Bay** and the **George Town Harbour**, a busy port where on any given day you'll probably find cruise ships, as well as working vessels.

Much of the activity in George Town takes place along **North** and **South Church Streets**, which run north-south parallel to the shoreline. These roads face out to the harbor and are lined with duty-free shops, restaurants, and tourist-oriented businesses. The traffic light where South Church Street forks right onto **Shedden Road** or continues onto North Church Street (an intersection near the

cruise terminal) is the heart of town. Just north of the cruise terminal, you'll see the intersection of **Harbour Drive** and **Cardinal Avenue**. Cardinal Avenue is the home of many duty-free shops.

**DID YOU KNOW?**

The intersection of Harbour Drive and Cardinal Avenue was featured in *The Firm*. Avery, Gene Hackman's character, makes a call from a phone booth as Tom Cruise looks out and sees an Abanks Dive Lodge advertisement.

Just south of the intersection with Cardinal Avenue lies the Shedden Road. Shedden Road heads east and soon becomes **Crewe Road**, which intersects with **Owen Roberts Drive**, the road to the airport. If you don't take the Owen Roberts Drive fork but veer right, you can stay on Crewe Road and head to the eastern part of the island.

East of the shoreline, government buildings and banking centers carry on the work of the Cayman Islands, helping the nation hold its spot as one of the major monetary centers of the world. Farther east is the airport, on the edge of **North Sound**, the shallow body of water that divides George Town, Seven Mile Beach, and the West End from the less developed East End of the island.

South of town, South Church Street winds its way through elegant residential districts, lined with beautiful seaside homes and a few quiet businesses.

East End

East of George Town lies, predictably enough, the East End. One main road circles the entire East End, running east from George Town, tracing the shoreline as it snakes through small communities such as Bodden Town and Spotts. This road turns north at the end of the island and begins to trace the northern edge of the island, but you can take a shortcut halfway down the island on the **Frank Sound Road**, the route to the Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park. When it comes out on the north side, the road travels west to **Rum Point**, a popular destination with vacationers who arrive by ferry from Seven Mile Beach and enjoy a day of fun in the sun. South of Rum Point, **Cayman Kai** is a quiet residential area filled with beautiful, expensive homes. Rum Point and Cayman Kai look west across the vast, shallow North Sound.

Seven Mile Beach

Across the North Sound from Rum Point and Cayman Kai lies a long stretch of land that is the main destination for most Cayman Islands vacationers. This is Seven Mile Beach, which sprawls north of George Town, sandwiched between the sea and the North Sound. This narrow strip of land may be small but it's not short on accommodations and restaurants; this is the heart of vacationland. Here dive shops, watersports operators, beach bars, sports-wear shops, and fine restaurants stand shoulder to shoulder, separated by some fine-needed casuarina trees. They look out on a calm, baby-blue sea that covers some of the top scuba diving sites in the world.

North to south along Seven Mile Beach runs **West Bay Road**, the main thoroughfare and one that can

sometimes get downright crowded. Along this road you'll find the lion's share of Cayman's tourism business.

Along Seven Mile Beach, Grand Cayman narrows to a skinny stretch about a mile wide, bordered by the beach on the west and North Sound to the east. On its eastern edges, the sea forms a rugged boundary, at some points etching into the land with salt creeks and harbors. The largest harbor along this stretch of North Sound is **Governors Harbour**, where Governors Creek offers a maze of natural and man-made canals. Today it's lined with luxury lots and lavish homes, as well as the **Cayman Islands Yacht Club**.

West Bay

Finally, Seven Mile Beach ends in West Bay, the clump of land on the westernmost side of North Sound. This area is the home of the **Cayman Turtle Farm**, one of the most popular attractions with cruise tour operators and a great spot for families.

Traveling north from Seven Mile Beach along West Bay Road, the name of the road changes to **North West Point Road** and follows the coastline, becoming more and more residential. At the Cayman Turtle Farm, a less traveled road traces the far northern edge of this region, continually switching names along the route: **Boatswains Bay Road, King Road, Birch Tree Hill Road, Conch Point Road, Palmetto Point Road**. Traveling west, houses become fewer and fewer and the area gives way to a swampy habitat.

WATTLE & DAUB HOUSES

West Bay is home to many traditional Caymanian houses built of wattle and daub. The technique used ironwood posts to support walls woven with cabbagewood. The wood was then plastered over with daub, a mortar that includes burned coral. Making the daub was often a neighborhood activity since it was so labor-intensive. This style was sturdy and could withstand the hurricanes and tropical storms as well as rain and sun. The technique is no longer used.

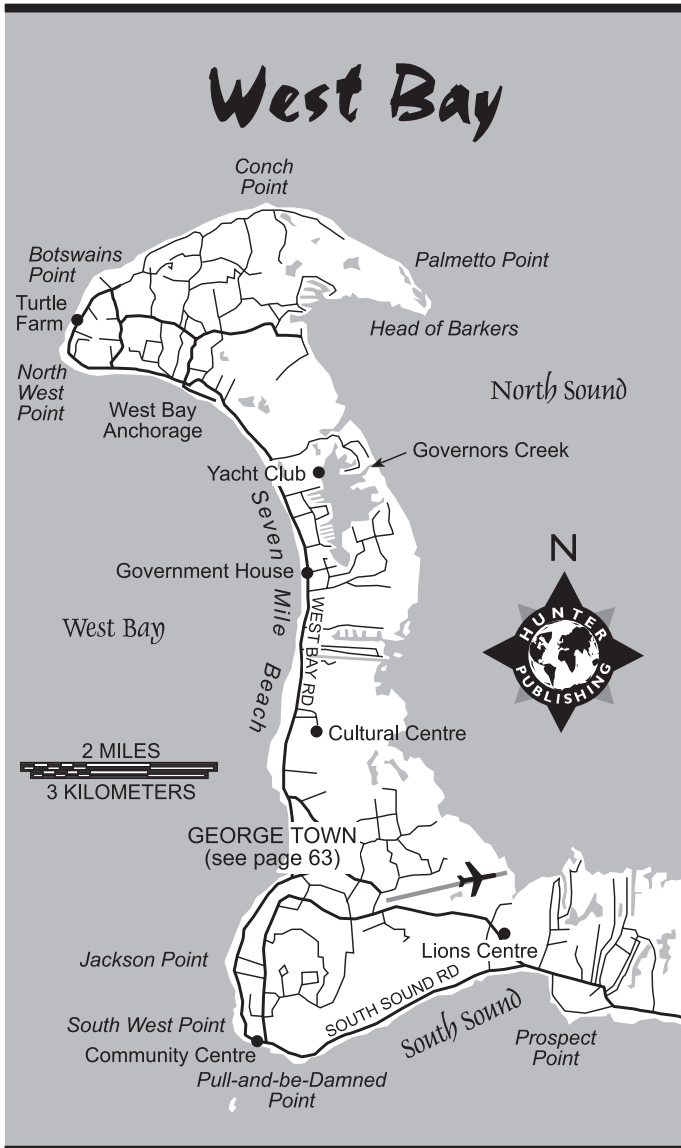
Or you can turn away from the coast and head to the inland area of West Bay and to a community called **Hell**, a popular stop on island tours. Follow Hell Road East onto **Reverend Blackman Road** and then **Batabano Road** to North Sound and the fishing community of Batabano. This is the home of **Morgans Harbour**, starting point for many deep-sea fishing cruises and some tours of Stingray City. It's not as glitzy as Seven Mile Beach, but offers an interesting look at the working side of Grand Cayman.



Best Places To Stay

The Cayman Islands offers over 2,300 hotel rooms and more than 2,100 condominium and villa units, most found on Grand Cayman. While some of these cater to a dive crowd seeking low-cost, no-frills accommodations, most properties on Grand Cayman are for a medium to upscale market.

Room prices vary greatly with type of accommodation, location, and time of year. High season (mid-



December through mid-April) brings prices about 40% higher than in summer months. Most accommodations are found along Seven Mile Beach. These are divided into properties on the west side, or beach side of the road and those on the east, which don't have direct access to the beach.

We love this property and have enjoyed visiting here many times, dating back to its days as a Radisson. A few years ago, the property underwent an extensive renovation and it's better than ever. Located two miles from George Town and about four miles from the airport, this convenient resort is set on a beautiful stretch of Seven Mile Beach. Swimmers and snorkelers can enjoy calm waters and a small coral reef just offshore or learn scuba diving. Dive trips can be booked through the on-site shop.

One point to notice about the Marriott is its shallow beach. Previous storms have robbed this stretch of the beach of much of its sand; although restorations have been ongoing, at press time the beach was still shallower than that found at many other locations along Seven Mile Beach. Nonetheless, guests find

there is plenty of room for sunning or resting under tall casuarina trees.

The Marriott is known for its guest rooms, the largest on the island. All have been recently renovated; 80% of the rooms feature king-sized beds. Ocean-front rooms include private balconies with good beach views and are worth the somewhat long walk to the elevators in this 315-room hotel. Facilities include casual and fine dining, pool and hot tub, dive shop, wave runners, windsurfing, shopping arcade, and full-service spa.

We've got fond memories of the old Holiday Inn: the huge tree and the funky beach bar, the Barefoot Man, the fun, family-oriented atmosphere. Alas, that hotel is no more, torn down to make way for an upcoming Ritz-Carlton. Fortunately, however, the Holiday Inn has been rebuilt and is now one of the newest hotels on Seven Mile Beach. Not as atmospheric as its old self, this hotel is across the street from the beach but still offers good bargains for families. The hotel is north of much of the traffic along Seven Mile Beach but you will need to cross the street to reach the sand. Rooms are standard Holiday Inn fare, with mini-bar, iron and ironing board, satellite TV, coffee maker, and hair dryer.

Recently the Holiday Inn instituted an all-inclusive pricing policy. The package includes all meals and beverages except for premium liquors; it also includes non-motorized watersports activities.

If you're looking for either a beach resort with a full range of amenities or a business hotel with plenty of free time options, this place fits the bill. This long-time favorite underwent an expansion a few years ago to offer rooms directly on Seven Mile Beach and to increase its watersports and recreational facilities.

The Hyatt has the atmosphere of a country club with the amenities of an island resort. The grounds are dotted with royal palms and ponds are filled with colorful koi. There's a freeform swimming pool, complete with bridges and pool bar. Blocks of guest rooms circle this central area; the hotel's Britannia Villas (see page 88) lie beyond, adjacent to the golf course. Shuttle service is available from the main house to the villas and spa.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Aquas Pool Bar in the original section of the resort was featured in *The Firm*. Remember when Jeanne Tripplehorn's character shows up on the island to surprise Avery (Gene Hackman)? She meets him here.

Families make up a growing portion of the hotel's business, thanks to the **Camp Hyatt** program, which features villa accommodations with kitchen facilities and the many recreational options. Golfers



appreciate the Britannia golf course. Many guest rooms overlook the course, designed by Jack Nicklaus, or the private marina. Standard rooms, each carpeted and featuring a soft Caribbean color scheme, include a mini-bar, satellite color television, coffee makers with complimentary coffee, electronic key card system, direct dial telephones with voice mail, in-room safe, ironing board, and hair dryer. Along with standard rooms, the property includes 50 one- , two- , three- , and four-bedroom villas and 10 bi-level suites. The **Britannia Villas** are especially popular with families and include all the hotel amenities except turndown service. A separate Regency Club offers 44 rooms that include complimentary continental breakfast, evening cocktails and hors d'oeuvres, concierge service, upgraded amenities and linens, and use of the Regency Club lounge.

During our last visit to the Hyatt we stayed at the beachfront addition. Several years ago, a \$15 million expansion added 53 beachfront suites on Seven Mile Beach. These suites have a separate living room that includes a dining area, wet bar, work station with two phone lines, and upgraded amenities. All suites have sea views, and these rooms are served by a dedicated concierge. The complex is highlighted by a landscaped pool complex with bronze sea turtle sculptures, waterfalls, and three freshwater pools with mosaic tile designs of stingrays and other marine life.

Red Sail Sports has opened a 2,000-square-foot state-of-the-art diving center as part of the beach addition. The center serves as Red Sail's main on-island training facility with dedicated classroom space, an on-site eight-foot training pool and locker room, as well as a retail shop that includes photo/video editing and developing facilities. Red Sail offers a range of watersports, including catamaran

cruises on two 65-foot vessels for dinner sails, cocktail cruises, and luncheon snorkel excursions to Stingray City. Dive boats run one- and two-tank trips, as well as night dives. Sea kayaking, Wave-Runners, waterskiing, parasailing, and underwater photography are also available, as well as deep-sea, bone, and reef fishing. The Hyatt also operates a ferry to Rum Point, on the northern point of the East End (see page 160).

For an additional fee, children aged three to 12 can take part in the **Camp Hyatt Grand Cayman** program, available daily during the summer months, Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas holidays and weekends year-round. Activities range from nature walks where you can spot the island's blue iguanas and parrots to turtle farm visits or shell painting. The 1,800-square-foot Caymanian-style Camp Hyatt House includes a playground, interactive computer games, and a big-screen TV for movie viewing. Some activities are free, for others there is an additional charge. The resort also offers cribs and baby-sitting services.

For travelers with an eye on the budget, Grand Cayman's Sunshine Suites Resort, which recently became part of the Wyndham family, provides hotel accommodations in the heart of Seven Mile Beach without the high price of beachfront hotels and condos. Across the street from the beach and adjacent to **The Links at SafeHaven** golf course, this all-suites hotel has a lot to offer cost-conscious travelers. This resort combines the atmosphere of a resort with the pricing of a motel. The hotel has few recreational features of its own but is surrounded by attractions within walking distance including golf and Seven Mile Beach. Sporting a Caribbean look with lemon-colored guest room blocks built around a central pool, the hotel has a casual and relaxed atmosphere. Sunshine Suites Resort is often quiet during the day as guests explore the island, enjoy the beach, or play a round of golf.

The hotel has 130 suites in three categories. For two persons, 38 studio suites offer one queen bed. Twenty-nine deluxe suites, for up to four guests, have two queen beds. The hotel also has 60 one-bedroom suites, each with a separate bedroom and a king-sized bed; the living room contains a queen-sized sofa sleeper. Rooms are decorated in bright Caribbean colors, and white tile floors lend a sunny look to the large suites. All include fully equipped kitchens with a coffee maker, complimentary coffee and tea, stovetop, all cooking and eating utensils, and a microwave. All rooms also include 34-channel cable TV, individually controlled air conditioning,

ceiling fans, and baths with aromatherapy products. Especially popular with families; children under age 12 stay free in parent's room with existing bedding. Cribs are also available.

Business travelers find several work-friendly features in the rooms, including dual dataports, a well-lit workspace, and private voice mail. The hotel includes a business center with photocopy, computer, and fax facilities. Other facilities include a guest laundry with coin-operated washers and dryers, safety deposit boxes, irons/ironing boards, and hair dryers.

Guests will find that a limited housekeeping plan is available. The plan includes full housekeeping service at the mid-point of a guest stay of four nights or more. Guests who stay seven nights or more receive full housekeeping service every three or four days. Towels and linens can be exchanged at any time.

On-site recreation includes a freshwater swimming pool with locked storage area for scuba gear; rinse tanks are available for washing wetsuits and equipment. The closest recreational facility is The Links at SafeHaven, adjacent to the hotel. Guests at Sunshine Suites have membership privileges here, and are offered a discounted rate at the 18-hole golf course.

The hotel is not on the beach; you must cross West Bay Road using a public beach access path directly across from the property. Beach towels and chairs are available at the front desk. Guests looking for more than a beach workout have complimentary unlimited access to the **World Gym** at the Harquail Bypass, about a 20-minute walk from the property. Also, hotel guests are offered a 15% discount at **Spa Espirit**, near Sunshine Suites in the adjacent The Falls Plaza; spa facilities at Spa Espirit include hair, skin, and body treatments. Discount rates for guests

are also offered at **Economy Car Rentals**, **Capt. Marvin's Snorkeling and Fishing**, and **Fisheye Dive**.

Sunshine Suites Resort does not have an on-site restaurant. **Eats Café** and **Legendz Bar** are in The Falls Plaza about 40 yards from the property. Built on a strip of beach bordered by willowy casuarina trees, the hotel offers 340 guest rooms, most with breathtaking views of the sea from step-out balconies. It has the feel of a conference property, with a slightly dress-up atmosphere in the main lobby. Facilities include beachfront, casual and fine dining restaurants, pools, whirlpools, fitness facilities, beauty salons, and a new spa.

This is also home to the **Westin Kids Club**. Upon check-in, children receive a Kids Club sports bottle



that can be filled with complimentary beverages at mealtimes. Young visitors also receive coloring books and bath toys; special amenities are available for infants. Parents receive safety kits with adhesive bandages, electrical outlet covers, identification bracelets, and a list of local emergency phone numbers. Jogging strollers are available upon request at no additional cost. Whenever possible, guest rooms are set up in advance with high chairs, cribs and other items as appropriate.

Just south of George Town, Sunset House is a favorite with divers. Just offshore lie both the reef and several shipwrecks, making this a virtual playground for those interested in underwater adventure.

There's nothing fancy about Sunset House – it's designed for those whose major portion of time is spent in the water, not necessarily on land. Guest rooms include standard accommodations overlooking the courtyard and deluxe rooms with ocean or garden views. Two suites are also available.

Divers and those who want to learn can utilize the full-service dive operation, which offers resort courses, certification courses, check-out dives, and advanced instruction. When you're suited up and ready to go, it's just a matter of stepping off the shore ladder and into the aqua-playground. For more distant dives, six custom boats take underwater enthusiasts

on two-tank dives around the island, while *Manta*, a catamaran, takes experienced divers on all-day, three-tank dives. Facilities at this 59-room resort include a restaurant featuring local and continental cuisine, gift shop, oceanfront bar, freshwater swimming pool and hot tub, full-service dive shop, six dive boats, and the Cathy Church Underwater Photo Centre, which offers half-day to full-week courses (see page 137).

Dive sites include No Name Wall, Chinese Wall, Lemon Drop-Off, Grand Canyon, The Pinnacles, and more, each offering divers a peek at an undersea world filled with marine life, fascinating formations, and beautiful corals. All rooms offer air conditioning, private balcony or patio and satellite TV. Amenities include **The Spanish Main Restaurant** and **Calico Jack's Poolside Bar**, as well as a private beach, freshwater pool, Jacuzzi, and dock.

Included in the price are meals and beverages (well drinks only, no wine or champagne), use of sightseeing cars on a shared basis, bicycle, introductory scuba and snorkeling lessons, unlimited scuba diving from shore for certified divers (including tanks

and weight belt), boat dive (usually a two-tank dive), airport transfers, and all taxes and gratuities.

Condominiums & Villas

When it comes to condominiums and villas, there's one word to describe the current state of business: booming. New projects are dotting the islands. Travelers can now choose from a great number of condominiums, villas, and guest houses, whether they're headed to the islands for diving, honeymooning, or just some R&R.

For those in search of a little elbow room, the villas of the Cayman Islands just might fit the bill. Along with traditional hotels, the island offers families, or anyone looking for more space, a large inventory of villas. These range from spacious condominium units to timeshares or private houses.

Amenities at condominiums vary with price. You can expect a microwave, dishwasher, washer/dryer, cable TV, and central air at most properties. Others will include private swimming pools, hot tubs, and more. A few properties offer honeymoon, golf, dive, and escape packages. In the last few years, there has been a real trend toward super-luxurious condominiums on this island. "More and more private houses and exclusive (super deluxe) condos are being built," notes Penny Cumber, managing director for **Cayman Villas** (see below for contact information). "Both houses and condos are becoming more deluxe, and many have a private pool, some with Jacuzzi and gym."

Villas and condominiums appeal to many types of vacationers. Penny Cumber says that the properties are especially favored by "honeymooners, who opt for the quiet private houses and condos; families with young children (houses/condos all one level and

ground floor); families with older children (houses within walking distance of watersports); family reunions or a large gathering of friends (seeking condos/houses close by); wedding parties with guests in nearby villas; and couples celebrating special occasions.”

Best Places To Eat

After a day of activity, whether that meant shopping for Rolexes or diving tropical reefs, many travelers look forward to sipping Dom Perignon and enjoying a meal prepared by a Cordon Bleu-trained chef as the evening's entertainment. Fine dining is very much a part of the Cayman experience and an important nightlife option. Casual dining and restaurants featuring Caribbean cuisines are other possibilities. Caymanian cuisine reflects the riches of the sea. With residents and visitors from around the world, however, the Cayman Islands also offer many types of cuisine, especially on Grand Cayman.

In the restaurant department, Grand Cayman has definitely got something for everyone, whether your tastes run to fresh island seafood or cuisines from around the world. Some of the island's restaurants have received many accolades over the last few years, gaining quite a following among those who frequent the island; others are new on the scene. Some are especially suited to couples looking for a

special night out; others welcome families seeking dishes to please even the pickiest eater in the group.

Traditional Caymanian Foods

- ◆ **Turtle:** brought to the table in the form of soup, stew, or steak.
- ◆ **Conch:** a versatile dish as an appetizer in the form of fritters, soup prepared as a chowder or thick with onions and spices as a stew, or even uncooked, marinated in lime juice as ceviche.
- ◆ **Pepperpot soup:** a savory soup made with greens and potatoes.
- ◆ **Fish rundown:** fish simmered in coconut milk with breadfruit and cassava (the source of tapioca).

Favorite Caribbean Dishes

The influences of nearby Jamaica are seen on island menus as well, especially in the jerk seasoning that ignites fish, chicken, and other meats. Menu items might include:

- ◆ **Rice and peas:** rice and red beans cooked in coconut milk.
- ◆ **Jerk:** Spicy barbecued fish, chicken, goat, or beef; spiced with Scotch bonnet pepper, nutmeg, allspice, and more and cooked over pimento wood.
- ◆ **Breadfruit:** Similar in taste to a potato, and served in as many ways.
- ◆ **Fish tea:** A broth-like soup.
- ◆ **Johnny cake:** Fried bread.
- ◆ **Patty:** A meat pie that's a Caribbean standard as popular as an American hamburger.
- ◆ **Pumpkin soup:** Made with Caribbean pumpkins, which are not sweet.

- ◆ **Saltfish:** Dried and salted codfish.
- ◆ **Ackee:** A fruit that tastes somewhat like scrambled eggs and, for breakfast, is served with saltfish.

Price Scale

Typically, you should expect to pay about US \$45-75 per person for a three-course meal with wine in one of the island's finest restaurants. Travelers should expect to spend about US \$6-10 for a casual lunch or dinner. Fast-food lunches or snacks can be obtained for about US \$3-7 per person. Price estimates given below are per person, in US dollars.

We selected a table upstairs with a great view of the water and the city's lights. Other tables are on small decks out on the ironshore seaside; one large table is in a gazebo perched over the water. (If you get this table, however, be warned that you'll have lots of company when it comes tarpon feeding time!) You'll find a full menu of Caymanian options from lobster to coconut shrimp to turtle.

Menu selections include glazed swordfish, roast pork tenderloin, and filet mignon. Be sure to order the Caesar salad, prepared tableside. Reservations are suggested. The dress is casually elegant.

The Grand Old House is indeed both grand and old, dating back to 1908 when it was built by a merchant and lawyer from Boston. Once surrounded by a coconut plantation, the house was used for entertaining and lavish parties in its early days; later the structure became a hospital for soldiers wounded in World War II and a storm shelter during hurricanes. Today the home showcases the work of Chef Kandathil Mathai, who has cooked for Prince Charles, Princess Diana, Margaret Thatcher, Princess Anne and the Reagan family. The menu includes entrées such as tenderloin of black Angus beef; New Zealand baby rack of lamb; pork Zurichoise with mushrooms, Chardonnay cream sauce and roasted potatoes; baked filet of dolphin; and potato-crusting tuna.

House specialties are lobster tail sautéed with shallots, mushrooms, fresh tomatoes and beurre blanc; baked shrimp "Grand Old House," cooked with fresh local herbs, white wine, and served with hollandaise sauce; turtle steak Cayman-style; pan-fried crispy

duck breast flamed in Cointreau accompanied by a gâteau of sweet potato; and Wiener schnitzel with spätzle and red cabbage. The dishes are accompanied by an extensive wine list. So we set out walking. Strolling up Boggy Sand Road, one of the prettiest streets on Grand Cayman, we found The Heritage Café and our problem of kill-

ing an hour was solved. This blue building houses a kitchen that produces some of the most genuine Caymanian dishes found on the island. Grab a picnic table and order kingfish, fish tea, and other local favorites. The hours here are limited: Fridays, 2 pm to 2 am; Saturday, 9 am to 1 am; and Sunday, 9 am to 4 pm. Ultra-casual.

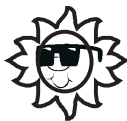

Table service to the beachside picnic tables makes this an enjoyable way to lunch on a relaxing Rum Point day. You won't find table service on Saturdays, when the grill serves an island buffet with everything from jerk chicken to plantains. The buffet lunch costs CI \$12 including jerk chicken, ribs, rice and peas. The Barefoot Man entertains here from 3 to 6 pm on Saturdays, so grab a table close to the bandstand.

Sunup To Sundown



The Cayman Islands has long been synonymous with scuba diving, but this destination also presents plenty of other types of fun in the sun. However you may define soft adventure – walking, birding, golf, hiking, snorkeling, bicycling, fishing, or horseback riding – Grand Cayman offers professional assistance, rental facilities, and even instruction for those new to the sport.

If you're looking for something more in the spectator realm, you'll find that too. Take a ride on a real submarine, tour the turtle farm, shop until you drop, stroll a verdant botanical garden, or explore historic districts. The choices are enough to satisfy any visitor.



DID YOU KNOW?

The **Cayman Islands Watersports Operators Association (CIWOA)** estimates that about one third of all overnight visitors are scuba divers and about 80% enjoy some form of watersports during their stay. About a quarter of all cruise ship passengers to the Cayman Islands partake in watersports.



In & On The Water

The Cayman Islands are universally recognized as a top **dive destination**. Since 1957, with the founding of the Caribbean's first dive operation on Grand Cayman, these islands have caught the attention of the diving world. Bob Soto established this first Cayman dive operation and today over 40 dive operators provide service on the three islands.

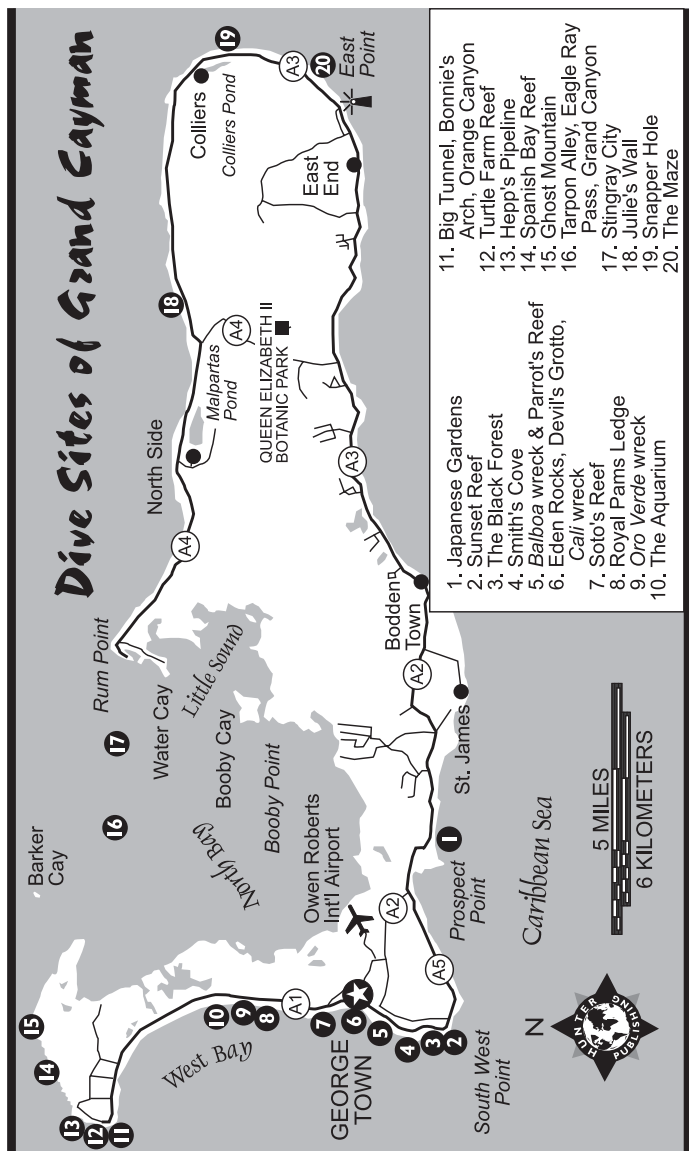
Although these islands are tops in the scuba world, non-divers will find plenty of activity both in and out of water. **Snorkeling** is a popular pastime and an excellent way to enjoy the area's marine wonders.

The fish seen in these waters also attract anglers from around the globe. Visitors can participate in a **deep-sea charter** or try their luck with **reef** or **bonefishing**. Bonefishing guides are found on each of the three islands.

WHY IS CAYMAN SO POPULAR?

- ❖ Dive sites start close to shore in shallow water (25 to 60 feet).

Sailing excursions, from rollicking “pirate” cruises to tranquil sunset sails, are popular on Grand Cayman. Most include hotel pickup. Do-it-yourselfers can also rent watercraft, including Hobie cats, Wave-

Runners, and Sunfish. **Windsurfers** generally head out to either Seven Mile Beach or Grand Cayman's East End, considered the most challenging for advanced windsurfers. And for those who want to glide along but let someone else do the work, **parasailing** operators are found along most of Seven Mile Beach.

Scuba Diving

Even among the “been there, done that” scuba crowd, Grand Cayman is a winner. Travelers lucky enough to visit the island will find a wealth of dive sites.

Over 200 sites lure divers of all abilities, from beginners looking for shore excursions and shallow reef dives to advanced divers looking for wreck and cave explorations. You can get professional assistance from dive operators on each of the three islands, including resort courses where you'll have the op-

portunity to sample diving after a one-day course. Full certification courses will award you a “C” card, and advanced courses teach you the use of scuba computers, the skills of drift diving, and even underwater photography. Grand Cayman offers approximately 130 dive spots, many less than a half-mile from shore. The island is surrounded by approximately 60 miles of dropoffs. One of the most popular shallow dive sites is **Stingray City** on the North Sound; this 12-foot dive is memorable for the southern Atlantic stingrays that divers and snorkelers can hand-feed. Incredible visibility, measured at 100 to 150 feet, helps make these islands such spectacular dive destinations. With year-round water temperatures of 77° to 83°, visitors can dive comfortably and enjoy an underwater playground that’s filled with marine life.

An excellent source of information on Cayman diving is the Dive Cayman website (www.divecayman.ky) operated by the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism. Here you’ll find links to local dive operators, information on dive sites, and details of upcoming special events aimed at divers. You can also sign up to receive a free e-mail newsletter with Cayman diving news.

Dive Operators

Grand Cayman is one of the world’s top dive destinations so, predictably enough, you’ll find a long list of expert dive operators from which to choose. Many dive shops will pick you up in complimentary shuttles; check with operators for transportation arrangements.

Dive & Snorkel Sites

George Town

The bay at George Town has a wealth of good dive sites, all easy to reach.

THE BLACK FOREST

Beautiful black coral and waving gorgonians make this site indeed seem like the Black Forest. Located at 60 to 100 feet, this wall dive is just off the South West Point. It is not accessible as a shore dive.

EDEN ROCKS & DEVIL'S GROTTO

Eden Rock Dive Shop on South Church Road is the entry point for one of George Town's most popular dive sites. Eden Rock and the Devil's Grotto, about 150 yards from the shore, are shallow dives. Both are a labyrinth of grottos running out from the shore. Eden Rock is popular not only with divers but also with snorkelers who enjoy the easy entrance and a view of the tunnels and often large tarpon.

Eden Rock and Devil's Grotto have a depth of 30-50 feet.

JAPANESE GARDENS

This dive lies 30 to 60 feet below the surface off the reef at South Sound, just east of George Town, and is often recommended for beginning divers. Like a little bonsai forest, the area is dotted with staghorn corals and is a good site for underwater photographers.

PARROT'S REEF

Parrot's Reef and nearby Sunset Reef (see below) are just yards from shore. Parrot's Reef has a depth of 30-60 feet.

SMITHS COVE

Although often considered a snorkel site only, Smiths Cove on South Church Street just south of George Town is an easy shore dive as well. The reef starts a few feet from the surface and divers can also explore the West Wall from here.

SOTO'S REEF

Offshore from Soto's Dive Center, this shallow site is also popular with snorkelers.

SUNSET REEF

Just offshore from the Sunset House Resort, this site is a popular stop for divers wanting to do some underwater photography.

THE WRECK OF THE BALBOA

The hurricane of 1932 accounted for the wreck of this freighter, which today lies 25 to 40 feet below the surface. Some of the ship is still intact, although parts of it were blown away to clear the traffic channel. This is a popular night dive, offering a manageable depth (during daytime hours, this site sits right in the George Town Harbour waterway, making it too busy). Rich with marine life from corals to spon-

ges to brilliant parrotfish, this is one of Grand Cayman's top dive sites.

WRECK OF THE CALI

One of the top snorkel destinations is the wreck of the *Cali*. Located a short swim from Calico Jack's in just 20 feet of water about 100 feet offshore, this wreck is a good opportunity for snorkelers to view a wreck site, an experience usually reserved for advanced scuba divers. Save the *Cali* for your departure day when you can't scuba dive. Sitting in just over 20 feet of water; it's a great snorkel experience and a good way to finish off your Cayman vacation.

SMITHS COVE

Although often considered a snorkel site, Smiths Cove, off South Church Street just south of George Town, is an easy shore dive as well. The reef starts just a few feet from the surface and divers can also explore the West Wall from this location. Snorkelers will find another good spot just south of Smiths Cove Park, along South Church street. This free park has good snorkeling among the rocks on its north side; covered picnic tables and plenty of shade make this a popular lunch site as well.

The Eden Rocks spot is also frequented by snorkelers. Another favorite is Soto's Reef, sometimes called Passion Reef; it's behind Soto's Dive Shop (below the Lobster Pot restaurant on North Church Street).

East End

EAGLE RAY PASS

East of Tarpon Alley and across from the main channel into the North Sound, Eagle Ray Pass is named for the rays that are often sighted here. At 40 to 100 feet, this wall dive appeals to divers of varying skill levels.

GRAND CANYON

Near the Sandbar west of Rum Point, this 80- to 110-foot wall dive is for intermediate and advanced divers.

JULIE'S WALL

This dive site lies to the east of the place where Frank Sound Road intersects with the main road. It is 60 to 100 feet below the surface. An intermediate level dive, the wall is home to black coral formations and rays are often spotted here.

THE MAZE

This is a honeycomb of tunnels that form a veritable maze. It's on the South Channel, not far from the Wreck of Ten Sails. This site is 60 to 100 feet below, and is best dived by intermediate and advanced divers as some of the passages lead much deeper.

SNAPPER HOLE

A 30- to 60-foot dive, this is a favorite with beginners but still offers tunnels, plenty of marine life, and even an anchor from an 1872 shipwreck. The site is on the East End outside the reef that forms Colliers Bay.

TARPON ALLEY

This wall dive of 60 to 100 feet is near Stingray City, just outside North Sound. A favorite with underwater photographers, this site has dropoffs, canyons, and, of course, huge schools of shiny tarpon.

STINGRAY CITY

Just about anyone who has ever heard of the Cayman Islands has heard of Stingray City. This is the top watersports attraction in the Cayman Islands. Here, in the mouth of North Sound about halfway between the West Bay and Rum Point, fishermen once cleaned their catch, attracting large Southern Atlantic stingrays. These creatures have become ac-

customed to being handled by participants in daily snorkeling excursions.

FEEDING STINGRAYS

Don't miss the chance to feed the rays some squid. Just pinch the squid between your fingers, arch your fingers back like you're about to slap someone, and put your hand down in the water: the greedy stingrays will do the rest. If you don't arch your fingers back, the rays might suck up your fingers and give you a little scare. They don't have teeth, but their lips are a firm cartilage that will give you a jolt.

Typically about 30 stingrays frequent the area so you're just about guaranteed the opportunity to pet and swim alongside these beautiful creatures.

After feeding the stingrays, most operators then take snorkelers over to Coral Gardens, a beautiful snorkel area with several large coral heads, fans, and abundant marine life.

Stingray City is visited by many watersports operators, who offer half- and full-day excursions that include stops at both deep and shallow spots. Operators depart from all areas of the island for this adventure. The site is now one of the most popular in the Caribbean. Often called "the world's best 12-foot dive," it can be equally enjoyed by both snorkelers and scuba divers. Truly, this is one experience not to be missed. We have done the Stingray City experience several times using different operators and have never left disappointed. Nothing can quite prepare you for the experience of petting, feeding, and being caressed by the stingrays. The trip out on the

North Sound to the site is quick and scenic. After mooring, some vacationers are a little cautious about heading into the waters (the stingrays are far less shy), but we've noticed that all but the most nervous swimmer enjoys this experience.

On the shallow stop, The Sandbar, visitors stand (as still as possible to prevent kicking up sand and lowering visibility), while the stingrays swoop by, often brushing participants like some large rubbery Frisbee. Operators begin the feeding and, as visitors become more comfortable with the process, they are allowed to feed and even hold the large rays. Trips cost about US \$45 per person and typically include three stops. The deepest is Stingray City at about 12 feet, followed by the shallower Sandbar, about three feet deep.

 TIP

Bring along an old T-shirt to wear on the Stingray City snorkel excursions. Your back is exposed to a lot of sun during this trip and, with the coolness of the water and your excitement over the stingrays, you may not notice you are getting a bad burn. Pack plenty of sunscreen as well.

West Bay

The West Bay, just north of Seven Mile Beach, has many good dive sites. These locations are also very easy to reach for those staying on Seven Mile Beach.

BIG TUNNEL

Swim-throughs and canyons and a depth of 60 to 100 feet make this a favorite with intermediate and

advanced divers. Located off the North West Point (close to Bonnie's Arch and the Orange Canyon).

BONNIE'S ARCH

Just off North West Point, this 50- to 70-foot dive is a great place for photos because of its arch formation, covered with corals and sponges. Good for beginners, the dive offers even more than the spectacular arch, with many types of marine life, from tarpon to tangs.

GHOST MOUNTAIN

At North Point, West Bay, you will see a large coral pinnacle, its base lying on a sand slope at a depth of 140 feet. Large schools of jacks swim in and out of the cave at the base of the pinnacle. This intermediate to advanced wall dive is 70 to 100 feet below the surface.

HEPP'S PIPELINE

A 30- to 60-foot dive for beginners/intermediate divers not far from the Cayman Turtle Farm. It has two mini-walls and can be a shore dive.

ORANGE CANYON

A 60- to 100-foot dive, this one is favored by intermediate and advanced levels. Named for its orange elephant ear sponges, the wall is painted with color. Located near Bonnie's Arch.

SPANISH BAY REEF

You can walk right out to this shallow reef dive (30 to 60 feet) near Spanish Bay Reef Resort. This site is also good for snorkeling (although the waters can be rough in this area).

TRINITY CAVES

This dive in West Bay is down 40 to 100 feet. Beginners can enjoy a look at spectacular corals and fans, while intermediate and advanced divers can enter

the three channels that wind their way to a wall where larger marine species might be spotted.

TURTLE FARM REEF

Just east of the turtle farm, a short swim from the shore, this site offers a steep mini-wall rising from a 60-foot sand bottom. You can do this as a shore dive or enjoy the site as a snorkeler.

WARNING!

Touching coral causes the organism to die.

Seven Mile Beach

Seven Mile Beach has several good dive sites, although many boats head out from here with divers for sites in George Town or other areas of the island.

THE AQUARIUM

With a name like The Aquarium, this 30- to 50-foot dive has to be good. Look for a wide variety of fish on this dive off the upper end of Seven Mile Beach. Goatfish, snapper, parrotfish, and more await on this beginner-level dive.

ROYAL PALMS LEDGE

This site, just offshore from the Marriott, goes to a depth of about 50 feet. There's a tunnel that's a favorite with divers.

WRECK OF THE ORO VERDE

About a half-mile off the beach at the site of the former Holiday Inn (soon to be home of a new Ritz-Carlton; see page 153), the *Oro Verde* is a favorite wreck for novice divers because of its shallow position (25 to 50 feet). The ship was used by drug smugglers and in 1980 was scuttled. Today the gold lies in

its rich marine life; the high that divers get from the myriad colors is a completely legal one.



Specialty Excursions

SASY

If you would like to introduce your children to the joys of scuba diving, Cayman is the place. Thanks to a new program operated by Red Sail Sports, children as young as four can now have a taste of scuba diving. SASY, or **Supplied Air Snorkeling for Youths**, is a scuba unit customized for young bodies. Developed in the Cayman Islands by Capt. Wayne Hasson, a father of two young children, the unit combines a regulator so young divers can breathe from a continuous air supply and a buoyancy compensator to keep children floating safely near the surface. Units are available for use at Red Sail Sports (www.redsail.com) locations at the Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman, Westin Casuarina Resort and Marriott Grand Cayman. “Grand Cayman is the perfect place for kids to learn to use SASY,” explains Red Sail Sports Operations Manager Rod McDowell. “The waters here are clear and calm, and there’s a lot for them to see. Parents can now take their children along on a dive boat, and together the whole family can explore our underwater world.”

Lunch & Snorkel Trips

Although these islands are world famous for their diving, many attractions can be enjoyed in water just a few feet deep with a mask and snorkel.

Only yards from shore, even first-time snorkelers can enjoy a look at colorful corals, graceful fans, and fish that include friendly sergeant majors, butterfly fish, and shy damselfish. And travelers shouldn’t feel that wreck diving is for scuba divers only. The

wreck of the *Cali* is in shallow water and is an easy snorkel trip (see above).

Snorkel excursions are also offered by many dive operators, the most popular being the excursion to Stingray City. Typically these trips include drinks and often lunch following the snorkeling adventure. Complimentary shuttle services are available from some hotels and condominiums.



DID YOU KNOW?

Operators will supply snorkels, masks and fins but you don't really need fins for the snorkel excursions. If you are not an experienced snorkeler, fins can be tough to control and you'll run the risk of kicking (and thereby killing) coral formations.

The snorkel excursions on Grand Cayman cover a small area and you can float and admire the marine life without worrying about having to swim hard and keep up with a group.

Conching Dives

Backside Watersports (☎ 345-949-1750) offers a full-day package from 9 am to 3 pm for US \$62.50. The package includes free transport and use of snorkel gear. Guests dive for conch (a six- to eight-foot dive), snorkel at Stingray City and the Coral Gardens, then enjoy a fresh fish lunch at Kaibo Beach

near Rum Point. This trip is not offered daily so prior arrangements are necessary.

NORTH SOUND BEACH

To learn more about Caymanian life, a North Sound Beach lunch and snorkeling trip is offered by several operators. Trips include snorkeling at either **Stingray City** or the **Sandbar** (depending on visibility and water conditions) and the **Coral Gardens**, plus lunch Cayman-style. The crew dives for pink queen conch, a shellfish that's then prepared as an appetizer, sliced and marinated in lime juice, onion and seasonings like ceviche. Everyone goes on shore at Cayman Kai for a Caymanian lunch of peas and rice, potato or breadfruit salad, and local fish or spicy chicken. Part of the fun is talking with the captain and crew about Caymanian life. These trips cost \$50 per person and run from 9 am to 3 or 4 pm.

Underwater Photography

With its clear waters, bountiful marine life, and docile rays at Stingray City, Grand Cayman draws many beginning and advanced underwater photographers. "Considering the ease of travel from the US, the abundance of friendly fish and photogenic walls, photo-friendly boats, and calm, warm, clear

water, the Cayman Islands is the best photo destination in the Caribbean,” says Cathy Church.

The center offers an array of underwater photo classes aimed at all levels of photographers. The most extensive offering is the **Cathy Church Super Course**, an eight-day class. Church has taught the course for over 25 years and limits the class size to only 14 students per session.

Students stay at Sunset House (☎ 888-854-4767, www.sunsethouse.com), a 59-room hotel near George Town. The fee includes tuition, three dinners, three lunches, use of Nikonos and Sea & Sea lenses, and more. The class can also be taken by travelers staying elsewhere on the island. For those interested in a shorter course, instructors at Cathy Church’s Photo Centre offer a half-day class, which includes about 90 minutes of classroom instruction followed by a shore dive. Morning classes can be arranged for two or more students; this class now covers digital photography, as well as traditional film. The half-day class is commissionable to travel agents at 15% for groups of four or more taking the same type of class together.

Other options include snorkel photo classes for families, snorkel photo classes for other types of travelers, and digital classes. Also, private classes with Cathy Church are available for any level of photographer. When Church is not in Cayman, private tutoring is available with one of the center’s instructors.

In operation over 15 years, “We cater to small groups of divers on our boats so you won’t be diving in a crowd,” explains Fisheye’s Rebecca Clarke. “Seasoned veterans and new divers are given the care that they need so that everyone has the best time possible. We even set up your gear and switch tanks between dives so that you can relax and enjoy your vacation.”

Fisheye offers several services, from instruction to rentals. “We offer instruction and rentals of Nikonos, Sea & Sea, and underwater video equipment. Our award-winning set of three Nikonos instructional video tapes, produced by Martin Sutton and Susan Abbott, are available here in the shop and by mail-order,” notes Clarke. “Every Nikonos underwater student we teach watches these tapes as part of our high-quality photography course. Our guests are invited to take along one of our easy-to-use Sea & Sea underwater cameras for just the cost of a roll of film. We also sell Nikonos, Sea & Sea, and Ikelite underwater photo equipment.”

Along with rentals, Fisheye of Cayman offers a variety of photo classes, starting with “Intro to Underwater Photography,” a class available any day of the year. The class begins with a two-hour lecture covering equipment and basic techniques; students then take a one-tank boat dive to shoot a roll of film. After processing, a critique session follows. The class includes all equipment and a roll of either slide or print film without processing. For more advanced students, the Underwater Photo Certification Class

is available; this class includes a two-tank dive and certification as a PADI underwater photographer.

For more serious underwater photographers, the “Underwater Photo Master Class” covers basic instruction in macro and wide angle photography. The class includes six boat dives, three rolls of film, and use of photo equipment; PADI certification as an Underwater Photographer is also included.

Travelers who would like instruction in particular areas can select the “Suit Yourself Class.” The class includes a one-tank boat dive and can be customized to a client’s needs, whether that’s learning about camera housing, specific photography techniques, or composition.

At Fisheye of Cayman, photo courses that are reserved and paid for in advance by a travel agent are commissionable to the agent at a rate of 10%. Full payment is required 30 days prior to arrival. No refunds are offered for cancellations received less than 30 days prior to arrival, and since no refunds are offered for diving lost due to inclement weather, “we strongly suggest that clients purchase trip insurance,” says Clarke.

Sailing

Sailing excursions are another popular way to enjoy the islands. Charters, sunset cruises, booze cruises, and rollicking “pirate” cruises are offered to entertain vacationers, especially on Grand Cayman. Do-it-yourselfers will find plenty of smaller watercraft: ocean kayaks, Sunfish, Hobie cats, WaveRunners, and more on Grand Cayman. Rental prices vary by location, but expect to pay anywhere from US \$25 to \$100 an hour, depending on type of vessel. Catamaran rentals run about \$35-\$40 per hour.

Pirate Cruise

For a look at the waters off George Town aboard an authentic replica of a 17th-century Spanish galleon, join a cruise aboard the *Jolly Roger* (☎ 345-949-8534). The ship has three masts and 110 pieces of rigging and is thought to be about the size of Columbus' *Niña*. Cruises vary from the afternoon family-friendly pirate cruise to the romantic sunset sail. The pirate cruise takes travelers on a two-hour sail along the coast of Grand Cayman, complete with staff in period dress to recall Cayman's pirate past. Kids love the cruise for the chance to literally walk the plank, fire the cannon or hoist the mainsail. Be



sure to bring your swimsuit for a snorkel stop along the way.

For something a little more sedate, sunset cruises offer a two-and-a-half hour view of the Caribbean sunset, complete with appetizers and drinks (options include appetizers only or a full dinner).

Windsurfing

Windsurfing is enjoyed on Seven Mile Beach and on Grand Cayman's East End. The latter is a top windsurfing area for experienced participants because of its stronger winds. Trade winds of 15 to 25 knots blow during the winter months, dropping to 10 to 15 knots in the summer.

Windsurfers find plenty of action inside the reef, while others choose to go out through the channel (be cautious of sharp coral when going through the channel). Collier's Channel is a good point to take the waves.

Based at Morritt's Tortuga Club, **Cayman Windsurf** caters to both beginner and advanced windsurfers. Learn the sport, improve your knowledge, or just rent a craft and enjoy slicing through the water with the breeze. Beginners have four miles of reef-protected calm waters in which to learn, and advanced practitioners can sail out through Collier's Channel. Prices average about US \$35 for one-hour rentals; lessons run about US \$45. For more details, call Cayman Windsurf, ☎ 345-947-7492 or fax 345-947-6763.

Yachting

Cayman doesn't have the boating reputation of islands such as the British Virgin Islands, Antigua, the Grenadines, or Sint Maarten. There's no easy island-hopping here to appeal to beginners. Nonetheless, you'll find two marinas in Grand Cayman.

Beaches

Seven Mile Beach

At just 5½ miles long, Seven Mile Beach may be somewhat of a misnomer, but in some ways the strip of sand seems much longer because of the numerous businesses packed along its expanse. This beautiful swath of white sand separates hotels, condominiums, and restaurants from an aquamarine sea. Dotted with casuarina trees, this beach is the most popular spot on the island. Come here to watch and be watched, to enjoy an island concoction or to slather on oil and bake yourself into tropical bliss. Watersports operators line the way, offering active vacationers anything from scuba trips and parasailing to windsurfing and Jet Skiing.

Seven Mile Beach runs along Grand Cayman's western edge, beginning at George Town and stretching to a region called West Bay at its northern end. Along Seven Mile Beach, Grand Cayman narrows to

a skinny stretch about a mile wide, bordered by the beach on the west and North Sound to the east. On its eastern boundary the sea etches into the land with salt creeks and marsh harbors. Much of these eastern reaches are covered with swampy vegetation.

Along Seven Mile Beach you'll find a public beach park tucked north of the Westin Casuarina Hotel. With plenty of parking (other beach access areas offer parking on the shoulder of busy West Bay Road), this is one of the best options for enjoying Seven Mile Beach if you're not staying at one of the area properties. The park includes shaded pavilions, restrooms with changing rooms, and a small playground for the kids. Squeaky clean and, like the rest of the island, devoid of beach vendors, the park is a wonderful place to spend an afternoon.



DID YOU KNOW?

Nude bathing is prohibited in the Cayman Islands, and beaches require tops for female bathers.

Spotts

Located east of George Town on the south shore of Grand Cayman, Spotts is home to a public beach park with a shallow swimming area.

Breakers

The community of Breakers, about halfway between Spotts and East End, is home to another public beach park.

Rum Point

Rum Point is on the north coast of Grand Cayman's East End, on the tip of a peninsula that's home to ca-

suarina trees, chalky sand, aquamarine waters, and a club with just about every watersport imaginable. This getaway spot now has restaurants, a gift shop, walkways and hammocks, and other amenities for a relaxing and pleasant visit.

You can get to Rum Point by car (about an hour's drive from George Town, as you have to circle almost the entire island) or on the *Rum Pointer* ferry, which departs from the Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman. This 120-passenger ferry travels across the North Sound to Rum Point in about 30 minutes. Tickets are CI \$6 each way; for children aged five-12 they are CI \$3 each way (children under age five travel free). For ferry schedule and reservations, ☎ 345-949-9098.

Fishing

Fishing is more than just a popular activity in Cayman, it's a national obsession. Shore, reef, and deep-sea fishing are available year-round, and local guides can provide tackle and point out the best fishing spots on each island.

Bonefishing is a top activity. These three- to eight-pound fish are found in shallow flats and afford any angler a good fight on spinning gear. **Reef fishing** is also enjoyed along the many miles of reefs that surround these islands.

For travelers seeking **deep-water** action, charters will gladly take them on a hunt for **blue marlin**, **yellowfin tuna**, **wahoo**, **dolphin** (dorado) and **bar-racuda**. Taking out a charter boat is not an inexpensive proposition, but for many visitors it's the highlight of their trip. A half-day charter begins at about US \$400; the cost may go as high as \$1,000 for a full-day trip aboard a large charter with state-of-the-art equipment and tackle.

Fly-fishing continues to grow in popularity here but anglers should bring all their equipment, as guides and charters do not supply saltwater fly rods.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Cayman Islands government encourages the practice of catch-and-release for blue marlin to help maintain this species in its waters; they give free citations to anglers who release their marlin. A form can be obtained from the boat's captain or the charter boat booking office to request this citation.

If you're curious about what lies below the water's surface, the 48-passenger *Atlantis* submarine is the perfect way to have a peek at Grand Cayman's underwater world. Swimmers and non-swimmers alike enjoy safe, air-conditioned, comfortable travel to 100 feet below the surface aboard the *Atlantis* with a narrated view of coral gardens, sponge gardens, the undersea wall, and more.

Another option is a ride on one of two *Atlantis* research submersibles, also operating from the Atlantis office on Harbour Drive. Plunging as much as 1,000 feet below the surface, this vessel offers a one-of-a-kind experience. The 22-foot sub, the only vessel of its type open to the public, carries two passengers and a pilot. Several times a day, it dives down the Cayman Wall to depths far beyond the range of sports scuba divers. Passengers sit side-by-side in front of a large (three-foot diameter) convex viewport. The view varies with the depth: from 200 to 400 feet are colorful sponges and corals in what is termed the "sponge belt." Hundreds of sponges blanket the vertical wall in forms ranging from 20-foot-

long orange rope sponges to gigantic barrel sponges. From 650 to 1,000 feet, living formations give way to limestone pinnacles that house deep-sea creatures such as stalked crinoids, porcelain corals and glass sponges. The limestone blocks, or "haystacks," stand over 150 feet tall. Here light no longer penetrates the sea and the research sub illuminates the inky blackness with powerful lights. The highlight of many trips is a visit to the *Kirk Pride*, a shipwreck that sits on a ledge at 800 feet. This 180-foot freighter sank in a storm in 1976 and its fate was unknown until the wreck was discovered by an *Atlantis* research submarine in 1985. Five dives daily, Monday through Friday. Advance reservations are strongly recommended for this limited-availability adventure. Be warned that it's a pricey one-hour excursion (starting at \$345) but certainly a unique one.

UNDER THE DEEP BLUE SEA

Tours operate six days a week; visitors buy tickets at the *Atlantis* headquarters on Harbour Drive in downtown George Town, just south of the cruise ship terminal. You'll board an open-air boat and travel out to the dive site just off George Town's shore. Bench seating runs the length of the sub and all passengers have a porthole from which to enjoy the underwater scene.

After viewing the marine life, don't be surprised to see some human life forms approaching the submarine – these are the *Atlantis* divers. Wearing armored wetsuits to protect against fish nibbles, they feed clouds of hungry fish and provide good photo opportunities.

 TIP

If you bring your camera on a dive vessel, load ASA 1000 film so you will not need a flash; it will reflect off the portholes.

The *Nautilus* offers a one-hour tour to view the rich marine life of the bay. The vessel does not submerge; travelers sit in a glass hull six feet beneath the surface and can go up on deck anytime during the trip, making it attractive for families with young children. The *Nautilus* goes out about three-quarters of a mile offshore, offering visitors a chance to view two shipwrecks and see a variety of tropical fish. Night cruises, sunset dinner cruises, and mystery theater cruises are also available. The *Nautilus* also offers the two-hour **Captain Nemo's Adventure Tour**, which begins with the one-hour undersea trip. The vessel then moors over a wreck or reef and visitors can walk about above or below deck, swim or snorkel.

Actually a glorified glass-bottom boat, the *Seaworld Explorer*, like the *Nautilus*, is a good option for those who might feel a little claustrophobic about a submarine adventure (it does not go below the water's surface). Visitors descend into a glass observatory and view marine life and two shipwrecks. The *Explorer* travels to the *Cali*, a schooner that hit the reef in 1944, and the *Balboa*, a freighter from Cuba destroyed by a hurricane. Today the wrecks are encased in corals and filled with fish life. Trips last one hour; the *Seaworld Explorer* is next to the *Atlantis* headquarters on South Church Street.

**Admission?

This is one of the most unusual tours in the Cayman Islands, sort of a private submarine that you can even get the chance to maneuver. The *SEAmagine* takes two passengers in a glass bubble of a cabin while the pilot is on the *outside* of the cabin in scuba gear. You'll be in communication with the pilot at all times as he points out fish on the 40-foot-deep reef. The tour takes about an hour to complete; you'll need to make reservations to arrange for pick up along Seven Mile Beach.

Birding

One of the most popular eco-tourism activities in these islands is birding. Approximately 200 species of birds make their home on these small islands (50 species are known to breed here), from the magnificent frigate bird, with a seven-foot wingspan, to tiny hummingbirds and Cayman parrots.

The only operation of its kind on Grand Cayman, **Silver Thatch Excursions** (☎ 345-945-6588, fax 345-949-3342, silvert@hotmail.com) offers specialized birding trips for about US \$50 per person. These trips visit sites such as the **Governor Michael Gore Bird Sanctuary**, a haven for waterfowl, as well as **Meagre Bay Pond**, **Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park**, and the **Willie Ebanks Farm** to view endangered West Indian whistling ducks. Founders Geddes and Janet Hislop also offer private tours.

Golf

Golfers are challenged at two courses on Grand Cayman. **The Links at SafeHaven** is the only championship 18-hole golf course in the Cayman Islands. At the Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman, the Jack Nicklaus-designed **Britannia** course can be played as an 18-hole executive course, a nine-hole championship course, or an 18-hole Cayman ball course (the Cayman ball is designed to go only half as far as a regular ball).

This Jack Nicklaus-designed course can be played as a nine-hole championship course, an 18-hole executive course, or an 18-hole Cayman ball course. What's a Cayman ball course? Well, this is the first one in the world. Designed to go only half as far as a regular ball, the Cayman ball makes the best use of the small course area on the island. This links-style course, with the challenges of its seaside location, includes blind tee shots, pot bunkers, and two-tiered greens. On the fifth hole, golfers shoot over the Caribbean waters.

This is the only championship 18-hole golf course in the Cayman Islands. Men are required to wear shirts with collar and sleeves; women must wear a shirt to cover shoulders. Golf carts are mandatory and operators must be at least 17 years old and have a valid drivers license. Services at the course include a golf pro for lessons, golf shop, putting greens, chipping and bunker practice areas, aqua driving range, open-air patio bar, and The Links Restaurant for lunch and dinner (see *Best Places To Eat*, page 222).

Horseback riding is an excellent opportunity both to tour some of the island's quieter sections and to romp along the beach. Most horseback riding on the island is along the powdery beaches, an excellent place for practiced riders to gallop and for beginners to enjoy a slow walk on cushioned sand (a comfort to those who feel they may fall off).

Rides vary, but most run an hour and 15 minutes on the beach, through the water, along a short trail and back down the beach. Although shorts can be worn, jeans and closed shoes are recommended.

Two historic tours are offered by Silver Thatch Excursions. The **Eastern Experience** takes travelers to the island's East End to view a variety of sites, including the Wreck of the Ten Sails Monument, which recalls the seafaring days of the Cayman Islands. The tour also stops at Old Prospect, the location of the island's first fort, and Watler's Cemetery. In Bodden Town, participants go on a walking tour to see early Caymanian architecture and then travel on to the Blow Holes at Breakers.

A second tour starts in the **West Bay** area, with a stop at Old Homestead to learn more about early Cayman life. Travelers then head to George Town for a walking tour of the capital city. This includes a visit to the site of Fort George and the Elmslie Memorial Church, built by a shipwright with a ceiling constructed to resemble a schooner's hull. The tour continues on to Old Prospect and the Old Savannah Schoolhouse. Both historic tours are available Monday through Saturday.

Those with an interest in botany can select from two specialized excursions that include the **Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park**. One tour follows the Historic Route, traveling from the Old Savannah Schoolhouse, to Bodden Town to see the Slave Wall and Cayman-style homes, and then to the Botanic Park for a walk along the Woodland Trail. The second tour

follows the Environmental Route; it includes bird-watching stops at the **Governor Michael Gore Bird Sanctuary** and other birding sites and then a tour of the Botanic Park. Excursions are offered Monday through Saturday.

Silver Thatch Excursions also offers bird-watching trips. These include stops at the Governor Michael Gore Bird Sanctuary, a haven for waterfowl, as well as Meagre Bay Pond, Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park, and the Willie Ebanks Farm to view endangered West Indian whistling ducks.

Pick up can be arranged along West Bay Road starting at 8 am (6 am for bird watching trips) for all Silver Thatch tours. Participants are provided with traditional Caymanian snacks.



MASTIC TRAIL

The Mastic Trail is a project of the National Trust. Guided tours travel through a woodland area along a two-mile trail. One of the most interesting areas is a region filled with fine red soil called “red mold.” The dirt contains minerals found in the ancient rocks of Africa and scientists believe that, through the years, the dust from the Sahara Desert blew across the Atlantic and the Caribbean to accumulate here. Birders have a chance to sight the Grand Cayman parrot, Caribbean dove, West Indian woodpecker, Cuban bullfinch, smooth-billed ani, and the colorful bananaquit.

The hike also passes 100 different types of trees, including black mangroves that grow from the brackish water, elegant royal palms, and tall mahogany trees. Fruit trees, first planted by early residents, include mango, tamarind, and calabash. Orchids

bring color to the trees during the spring season, probably the best time of year to experience this eco-tourism attraction.

★ TIP

Wear sturdy shoes and bring insect repellent. The Mastic Trail tour is not recommended for children under six, for the elderly or those with physical disabilities.

Sightseeing

This is one of the best attractions on Grand Cayman, both economically and educationally. About 25 min-

utes' drive from George Town, the park comprises 65 acres filled with native trees, plants, and wild orchids, as well as birds, reptiles, and butterflies. The two-story **Visitors Centre**, built in traditional Caymanian style, includes displays on natural history and botanical art, and small flower shows. Behind the center, a waterfall leads to a snack bar that serves sandwiches, patties, ice cream and juices.

Visit the park's **Heritage Garden** for a look at Cayman history. It features a Caymanian house from the East End; this home has been restored and filled with donated furniture. The three-room structure was once a family home where nine children were raised. Today the yard is filled with the plants and fruit trees that a typical Caymanian family would have grown, such as cassava, sugarcane, plantains, bananas, and sweet potatoes. A cistern collects valuable rainwater and a separated kitchen keeps the heat of the stove (and the hazard of fire) from the house. In small open areas in the surrounding lowland forest, fruit trees grow in pockets of soil among the ironshore, much as they would have generations ago. Medicinal plants such as aloe vera, commonly grown around a Caymanian house, are found here as well.

The **Floral Colour Garden** is the most traditional botanical garden area here, with 2½ acres of floral gardens arranged by color. Pink, purple, orange, silver, and a whole rainbow of tones blossom with color and fragrance year-round. Up high, overlooking the gardens and a small pond that features six-foot Victoria water lilies, a tea house has been constructed.

The **Woodland Trail**, just under a mile long, is a must-see for anyone interested in Cayman plants. Budget at least a half-hour for the walk, longer if possible, so you'll have time to read the informative exhibits, stop and listen for the call of a Cayman par-

rot in the trees, and look for turtles in the swampy undergrowth. The trail winds through several types of environments. One of the wettest is a buttonwood swamp, filled with its namesake, one of the few trees that can live with its roots continually submerged. The swamp provides humidity for bromeliads and orchids. On the other end of the spectrum, a cactus exhibit illustrates the drier regions of the Cayman Islands, and it's home to large century plants (agave) and cacti. One habitat is similar to that found on Little Cayman and includes flora that grow on the tiny Sister Island.

Watch the shadowy undergrowth and you may spot one of Grand Cayman's shyest residents, the agouti. Other wildlife in the park include the hickatee, a turtle found in the freshwater and brackish ponds of the Cayman Islands and Cuba. The Grand Cayman blue iguana or the Cayman anole lizard with a blue throat pouch are also seen.

CAYMAN HOUSING

Traditional Caymanian houses, like the one at the botanic garden, feature sand gardens. Raked clean, the sand gardens were often trimmed with conch shells and have paths paved with coral. On Christmas Eve, families would replenish the sand in their yard with fresh sand from the beach. No one really knows how the tradition got started but some suspect that, for the early Scottish residents, the fresh white sand reminded them of snow.

Wonder what Seven Mile Beach might have looked like before all the condos and hotels? Then maybe it's time for a day-trip over to Rum Point, a beautiful stretch of beach that's a fun alternative to Seven Mile Beach. Rum Point is across the North Sound from the bustling West Bay-Seven Mile Beach area. It is dotted with casuarina trees, chalky sand, aquamarine waters, and a club with just about every watersport. Recently over \$5 million in improvements were made to this getaway spot, which now sports a full-service dinner restaurant, casual lunch eatery and bar, decks and walkways, plenty of comfy hammocks and picnic tables, a gift shop, and more.

You can get to Rum Point by car (about an hour's drive from George Town) or on the *Rum Pointer* ferry, which departs from the Hyatt Regency Grand Cayman. This 120-passenger ferry travels to Rum Point in about 30 minutes. If you're at Rum Point at dusk, don't miss the fish feeding off the docks.

CAYMAN TURTLE FARM

Along with Stingray City, the Cayman Turtle Farm is one of the island's top attractions. It's the only farm of its kind in the world and for over 30 years this site has offered visitors the chance to get up close and personal with green sea turtles. Allow about 45 minutes to tour the farm.

The farm displays the life cycle of the green sea turtle from birth through the breeding stage. Eggs, which are laid by the big breeder turtles on a sand beach at the farm, are incubated in the nursery. The hatchlings live in tanks and are fed a high-protein pelleted diet similar in appearance to dog food. This accounts for the rapid growth of the farm's turtles compared to their relatives in the wild.

The self-guided tour of the turtle farm takes you past many tanks filled with turtles in various life stages. A special tank contains turtles that you may pick up and hold, an excellent photo opportunity. Reach down and clutch the turtle's body just behind his front flippers. He'll flip and flap around, trying to swim away in mid-air, unless you hold him vertically.

The turtle farm also recognizes the land residents of the Cayman Islands in several exhibit areas. Look for the **agouti** or the Cayman "rabbit" in one area. These rodents, found in the eastern districts of Grand Cayman, have long, thin legs and hoof-like claws, with three toes on their hind feet and five toes on the forefeet. Once a food source, today the rodents are rarely spotted. Nearby, another area houses a display of the **American crocodile**. Early records speak of sightings of this 20-foot crocodile in Grand Cayman and Little Cayman; recent archaeological finds have proven this claim to be true. The last stop on the tour is the extensive gift shop. You might be shocked to see turtle steak and turtle shells for sale in the shop. Remember, however, that this is a working farm. Many turtles are released into the sea every year, although others find their way onto Cayman dinner tables. The turtle plays a role in the Cayman diet and culture much like the turkey in the United States. Much of the turtle meat served at local restaurants comes from the Cayman Turtle

Farm. The farm defends its efforts and points out that by providing turtle meat – a longtime Caymanian favorite – to the local market, it diminishes the need for turtle hunting. Also, the survival rate at the farm is much higher than in the wild (here, nine out of every 10 turtles survive, as compared to one out of 10 in the sea).



⚡ WARNING!

Remember, you cannot bring turtle products of any kind through US Customs. They will be confiscated.

The Cayman Turtle Farm was hit by Hurricane Michelle in 2001, destroying several of the larger tanks. Today the farm is working to create a new and larger attraction just across the street, moving the turtles farther from the sea to a more secure location. Plans call for an extensive attraction that will give visitors the opportunity to swim with turtles. They expect the project to be completed in 2004.



HELL West Bay

Ready to go to Hell? Well, here it is, just north of Seven Mile Beach. This odd attraction is actually a community named Hell, a moniker derived from the time an English commissioner went hunting in the area, shot at a bird, missed, and said “Oh, hell.” The name must have seemed appropriate for the devilishly pointed rocks near town, a bed of limestone and dolomite that through millions of years eroded into a crusty, pocked formation locally called iron-shore.

To reach this small community, follow **West Bay Road** north from Seven Mile Beach. At the intersec-

tion with **Town Hall Road**, turn right and continue to **Hell Road**. Turn left to this small town.

Today, Hell trades upon its unusual name as a way to draw tourists to the far end of West Bay. Visitors stop at the **post office** (and the three shops directly adjacent) to buy postcards and have them postmarked from Hell. Nearby, **The Devil's Hangout** gift shop (open daily), in the original post office, also ships out its share of postcards. The store is manned by Ivan Farrington. He dresses as the devil himself to greet tourists who arrive to purchase postcards and other Hell-related gifts, from hot sauces to T-shirts. Step out back behind the shops for a look at the unusual rock formations that gave this community its name.

And, yes, you'll find churches in Hell. Save a few minutes for a look around this quiet, charming community.

One of the East End's newest attractions is also its oldest. Pedro St. James Restoration Site, an 18th-century great house, has undergone complete renovation and today the building known as the "Birthplace of Democracy in the Cayman Islands" is open to the public. Called **Pedro Castle**, the historic structure is in the community of Savannah, east of George Town.

The oldest-known stone structure in the Cayman Islands, Pedro Castle was built in the late 18th century as a great house for William Eden, an early settler. In 1831, the house was the site of an historic

meeting when residents decided that the five districts of the Cayman Islands should have representation in the government. Four years later, a proclamation declaring the emancipation of all slaves was read at Pedro Castle and several other sites in the islands.

The site, purchased by the government in 1991, is at the center of a 7.65-acre landscaped park atop the 30-foot Great Pedro Bluff. The CI \$7.5 (about US \$6.25) million project was a major undertaking, taking seven years to complete. The restoration used architectural and historic research to return the house to its 1820-1840 appearance.

Tours start with an excellent multi-media show with 3-D dioramas, providing a history of the house that captivates children and adults alike. From the show, visitors can take a self-guided tour of the house then walk the grounds, which boast several extensive walking paths, a variety of native plants, and beautiful sea views.

We have visited Pedro St. James several times and each time come away with some new knowledge. The operation is very well done and this attraction is highly recommended, especially for visitors who are making their second trip to the Cayman Islands and would like to learn more about the island's history.

CAYMAN ISLANDS NATIONAL MUSEUM

The Cayman Islands National Museum is, in our opinion, one of the finest museums in the Caribbean. A visit here is a great way to learn more about

Cayman history and culture. Over the years this seaside building, just across from the cruise ship terminals, has served as a courthouse, jail, and meeting hall, and today it houses over 2,000 artifacts that recall the history of these islands. Created in 1979 by a museum law and opened in 1990, the museum collects items of historic, scientific, and artistic relevance.

You'll enter on the ground floor. Begin your visit with an eight-minute slide show about the history of these islands. From there, enjoy a self-guided tour of the museum, with displays on all facets of Caymanian life. A bathymetric map illustrates the depth of the seas around the Cayman Islands, including the Cayman Trench at 23,750 feet below sea level. Other exhibits focus on the islands' natural history, including mangrove swamps, which create a rich birding environment; caymanite, a semi-precious stone unique to the Cayman islands; and displays on local marine life.



DID YOU KNOW?

This museum is housed in the **Old Courts Building**, one of the few 19th-century structures left on the island. Outdoor steps lead up to the second story of the building and those 12 steps gave rise to a Cayman saying, "walking the 12 steps," which meant you were being taken to court.

Some of the most fascinating displays recall the early economy of the Caymanians. An oral history program reveals the history of early turtlers who made a living capturing the now-protected reptiles. Exhibits display artifacts used by the early resi-

dents such as the muntle, a club used to kill fish; the calabash, a versatile gourd that, once dried, had many uses; sisal switches used to beat mosquitoes away; and wompers, sandals worn on the East End, originally made from leather and later from old tires.

After your tour you'll exit through the museum shop, a good source of Cayman-made items. The shop, housed in the old jail with part of the old coral stone wall still exposed, has a good selection of books and maps of the Cayman Islands. (If you don't have time for a museum tour, you can enter through the store for a little shopping.)

CARDINAL D'S PARK

This park contains a small zoo that is a good stop for families. Over 60 species of exotic birds (including Cayman parrots and whistling ducks), as well as agoutis, emus, blue iguanas, turtles, miniature ponies, and more are on display. A petting zoo and snack bar make this attraction popular with kids.

The Mastic Trail walk is not recommended for children under age six, the elderly, or those with physical disabilities.

For over two centuries man has walked the Mastic Trail, which winds for two miles through swamps, woodlands, and farming areas. Originally used to herd cattle to the south coast, today the trail is maintained by the National Trust for the Cayman

Islands and is an excellent way for travelers to learn more about the many types of fauna found here. Guided 2½-hour walks, led by local resident Albert Hines, travel past 100 different varieties of trees and 550 other plant species such as the wild banana orchid, the Cayman national flower. Only eight people are permitted on each of the tours; reservations are required. Hikers should wear sturdy shoes and bring insect repellent. Cold soft drinks and transportation back to the trailhead are provided.

BLOW HOLES

Between Frank Sound and East End

East of the turnoff for Frank Sound Road lies a side-of-the-road attraction: the Blow Holes. You'll access the blowholes from a free parking area just off the main road. Follow the wooden stairs down to sea level to see the rugged coral rocks that have been carved by rough waves into caverns. As waves hit the rocks, water spews into the air, creating one of the best photo sites on the island. The "blows" are strongest when the waves are large (and don't blow at all on the calmest days), shooting sprays of water 20 to 30 feet in the air.

WARNING!

Don't stand too close to the edge of these formations. Wear good shoes for this excursion; the ironshore is sharp and footing isn't solid.

PIRATE CAVES

Bodden Town

A less scenic and more touristy stop (but nonetheless fun) are the Pirate Caves in Bodden Town. Reputed to have been used by pirates to hide their treasure and supposedly linked by tunnels to similar caves in the reef, the cave is now open for self-guided tours. You'll first view a caged blue iguana and Cayman parrot, as well as a traditional Cayman cottage, then head underground for a look at the cave. Across the street, alleged pirate graves, actually carved by slaves from rock in the shape of small houses, await inspection.

STINGRAY BREWERY

This microbrewery produces the Stingray Beer sold throughout the islands and offers a self-guided tour of the brewing process. To reach the brewery, follow Crewe Road or South Sound Road to Red Bay Road, then continue east on Red Bay Road. You'll see the brewery on your right. Brewery hours are 9 am to 5 pm, Monday through Saturday; closed Sunday.

Aerial tours of Grand Cayman are available through both Island Air and Seaborne. "It is a unique way to view the island," said Marcus Cumber, Seaborne's operations manager. "We fly at a low level altitude and it is possible to see the stingrays, turtles, and big fish from the sky. We feel that our guides are extremely knowledgeable of the Cayman Islands since

they are local residents. We can point out the best of the Islands and discuss their history." Tours are scheduled only from December through June; call Island Air or Seaborne for rates and schedules.

Day-Trips

If you are making a repeat visit to Grand Cayman or booking a week on the island, you may want to consider a day-trip to Cayman Brac or Little Cayman. Under an hour's flight northeast of Grand Cayman but worlds apart in terms of atmosphere, these small islands are tailor-made for travelers looking for bonefishing, secluded beaches, or nature appreciation.

Day-trips are easy thanks to frequent flights with **Island Air** (☎ 345-949-5252, fax 345-949-7044, www.islandair.ky). Four flights daily connect Grand Cayman with the Sister Islands, and special day-trip rates are available. Day-trippers can leave Grand Cayman at 7:45 or 9:45 am, landing on Cayman Brac 40 minutes later. After a quick stop, the flight continues to Little Cayman, just 10 minutes away. Return flights allow travelers to stay until early evening, arriving back on Grand Cayman as late as 6:20 pm.

Cayman Brac

With a population of only 1,300 residents, Cayman Brac is closer in pace to Little Cayman than its big brother, Grand Cayman. Residents, or *Brackers*, are known for their personable nature and welcome vacationers to their sunny isle.

Like its smaller sibling, Cayman Brac has its own special qualities, assets that include **undersea walls**, the most **rugged terrain** found in the Cay-

man Islands, **caves** that tempt exploration, **birding**, and much more.

The island is named for the sheer **bluff** that is visited by hikers and non-hikers alike. This area is a favorite for bird-watching, one of the most popular activities on Cayman Brac. Here the 180-acre **Parrot Reserve** is home to the endangered Cayman Brac parrot. Only 400 of the birds remain in the wild on this island.

Among Cayman Brac's most unusual features are its many caves. The bluff is pocked with caves that frame beautiful seaside views. Several of the 18 caves on Cayman Brac have been explored and five are frequently visited by vacationers. **Rebecca's Cave**, east of Divi Tiara Hotel, is marked with signs. The best known of the island's caves, sadly this one is named for a young child who died here during the Great Hurricane of 1932. **Skull Cave**, **Peter's Cave**, **Bat Cave**, and **Great Cave** present other caving challenges, some requiring steep climbs.

Without a doubt, **undersea life** is one of the island's prime attractions. The latest attraction is a Russian frigate deliberately sunk in September 1996. Renamed the MV *Captain Keith Tibbetts*, this 330-foot freighter was built for use by the Cuban navy. It lies approximately 200 yards offshore northwest of Cayman Brac. The bow rests in about 90 feet of water; the stern is just 40 feet below the surface. The sinking of the vessel was recorded by Jean-Michel Cousteau Productions in *Destroyer at Peace*, a documentary film.

Although day-trippers cannot dive because of the same-day return flight, several dive operators offer snorkel trips:

- ♦ **Brac Aquatics** (☎ 800-544-2722, 345-948-1429) offers trips specifically for snorkelers.

For car rental agencies on Cayman Brac, see page 240.

♦ **Divi Dive Tiara**, (☎ 800-661-DIVE, 345-948-1553) and **Reef Divers Brac Reef Beach Resort** (☎ 800-327-3835) allow snorkelers to come along on dive trips.

Bonefishing is another top draw for many Cayman Brac vacationers. Guides lead anglers on half- and full-day excursions to seek bonefish in the shallows; deep sea fishing is another popular option and groups of up to four can book a charter for a chance at a trophy catch; see page 251 for a list of guides.

Little Cayman

Day-trippers to **Little Cayman** find that the island is indeed petite, only 11 miles long and two miles across at its widest point. Perfect for a day-trip, the isle can easily be seen in a day with a rental car (and there's no need for visitors to worry about getting lost; only one road circles the island).

Vehicles from McLaughlin come with a full tank of gas, and must be returned that way.

Jeeps are available from **McLaughlin Jeep Rentals** (☎ 345-948-1000, fax 345-948-1001, littlcay@can-dw.ky). You must be at least 21 years of age and have a valid driver's license to rent a car. A Cayman Islands driving permit is also required (see page 55).

While driving on the island, visitors soon see that, with under 170 permanent residents, the island's largest population consists of **birds** and **iguanas**. Over 2,000 Little Cayman rock iguanas inhabit the island, so "Iguana Crossing" and "Iguana Right of Way" signs are posted along the road to protect the large lizards.

Little Cayman's chief draw is its **eco-tourism**: diving, fishing, and bird-watching. While flying in the same day rules out the opportunity for day-trippers to dive, **snorkelers** will find numerous chances to take a peek at what lies beneath the water's surface. The most famous site is **Bloody Bay Wall** off the

north side of the island. The wall is a short swim from shore and starts at a depth of only 20 feet, making it a favorite with snorkelers.

Anglers come to this tiny isle for its excellent fishing for bonefish and permit, both caught in the flats, and tarpon, reeled in from brackish Tarpon Lake. The **Southern Cross Club** (☎ 800-899-2582, 619-563-0017, relax@southerncrossclub.com, www.southerncrossclub.com) first attracted anglers to these waters; today **McCoy's Diving and Fishing Lodge** (☎ 800-626-0496, 345-948-0026, fax 345-948-0057, mccoys@candw.ky) also caters to fishermen. Day-trippers can arrange fishing guides from either of these lodges.

Birders enjoy the **Booby Pond Visitors Centre**. Operated by the National Trust, this 1.2-acre brackish mangrove pond is the home of the Caribbean's largest breeding colony of red-footed boobies and a breeding colony of magnificent frigate birds. Visitors can view the birds with telescopes (available for use any time) and see exhibits on the birds of Little Cayman in the visitors center.

Shop Till You Drop

Money Matters



Exchange Rates

The Caymanian dollar carries a fixed exchange rate of US \$1.25 to CI \$1. The US dollar is also accepted in shops and restaurants, along with travelers checks and most major credit cards. Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Diners Club, and Access are commonly accepted; Discover is accepted at some establishments.

Customs Concerns

There are restrictions on several items that can be purchased in the Cayman Islands but which may not be brought into the United States.

Harvesting of **black coral** depletes the sea's supply. Only jewelers licensed to remove the coral may do so, and without a certificate testifying that your purchase is from an approved seller your black coral may be confiscated in US Customs.

Travelers to (or in transit through) the US need to avoid purchasing anything made with **turtle products**. All goods – including oils, steaks, shells, and jewelry – made from turtles and turtle shells have been banned by US Customs. Passengers traveling through the US to other nations will have to surrender *all* turtle products at US Customs.

On the other hand, Cayman-produced rums and rum cakes are a popular purchase and can be found in many shops. **Tortuga Rum Cake** is made according to a 100-year-old family recipe, using five-year-old Tortuga Gold Rum; it is sealed in a red tin. Or, for travelers who want to skip the cake, a bottle of **Tortuga, Blackbear, or Cayman Gold** rum makes an inexpensive duty-free purchase. Local **arts and crafts** are also popular buys. Birdhouses made from coconuts, brooms woven from thatch, and pepper sauce distilled from fiery Scotch bonnet peppers to capture the spirit of the islands make inexpensive island souvenirs.

George Town

Grand Cayman is one of the Caribbean's great shopping destinations. The capital of the nation's shopping world is George Town. Along the George Town waterfront, on **West Bay Road** and **Harbour Drive**,

duty-free shops tempt travelers with china, perfumes, leather goods, watches, crystal, and, most especially, fine jewelry.

Prices average about 25% below regular retail price tags, although some goods run as much as 40% to 45% below US retail prices. However, travelers would be well advised to know their prices before they leave home; not all items are a bargain.

Jewelry is a popular purchase in the form of watches, custom-designed pieces and stones. Diamonds and other gemstones are found in most fine jewelry stores, as are 14K and 18K gold. Jewelry made from antique coins and doubloons recovered from shipwrecks around the world is very popular here.

Caymanite, a stone found only on the eastern end of Grand Cayman's East End and the bluff on Cayman Brac, is sold throughout the islands mounted as jewelry. The semi-precious stone, a form of dolomite, ranges from a light beige to a beautiful amber color and is often mounted in a gold setting.

Black coral is also a widespread commodity, and artisans design it into fine jewelry and small sculptures. You'll find black coral necklaces, charms, earrings, and more, often highlighted with gold inlays, sold in most of the fine jewelry shops.

KIRK FREEPORT

The Kirk Freeport name is a Cayman institution, well-known among those seeking duty-free gifts.

The best-known of the Kirk Freeport stores is Cardinal Avenue's **Kirk Jewellers**, the exclusive Rolex distributor in the Cayman Islands. The shop also

stocks Tag Heuer, Omega, Breitling, Tudor, Gucci, Bulgari, Fendi, and other lines. Fine jewelry from designers such as Bulgari, Mikimoto, Soho, and Chaumet are popular purchases. Writing instruments and leather accessories from Cartier, Mont Blanc, Waterman, and A.T. Cross are also offered at duty-free prices.

Other shops under the Kirk Freeport umbrella include the exclusive **Cartier Boutique**, which offers 18K jewelry, watches, leather goods, perfumes, and pens, and **La Perfumerie I & II**, featuring fragrances from around the globe, including Chanel, Lancôme, Yves Saint Laurent, Givenchy, Clinique, and more.

DUTY FREE MALL

Church Street, George Town

One of the newest shopping centers is the Duty Free Mall, next to the Hard Rock Café on the waterfront. The \$8 million mall is home to 22 stores including Havana Cigars, Just for Kids, Blackbeard's, and Café Splash. Even non-shoppers will find plenty of reasons for a stop: the mall is home to a 12,000-square-foot saltwater aquarium filled with sharks, eels and rays. The sharks are fed daily and educational lectures on marine life take place between 11 am and 1 pm. Save time for a trip up the observation tower for a good photo opportunity of George Town.

Little Cayman

Just 80 miles northeast of Grand Cayman, but worlds apart in terms of atmosphere, Little Cayman is tailor-made for visitors looking for secluded scuba diving, fly- or spin-fishing, and nature. Appropriate to its name, Little Cayman is only 11 miles long and two miles at its widest point. Boasting none of the glitz of Grand Cayman, Little Cayman does greet guests with all the basic comforts, including several small lodges and condominiums with air conditioning, satellite TV, and telephone service.

With just over 100 permanent residents, the island's largest population is of birds and iguanas. Over 2,000 Little Cayman rock iguanas inhabit the island, so many that "Iguana Crossing" and "Iguana Right of Way" signs are posted throughout the island to protect these lizards, which can grow up to five feet in length.

Little Cayman's chief draw is its eco-tourism: **diving**, **fishing**, and **bird-watching**. The late Philippe Cousteau called the island's Bloody Bay Wall one of the best dives of his life; today it's still a favorite with divers.

Anglers come to this tiny isle for its excellent bone-fishing. Bonefish and permit, both caught in the flats, and tarpon, reeled in from brackish Tarpon Lake, draw fishermen. The **Southern Cross Club** fishing lodge first attracted anglers to these waters; today **McCoy's Diving and Fishing Lodge** also caters to fishermen. Guests at other island resorts can arrange fishing guides from these lodges.

Birders enjoy the **Booby Pond Nature Reserve**. Operated by the National Trust, this brackish mangrove pond covering 1.2 acres is the home of the

Caribbean's largest breeding colony of red-footed boobies and a breeding colony of magnificent frigate birds.



Getting Here

By Air

The dirt airstrip of **Edward Boddan Airport** has twice-daily service from Grand Cayman. Island Air departs on the 45-minute flight twice daily. Passengers may check up to 55 pounds of baggage free of charge; excess baggage is charged US 50¢ per pound. Flights are also available on Island Air from Cayman Brac to Little Cayman. Special fares are available for children under age 12.

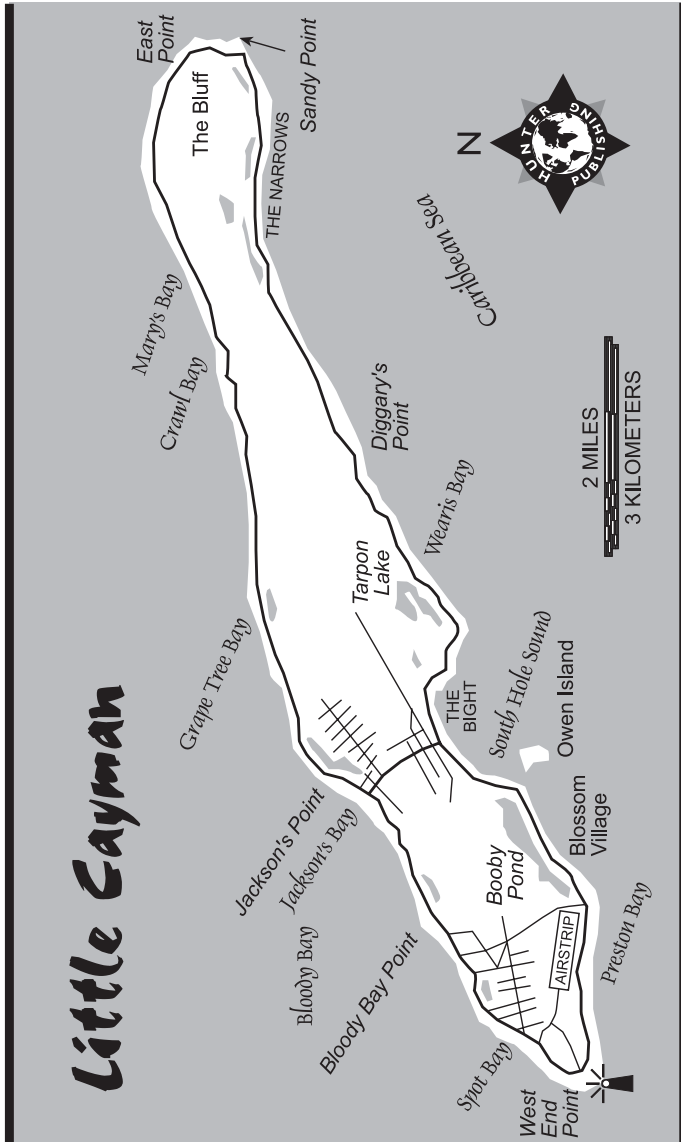


Getting Around

On Wheels

By Car

Only one car rental agency operates on the island. **McLaughlin Jeep Rental** (☎ 345-949-1000, fax 345-948-1001) offers daily and weekly rates for Jeeps; only standard transmission Jeeps are available. To call the rental agency on arrival, pick up the phone on the side of the airport building. Vehicles are right-hand drive; driving is on the left side of the road. A Caymanian driver's permit is required for rentals; obtain one at McLaughlin's.

By Bicycle

Another popular mode of transportation is the bicycle. Guests will find that most resorts offer complimentary use of bicycles and, with practically no traffic on the roads, they offer a peaceful way to see the island, journey to a secluded beach, or pop into Blossom Village. The old cycles may not be the fastest vehicles, but, after all, this is Little Cayman. What's the hurry?



Orientation

Blossom Village

Most of the island's residents live on its southernmost tip near a community called Blossom Village. Here you'll find island services, including the airport, car rental agency, grocery store, gas station, real estate office, restaurant, and several accommodations. The island's main road curves through town, but there's certainly no need to worry about traffic. So little happens on this island, in fact, that there's only one policeman (but locals warn that he's happy

to use his new radar speed gun) and one taxi (but the driver has another job, so don't expect pick up at a moment's notice).

Past the main road, side streets wind through Blossom Village, curving past cheery neighborhoods where everyone knows one another and visitors are greeted with waves and smiles. A small **cemetery**, many of its graves marked with conch shells and white crosses bleached even whiter by the Caribbean sun, marks the final resting place of former Little Cayman residents.

Parallel to Blossom Village stretches a protected **marine park**, home of some of the top snorkeling and dive spots on the island. Here divers find Grundy Gardens, Windsock, Harold's Holes, Jay's Reef, Charlie's Chimney's, Patty's Point, Pirates Reef and Preston Reef, each the location of myriad marine life and underwater formations. Several dive operators offer trips to popular sites.

Beyond Blossom Village

The main road, known formally as **Guy Banks Road** on the southern stretch of the island, winds north past scrubby brushland. Soon the road passes the **Booby Pond Nature Reserve**, a brackish mangrove pond. Trees are dotted with white birds – red-footed boobies – and overhead the distinct shape of the magnificent frigate bird can be seen soaring on the trade winds.

The bay to the north of Owen Island, visible on the right as you travel north from Blossom Village, is known as **South Hole Sound**, and this inlet marks one of the few intersections on the island. Here the **Crossover Road**, or more formally **Spot Bay Road**, crosses to the other side of the island.

Continuing north, the main road soon loses its pavement and gives way to packed dirt and sand, safe for all vehicles. Stay on the road, however, because deep sand is found at some turnoffs. Along this stretch of road you'll pass many shallow ponds on the left side, each lined with low vegetation that forms a home for the island's bountiful bird population. Birders enjoy a drive by **Tarpon Lake**, a favorite with anglers. The brackish lake has tarpon ranging from three to 15 pounds. Birders will find more to interest them along the pond's shoreline. Scrubby undergrowth is thick as you work your way to the north side of the island, climbing a slight rise. This is the island's driest end, a place where the terrain becomes marked with tall cacti and century plants (agave).

East Point is the easternmost point of the island. From here you can see nearby Cayman Brac, seven miles across the channel. This stretch of Little Cayman is nearly deserted, with just a few lone cacti overlooking acres of undeveloped land.

The road then turns back south and traces the northern coast of Little Cayman, a stretch that's one of the favorites with divers. By far the most popular area is **Bloody Bay Wall**, near where the Crossover Road comes out on the north coast road. This stretch of coastline is a marine park safeguarding what has often been called one of the best dive locations on the globe.



DID YOU KNOW?

For many years, Little Cayman's most famous resident, actor **Burgess Meredith**, had a vacation home along this coastline.

This beachfront property is our favorite type of island resort: wonderfully relaxed and friendly. Little Cayman Beach Resort brings together the amenities of a Grand Cayman resort with the privacy of a getaway on Little Cayman. The island's largest property is specially tailored for those who want luxury intermingled with adventures. This pink, two-story conch-shell pink resort overlooks a shallow area inside the reef on the south side of the island. Just outside the reef lie top scuba spots accessible through **Reef Divers**, the on-site operator. Beginners can learn with a resort course or obtain open water certification. Underwater photographers can see their

shots the same day; an underwater photo and video center has E-6 processing and rentals.

Non-divers also enjoy this resort for its laid-back atmosphere. Hammocks sway just yards from the shoreline; loungers line the edge of the freshwater pool a few steps from the bar.

Rooms include air conditioning, balcony or patio, color TV, ceiling fan, and beach. New oceanfront rooms include wet bars, microwaves and coffeemakers. There's a bar, gift shop, restaurant, freshwater pool, dive shop, underwater photo center, fitness center and hot tub.

This 12-room resort is a favorite with divers and it's easy to see why. Four dive instructors reveal the secrets of Bloody Bay Wall, from sheer cliffs to delicate sponges and coral formations. Non-divers find plenty of activity (or non-activity, if they so choose) at Pirates Point as well. Owner Gladys Howard is active in eco-tourism. The lobby of Pirates Point is filled with nature guidebooks, and Gladys also has a nature-trail guide and fishing guide to take visitors

out for a day or half-day of fishing, birding, or just to learn more about the island's indigenous species. The resort offers plenty of temptation to just laze the day away on a powdery white beach or around their pool as well. Guest cottages are simple and light, decorated in Caribbean colors. Rooms include ceiling fan, tile floors, and private baths. Drinking water is produced by the resort's own reverse-osmosis plant.

After a day in the sun, guests can relax in the island's unique bar, furnished with artwork created by previous guests. (The grounds of Pirates Point also feature guest-donated artwork, made of everything from coconut shells to driftwood.)

But there's no doubt that dining ranks as one of the top attractions at Pirates Point. Along with her expertise in natural history, Gladys Howard is also a cordon bleu chef. While guests may like roughing it during the day, at night they can enjoy gourmet meals as elegant as those found at any of the Caribbean's finest resorts. Gladys boasts that "my kitchen never closes." An all-inclusive dive package is available, including a deluxe room with private bath, three gourmet meals daily (with wine), open bar with unlimited drinks, two boat dives daily, use of all dive equipment, airport transfers, use of bicycles, and hammocks, lounges, and beach towels. And for non-divers, an all-inclusive package includes everything except diving. (Hotel tax and 15% gratuity are not included.)

One of the island's earliest accommodations remains a favorite with active travelers. Two dive boats, the 30-foot *Caymaniac* and the 28-foot *Caymanak*, transport divers to sites around the island. Anglers can head out aboard the resort's 32-foot deep-sea fishing boat, the *Reel McCoy*.

Eight guest rooms greet visitors with rustic charm. Tucked beneath shady trees and always in sight of the deserted beach, the rooms feature private baths and air conditioning. Guests can dine right on premises. Other facilities include a small freshwater pool with Jacuzzi jets.

The Southern Cross holds the distinction as the island's first resort; it is along **South Hole Sound**. This resort was recently renovated, and today five beachfront cottages offer 10 guest rooms decorated in island colors; each room has air conditioning, ceiling fans, (no phones or TV) and plenty of water from

the inn's own desalinization plant. Facilities include a freshwater swimming pool and outdoor bar.

Southern Cross has long been a favorite destination with Caribbean anglers. Both deep-sea and tackle fishing for bonefish, tarpon, and permit are offered here. The Southern Cross Club has a 24-foot deepsea fishing boat and a resident fishing guide to make sure you'll return home with plenty of fish tales.

Divers also find everything they need at this resort. Three dive boats offer daily dives at this PADI and NAUI certified shop. This is now an IANTD Nitrox facility. If a day of diving and fishing builds your appetite, that's no problem at this resort.

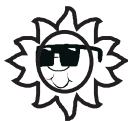

The only stand-alone restaurant on the island is the Hungry Iguana, near the airport. The seaside eatery, named for an iguana often seen at the airport, now sports a 40-foot mural of its namesake. Continental buffet breakfasts start the day; lunch and dinner feature jerk chicken, grouper sandwiches, prime rib, and burgers.

Sunup To Sundown



Beaches

Owen Island

Owen Island is uninhabited; it spans just 11 acres and is a popular day-trip destination for picnickers, who can reach the island's sandy beaches by rowboat. Free.

Point of Sand

This isolated strip of pinkish sand is our favorite on Little Cayman. Swimmers and picnickers find an excellent spot at Point of Sand, aka Sandy Point. Turn right off the main road where you see a stop sign at the approaching road. The sand is packed for the first half of the drive, but stop at the wide section. Do not attempt to take vehicles down to the beach because of deep sand. It's a long walk back to town and there are no facilities or telephones in this park.

The beach, luminescent with beautiful pink sand, is one of the island's prettiest and also most secluded. You very well might spend the entire day on this stretch of beach and never see another person. On weekends, visitors from Cayman Brac often come

over to enjoy the beach. A covered picnic table invites you to enjoy a quiet lunch with the sound of the sea as background music. Free.



Scuba Diving

Its name may be “little,” but this island is a giant in the world of scuba diving. Along its 10-mile length, 57 dive sites are marked with moorings. The most famous site is Bloody Bay Wall on the north side of the island. The wall drops off just a short swim from the shore at a depth of only 20 feet, making it a favorite with snorkelers as well. See pages 227-228 for a list of dive operators.

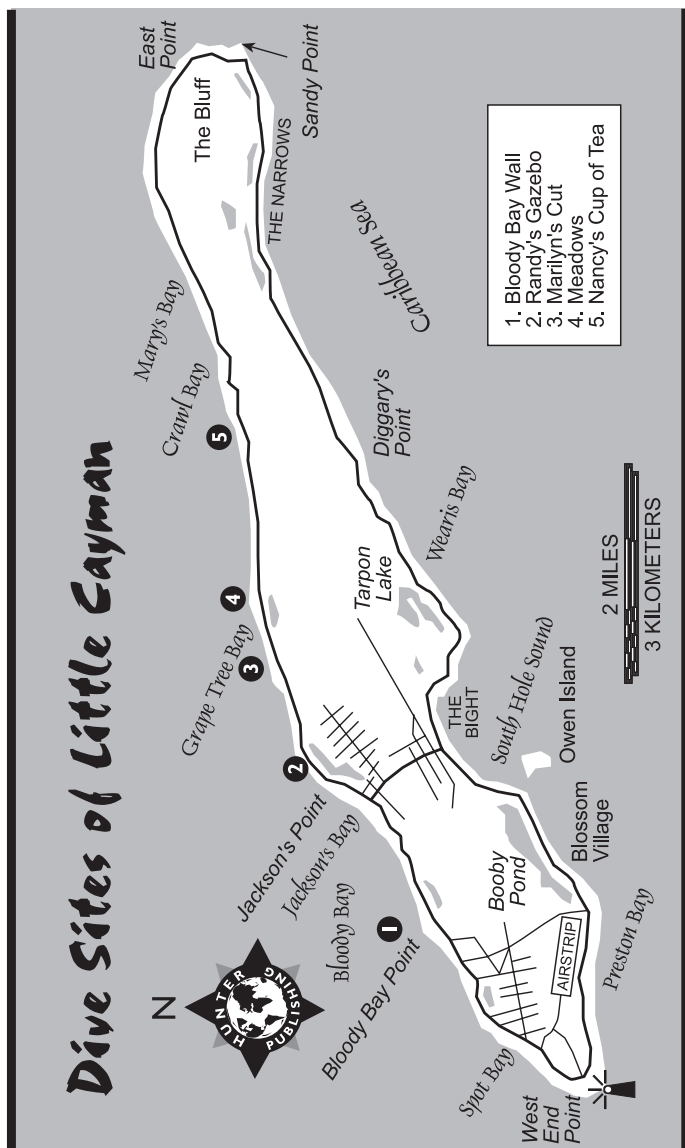
MOLLY THE MANTA

Divers who have enjoyed Little Cayman for many years will miss Molly the Manta, a giant manta ray (with a 12-foot span) that was a familiar sight on night dives in this region. The manta was spotted frequently along the north coast and on the south coast flats from 1991 through 1995. She was also seen off Bloody Bay and would swoop through the water, scooping up plankton that were attracted by divers' lights. Today Molly is no longer around, and it is believed she has reached maturity and gone off in search of a mate.

Best Dive Sites

BLOODY BAY WALL

Starting at a depth of just 25** feet, this site is a favorite with every level of diver and is considered one of the best dive sites in the Caribbean. Named one of



the top dive sites by the late Philippe Cousteau, the wall is thick with sponges and corals and also features many formations such as chimneys, canyons, and coral arches. The wall is a spectacular sight, dropping into sheer blackness from the clear turquoise shallows just inches away.

NANCY'S CUP OF TEA

On the north side of the island off Big Channel, this dive site begins at a depth of just 35 feet before plunging into inky waters. Decorated with multicolored sponges, as well as gorgonians. Look for lots of marine life here.

MEADOWS

West of Nancy's Cup of Tea, this shallow site is home to eagle rays, groupers, and more. Small caverns and overhangs make this spot special.

MARILYN'S CUT

Off Grape Tree Bay on the north side of the island, the cut or crevice leads to a wall filled with sponges and gorgonians.

RANDY'S GAZEBO

Out from Jackson's Point, Randy's Gazebo is noted for its tunnels and swim-throughs. This wall dive includes a natural arch that's a favorite with underwater photographers.

Snorkel Excursions

We have found good snorkeling just about anywhere around the island, but one of the top places for snorkelers is also the island's top dive spot: **Bloody Bay Wall**. The reef starts in shallow water, so snorkelers can enjoy spotting the rich marine life at this site.

You'll also find that several other dive sites are favored by snorkelers. **Nancy's Cup of Tea**, **The Meadows**, and **Jackson Reef** are all popular because the sea floor starts at a shallow level.

Owen Island, on the south side of the island, is also home to good snorkeling, especially on the south side. The island is accessible by boat.

Point of Sand, on the eastern end of the island, is not only one of the island's best beaches but it is also a good snorkel site.

Several operators offer snorkel trips to these and other shallow dive sites. Snorkel trips run between **US? \$15 and \$35.

This center offers rental equipment and instruction. Both 35mm and video cameras are available for rent. The Nikonos V Camera system with an automatic flash, 28mm wide angle lens, and basic photo lesson rents for \$39 for a half-day boat trip or \$59 for 24 hours. Video rental systems include a Hi8mm video camera in housing, one tape, a basic video lesson, and up to one hour of recording time at \$75 for a morning, two-dive boat trip. Additional lenses and flashes are also available for rent.

Reef Photo also offers several photo classes. A coaching session covering any aspect of photography – from wide-angle shots to maintenance of underwater cameras – is available. PADI certification as an underwater photographer, a three-day course, is also available. This course includes two rolls of film, processing, and critique sessions. A similar PADI underwater videographer course is available for the same price **what is the cost of these two courses?**.

SITA PHOTO CHALLENGE

If you come home with an unbeatable shot of your vacation on Little Cayman, consider entering the SITA (Sister Islands Tourism Association) Photo Challenge. Fishing

Shore, reef, and deep-sea fishing are available year-round and local guides can provide tackle and point out the best fishing spots. **Catch-and-release** is encouraged by local captains and applies to all catches that will be not eaten and all billfish that aren't record contenders. Reef fishing is also found along the many miles of reefs that surround this island. Little Cayman is the top destination of the three Cayman Islands for those using light tackle or fly-rods.

Fly-fishing continues to grow in popularity here but anglers should bring all their equipment – guides and charters do not supply saltwater fly rods.

Bonefishing, while not as good as at some islands in the Caribbean or the Florida Keys, is a favorite activity and a challenge to anglers. These three- to eight-pound fish are seen in the shallow areas called muds, places where the sea is churned up by the bottom-feeding fish. Guides recommend baiting with fry. Bonefish can be caught all day although, like other types of fishing, the success rate depends on many factors such as weather and tides. The best bonefishing around Little Cayman is usually found at the South Hole Sound. Bonefishing operators typ-

ically charge about \$110 for a half-day of fishing or \$220 for a full day.

Tarpon fishing is also popular on Little Cayman. Tarpon Pond, a brackish lake north of Blossom Village, is home to many 20-pound tarpon. Fly fishermen will have best luck at this site in early morning and late afternoon.

If you are looking for deep water action, charters seek gamefish, including **blue marlin**, **yellowfin tuna**, **wahoo**, **dolphin** (dorado) and **barracuda**. Taking out a charter boat is not an inexpensive proposition, but for many visitors it's the highlight of their trip. A half-day charter begins at about US \$300 and may range as high as \$1,100 for a full-day trip aboard a large charter with state-of-the-art equipment and tackle.

Whether you're staying on the island or coming over on a day-trip, you can enjoy fishing with a local guide if you give advance notice.

Even the smallest of the Cayman Islands is home to an excellent spa facility. Little Cayman Beach Resort is known for both its diving and its laid-back atmosphere. Hammocks sway just yards from the shore; chaise lounges line the freshwater pool just steps from the bar. The resort is also home to the Nature Spa, which offers a range of massages, as well as a hair and beauty salon. "Being the only spa on Little Cayman, we have brought together a superb team of internationally trained therapists," explains Mark Thwaites, head therapist.

The resort offers an extensive spa menu. Facials include a mini facial, a deep-pore cleansing facial, and the radiance aromatherapy facial, with a combination scalp and facial massage. Sea salt body polish and marine algae body wraps treat the body. Several therapeutic massages are available, ranging from 30 to 90 minutes; another option is a foot massage with a sea salt exfoliation treatment, followed by a hydrating body milk foot massage **what is body milk? Site says "body mask" but no ref to feet/massage**. The spa also offers salon services.

Sightseeing & Excursions

Most of the sights on Little Cayman are natural rather than man-made. Outdoor activities, especially scuba diving and fishing, draw most visitors. Little Cayman presents visitors with plenty of walking and hiking opportunities as well. Almost non-existent traffic, a flat grade on all but the island's easternmost end, and wide roads make Little Cayman perfect for a stroll or hike. Stroll the quiet streets of Blossom Village, the main road out to Tarpon Lake, or the island's beautiful beaches.

For more off-the-beaten-path hiking (and no path on Little Cayman is too beaten), check out the **Salt**

Rock Nature Trail. The trail winds its way from Salt Rock Bay (across from the dock on the north side of the island) through natural habitat and is a favorite hike for birders and those interested in Little Cayman fauna. Look for the 17 endemic species plus orchids, bromeliads, cacti, and mahogany trees. Iguanas, blue land crabs, curly tailed lizards, and many of the island's bird species are spotted as well.

The trail winds past the old railroad that was constructed to serve a former phosphate mining business. Another highlight is **Pirates Well**, a cave fed by a freshwater well. Discovered in 1994, the cave has not yet been fully explored.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Booby Pond Nature Reserve has been designated an international RAMSAR site. For this recognition, which falls under the United Nations convention to protect wetlands for waterfowl habitats, a site must meet strict environmental criteria and be protected by local law.

BOOBY POND NATURE RESERVE Southwest side of island

Birders enjoy this facility, open Monday through Saturday, 2 to 5 pm. Operated by the National Trust, this 1.2-mile-long **at beginning of chapter it says 1.2 acres; which is correct?** brackish mangrove pond is the home of the Caribbean's largest breeding colony of **red-footed boobies** (*Sula Sula*) and a breeding colony of **magnificent frigate birds**. Approximately 30% of the Caribbean population of red-footed boobies resides at this pond. Even without the help of binoculars, you can view the large white

birds (or their large, gray offspring) in the trees. Over 7,000 make their home here. The **Visitors Centre** includes exhibits on the island's many indigenous species, from the common crab to the seed shrimp to the pond's many resident birds. Friendly volunteers staff the center and welcome questions about the wildlife and about island life.

For a close-up look you can view the birds through one of two telescopes (available for use any time) on the porch. One telescope is positioned for use with wheelchairs or for those who would like to sit. The boobies fly about 40 mph and nest in crude constructions made of rough sticks. Admission is free, although donations are welcomed. A small gift shop sells locally made crafts and artwork.

WHAT'S THAT ROTTEN EGG SMELL?

Occasionally, Booby Pond will smell like rotten eggs or sulfur. The odor is the result of hydrogen sulfide gas created from decomposing organic material in the pond. Under normal conditions, the gas is released into the pond water, but when the water level drops the harmless gas is released into the air.

LITTLE CAYMAN MUSEUM

Learn more about the history of this small island in this museum. You'll learn that **Blackbeard** stopped here with his pirates for fresh water (and, some say, to bury his treasure in a brick-lined cave). Other exhibits recall the battle of Bloody Bay.

Shop Till You Drop



Little Cayman is not a shopper's paradise. Don't look for duty-free bargains or anything resembling a good selection of merchandise. What you will find are assorted small gift stores around the island, primarily at the resorts.

Resort Shops

At Little Cayman Beach Resort, **Mermaids** sells jewelry, Spanish coins, clothes, and gift items; the shop is open afternoons only, Monday through Saturday.

T-shirts and some souvenir items can be found at the grocery store and the small shop adjoining **McLaughlin's** rental agency in Blossom Village.

A small gift shop at **Pirates Point** sells a variety of items, including a Little Cayman cookbook prepared by Gladys Howard for the National Trust.

After Dark

Vacationers don't come to Little Cayman for the nightlife. Most simply rest up in preparation for the next day's dive. The best way to spend an evening is to enjoy a relaxing meal at one of the resorts, then go for a walk on the beach. Moonlit strolls through Blossom Village also make a good end to the day.

Cayman Brac

While travelers may head to Grand Cayman for its bustling Seven Mile Beach or to Little Cayman for its quiet allure, Cayman Brac has its own unique assets and charms. This middle child of the Cayman Islands trio is increasingly known for its eco-tourism attractions that include world-class diving along undersea walls, hiking in the most rugged terrain found in the Cayman Islands, strolling the new system of **Heritage Sites and Trails**, exploring numerous caves, birding, sunning, and much more.

Its people are another of this island's true treasures. "Brackers are all nice and enjoy talking," explains Terri Scott, the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism representative on the island. "People come back often to the island because they feel welcomed and feel like they know people here."

We found that Cayman Brac was indeed a friendly destination. After a few hours on the island, we noticed how many residents stopped working in their gardens or stopped their conversation along the side of the road to wave to oncoming cars (still somewhat of a novelty on this tiny isle).

Cayman Brac has its own special qualities, assets that include world-class diving along undersea walls, hiking in the most rugged terrain found in the Cayman Islands, caves that tempt exploration, birding, and much more. The island is named for the "brac," Gaelic for bluff, which "soars" 140 feet up from the sea on the island's east end. It's the most distinct feature of this 12-mile-long, one-mile-wide island situated 89 miles east-northeast of Grand Cayman and just five miles from Little Cayman. With a population of only 1,300 residents, Cayman Brac is closer

in pace to Little Cayman than its big brother, Grand Cayman.

Getting Here

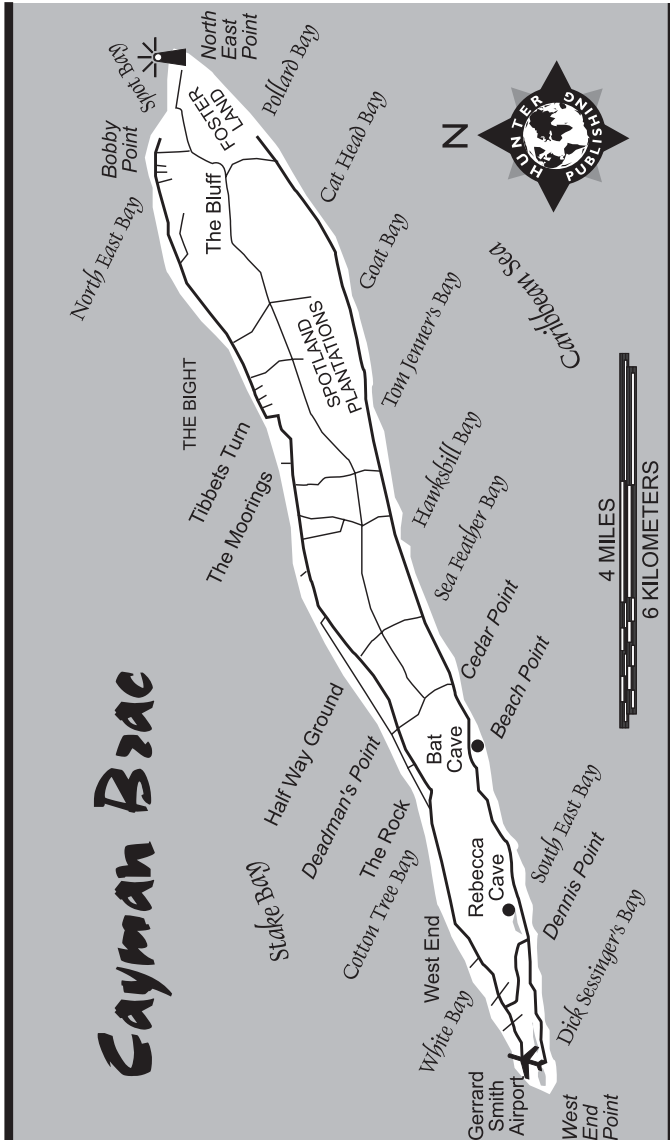
By Air

Direct flights to Cayman Brac's **Gerrard Smith Airport** are available from Miami, Tampa, Atlanta and Houston or from Grand Cayman aboard **Cayman Airways** (☎ 800-422-9626, from Canada 800-441-3003, www.caymanairways.com).

Twice-daily service from **Grand Cayman** is also provided on small prop planes with **Island Air** (☎ 345-949-5252, Monday through Friday, 9 am to 5 pm, fax 345-949-7044, www.islandair.ky). The 70-minute flight makes a brief stop in Little Cayman. Passengers may check up to 55 pounds of baggage free of charge; excess baggage is charged US 50¢ per pound.

Flights are also available on Island Air to Cayman Brac from **Little Cayman**. Special fares are offered for children under age 12.

Because of its proximity to the US, many private pilots also arrive by their own aircraft. If you are a private pilot, you'll find that Gerrard Smith airport is an official port of entry. For information on bringing your plane to the Cayman Islands (including how to get an overflight permit from the Cuban government), contact the Airport Officer, PO Box 58, West

Orientation

You won't have difficulty exploring Cayman Brac on your own – that's half the fun! You can obtain a good road map from the **Department of Tourism** at the airport or from your car rental agency. If you get lost, just pull over and ask a local resident for directions.

You'll probably start your look at this long, eel-shaped island at Gerrard Smith Airport. The airport is on the island's westernmost end near a town named, appropriately enough, **West End**. This end of the island is also home to most guest accommodations and the island's only beaches.

You've basically got two routes around the island: **A6** (locals refer to it as the **North Side Road**) traces the northern coast, starting at West End and working past Knob Hill, Banksville, Half Way Ground, Molusca Heights, Tibbetts Turn, and Spot Bay, the most populated area of the island. Along the way, the road looks out on a sea that hides several good dive sites beneath its placid waters.

On this eastern end of the island, you'll see more traditional building styles; these were the first houses built on the island. Spot Bay is now constructing Heritage Park, an area that will recall the heritage of the island and offer nature tourism sites and trails. **Please update this text, it is identical to the wording in the 2001 *Adventure Guide***

Or you can take the southern route. On the southern shore, **A7** (usually called the **South Side Road**) traces its way from West End Point all the way northeast, journeying past the island's resorts – Brac Reef Beach Resort and Divi Tiara Beach Resort – past several good caves that are favorites with outdoor adventurers, and up to Pollard Bay.

A small center road (labeled **Ashton Reid Drive** on the maps but known as **Bluff Road** by residents) works through the center of the island, and this is the route to Cayman Brac's best known attraction: the bluffs or the Brac. From this road, turn east on the gravel **Major Donald Drive** (aka **Lighthouse Road**) and continue to the Parrot Reserve and the Lighthouse.

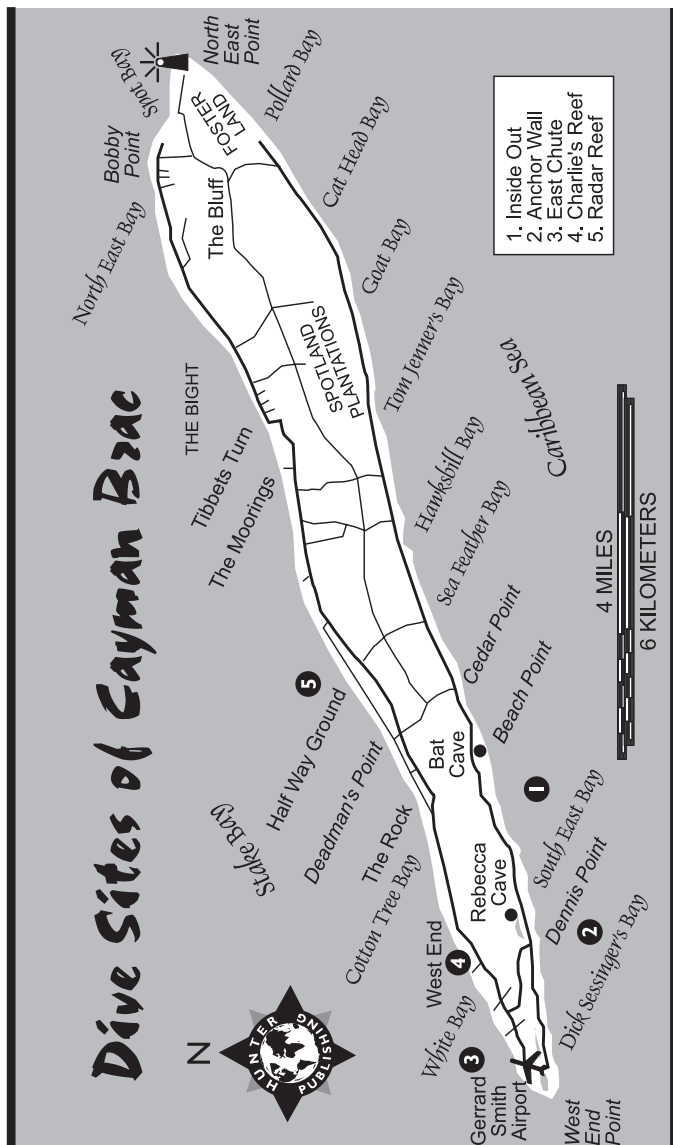


Beaches

Although Brac is notable for its seaside cliffs rather than its beaches, there are a couple of sandy areas. Along with the resort beaches, the **Public Beach** on the island's south side offers plenty of sunny solitude. Resort beaches are found at **Brac Reef Beach Resort** (see page 243).

Scuba Diving

Without a doubt, diving is one of the island's top attractions. Over 50 excellent dive sites tempt all levels of divers. The latest attraction is a Russian frigate deliberately sunk in September 1996. Renamed the MV *Captain Keith Tibbetts*, this 330-foot freighter was built for the Cuban navy. It lies approximately 200 yards offshore northwest of Cayman Brac. The bow rests in about 90 feet of water; the stern is just 40 feet below the surface. The sinking of the vessel was recorded by Jean-Michel Cousteau Productions in a documentary film called *Destroyer at Peace*. Before being sunk, the ship was modified and made safe for divers, who can now swim through



the upper three decks. The hull and lower decks cannot be entered, but divers can see into most of the ship, including the missile launcher, fore and aft deck cannons, and living quarters.

It doesn't take long for marine life to discover the additions to their underwater home; already divers are spotting eagle rays, stingrays, queen angelfish, filefish, four-eyed butterfly fish, puffer fish, batfish, snapper, red soldier fish, sergeant majors, French grunts, barracuda, jacks, and more.

Best Dive Sites

ANCHOR WALL

Located on the south side of the island off Dennis Point, this wall dive is considered intermediate level. Don't miss the anchor of an old Spanish galleon; it marks the entrance to a tunnel leading to a vertical wall that drops into the deep blue abyss.

CHARLIE'S REEF

On the north side of the island near Cotton Tree Bay, this 20- to 60-foot dive is a favorite with beginners and is named for a green moray eel who calls this home.

INSIDE OUT

This wall dive off South East Bay is a favorite with beginners because of its shallow (15- to 50-foot) depth. With coral heads, a tunnel, and plenty of marine life, it's a good choice for anyone.

RADAR REEF

Off Half Way Ground on the island's north side, this shallow dive can be reached from shore and is a favorite for night diving. Look for octopus!

EAST CHUTE

This all-level dive, on the north side of the island in White Bay, has something for everyone. Wreck di-

vers will find the remains of a 65-foot vessel in its waters; those looking for spectacular formations will find canyons and tunnels.

Bird-watching

Bird-watching is a favorite activity on Cayman Brac. You'll find a self-guided tour at the **Parrot Reserve** (see *Sightseeing*, below). There are several

other good sites on the island where you might spot the West Indian whistling duck, one of which is the **Saltwater Pond** on the southwest coast.

During the winter months, birders can look for peregrine falcons. Other top birding times are the spring and winter migrations in February and March, as well as November and December. Birders are challenged by about 120 species, including the brown booby, Vitelline warbler, and the white-tailed tropicbird. Sightseeing

Caves

Cayman Brac's scenic bluff is pocked with caves that frame beautiful seaside views. Some guess that pre-Columbian Indian settlements used the caves; others say they were the lair of plundering pirates who used their dark recesses to hide their loot. During the Great Hurricane of 1932, these caves also offered shelter for many Brackers. Today several of the island's 18 caves have been explored and five are frequently enjoyed by vacationers.

REBECCA'S CAVE

Located east of Divi Tiara Hotel, this cave is marked with signs. The best-known of the island's caves, sadly this one is named for a young child who died here during the Great Hurricane of 1932.

PETER'S CAVE

Peter's Cave requires either a climb down a steep path or a hike downhill. From the cave's entrance, travelers can view the community of Spot Bay below.

Other challenges for spelunkers include **Skull Cave** (on the north coast near the high school and east of Faith Hospital), two-level **Bat Cave** (on the south side of the island and marked with signs), and, for those prepared for a steep climb, **Great Cave** (on the south side).

★ TIP

If you are interested in doing some caving, bring along a flashlight, a pair of old jeans, and good climbing shoes.



The Brac

The most recognized site on the island is the Brac, the sheer bluff that is visited by hikers and non-hikers alike. To reach the bluff, follow the gravel road north off Ashton Reid Road, the island cross-road. The gravel road runs six miles to a lighthouse. This area is a favorite with bird watchers. Here, the 180-acre **Parrot Reserve** (see page 256) is home to endangered Cayman Brac parrots. Only 400 of the birds remain in the wild on this island.

Cayman Brac Community Park

This park in the West End includes a short nature trail that identifies about 10 types of indigenous trees. The park is also home to a playset and is popular with families. It was dedicated by Governor Michael Gore in 1995. Stop by the Department of Tourism office adjacent to the park while you're in the neighborhood. Open daily. Free.

The Cayman Brac Museum

This charming museum at Stake Bay recalls the early history of seafaring on this island. Located in a building constructed in 1933, first as a bank, then customs office, treasury and finally post office, the museum includes an interesting exhibit about thatch rope making, once a popular craft using the island's silver thatch palm fronds. The museum also houses shipbuilding tools, photos, and even a replica of a turtle schooner. Hours: Monday through Friday from 9 am to noon and 1 to 4 pm, and on Saturday from 9 am to noon. ☎ 345-948-2622. Free.

Heritage Trails

Hikers and birders will also be interested in the new series of **Heritage Sites and Trails**. This extensive program of trails throughout the island was recently instituted by the Department of Tourism and includes 35 marked trails. Some are easy to reach while others require more hiking. Visitors can obtain a free map and brochure of the trails from the Department of Tourism office (adjacent to the Cayman Brac Community Park, ☎ 345-948-1849).

Sites include the **West End Point Overlook** on the South Side Road west of Brac Reef Beach Resort; this lookout is an easily accessible point and good for bird-watching, as well as the island's best sunset view. Nearby, the **Westerly Ponds** are good spots for watching wetlands birds. Boardwalks lead to a small viewing area. For hikers, the **Beach Walk to First Cay**, on the southeast shore at the southeast end of South Side Road, takes about two hours and follows the shoreline below the Bluff. Free.



Parrot Reserve

Cayman Brac's Parrot Reserve, set atop the Bluff, has a newly opened trail that is open to the public for self-guided tours. The trail is a mile long and takes hikers through the 180-acre Parrot Reserve, home to the endangered Cayman Brac parrot. The best time to spot the emerald green bird is July through September. They're often seen on top of the Bluff and around Stake Bay.

The Parrot Reserve is also a good destination for those interested in the flora and fauna of the island. Thirty-eight plant species can be seen here. Look for candlewood, mastic, wild banana orchid plants, and other exotic species.

Whether you visit the reserve to spot birds or plants, be sure to bring water; there are no facilities along the trail. Travelers should also wear long pants and good shoes for the trek, which traverses ironshore.

Lighthouse

From the Parrot Reserve, continue traveling on Major Donald Drive east to the lighthouse at the end of the road (and high atop the Bluff; don't get too close to the edge!) There are actually two lighthouses at this point; an historic lighthouse and a newer model. Both are just lights atop tall towers, but the view from this area is dramatic.

What makes the view dramatic is the 140-foot-high Bluff, the highest point in the Cayman Islands. A trail weaves its way to the edge of the Bluff and provides excellent photo opportunities. Rocky paths

snake their way along the Bluff; wear hiking boots for this challenge.
