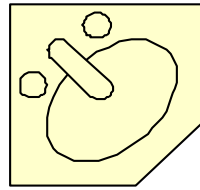

SPRING and SUMMER are UNDOUBTEDLY the BEST SEASONS for the BUTTERFLY WATCHER, at least in terms of DIVERSITY. But even though many SPECIES will have DISAPPEARED from the SCENE by early SEPTEMBER a few INSECTS TREASURES can still be FOUND, one of the most ATTRACTIVE of which is the RED ADMIRAL. This STRIKING species is often found in CONSIDERABLE NUMBERS feeding on the FLOWERS of IVY or MICHAELMAS daisy and the damaged REMAINS of BLACKBERRIES.

But though he was BRAVE, Richard did not INSPIRE his PEOPLE. He was ARROGANT and UNTRUSTWORTHY, sitting HAUGHTILY on his throne and forcing people to KNEEL if they caught his eye. His biggest mistake was to try and RULE without Parliament. He abused his powers so arbitrarily that eventually the BARONS had to act in self-protection. Richard's cousin Henry of Lancaster seized the CROWN in 1399 and a year later Richard was murdered in Pontefract Castle – the FIRST casualty of the WARS of the ROSES.

Henry RESPONDED by putting Richard's BODY on PUBLIC DISPLAY, to show that he was DEAD, and by CHOPPING up his ENEMIES and CARTING their BODIES to LONDON in SACKS. By 1410 he had succeeded in QUELLING the opposition, but was desperately SHORT of MONEY – and KEPT so by Parliament. Henry had always wanted to DIE in Jerusalem on a Crusade. In the EVENT, he died in 1413, probably of LEPROSY, in the Jerusalem CHAMBER of Westminster ABBEY.

It was a THANKLESS inheritance for anyone in troubled times, let alone a CHILD.

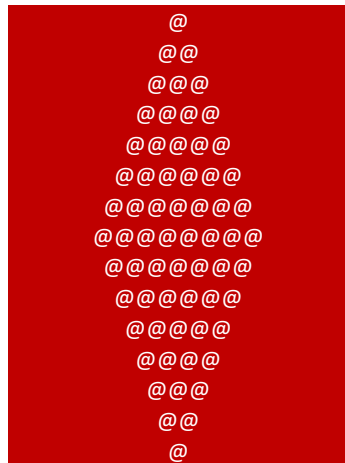

But even though many SPECIES will have DISAPPEARED from the SCENE by early SEPTEMBER a few INSECTS TREASURES can still be FOUND, one of the most ATTRACTIVE of which is the RED ADMIRAL. This STRIKING species is often found in CONSIDERABLE NUMBERS feeding on the FLOWERS of IVY or MICHAELMAS daisy and the damaged REMAINS of BLACKBERRIES.

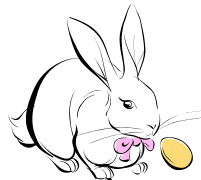

AUSTRALIAN HEAVY METAL BAND which EMERGED as one of the more INFLUENTIAL HARD ROCK GROUPS in the mid 1970's. Led by SINGER Bon SCOTT, ACDC came together in SYDNEY in 1974 and RAPIDLY earned a REPUTATION as one of the most THEATRICAL LIVE ACTS of the era. The band's STAGE SHOW was ENHANCED by YOUNG'S adoption of a MOCK schoolboy costume complete with CAP and SHORT trousers. Hit ALBUMS included Highway to Hell (1979), the LAST album on which Scott APPEARED before his DEATH in 1980. Englishman Brian JOHNSON, former LEAD singer of the ROCK band GEORDIE, took Scott's place as lead VOCALISTS, and the band RETAINED its STATUS as one of the most SUCCESSFUL heavy metal OUTFITS with albums like Razor's Edge (1980). The expression Ac/Dc (BORROWED from the TERMINOLOGY of ELECTRICITY) is widely used of BISEXUALS or of those HOMOSEXUALS who take BOTH PASSIVE and ACTIVE roles in a sexual encounter.

A SINGER-SONGWRITER and GUITARIST, who became one of the LEGENDS of ROCK 'n' ROLL before his PREMATURE DEATH in an AIR CRASH just 18 MONTHS after his first hit. HOLLY developed a UNIQUE ROCKABILLY style. 'That'll be the day' REACHED NUMBER one on BOTH sides of the ATLANTIC in 1957 and made him a huge OVERNIGHT star. The STREAM of HITS that FOLLOWED confirmed his STATUS as one of the GREATS of rock 'n' roll, and he QUICKLY became a DOMINANT figure in the CHARTS with such CLASSICS as 'Maby Baby', 'Think it Over', 'Peggy Sue', 'Listen to Me', 'Well All Right', 'Slippin' and Slidin', 'Not Fade Away' and 'Rave on'. It all came to a SUDDEN end on the 3rd of FEBRUARY 1959 when, with 'It Doesn't Matter Any More' CLIMBING the charts and a BRILLIANT solo CAREER beckoning, Holly DIED with Ritchie VALENS and the BIG BOPPER when their chartered AIRCRAFT crashed in a snowstorm near Clear Lake IOWA, DURING a US TOUR.

US SINGER SONGWRITER, whose FOLK influenced songs WON a HUGE AUDIENCE on BOTH sides of the ATLANTIC in the 1970's. His CLASSIC hit 'American Pie' (1972), a LAMENT about the DEATH of Buddy HOLLY, ESTABLISHED him as a STAR, and it was FOLLOWED by the EQUALLY ADMIRERD 'Vincent'. He also WROTE HITS for other ARTISTS among them 'And I Love You So' for Perry COMO and 'Wonderful Baby' for Fred ASTAIRE; while he himself was the SUBJECT of Roberta FLACK'S 'Killing Me Softly with his Song'. He TOPPED the pop CHARTS once more in 1980 with a COVER VERSION of 'Crying', but he has SINCE CONCENTRATED on COUNTRY MUSIC.

EDWARD III'S son the BLACK PRINCE PREDECEASED his father, so it was Edward's GRANDSON RICHARD who SUCCEEDED in 1377, AGED 10. The PEASANT'S REVOLT followed 4 YEARS later. PRICES had RISEN SHARPLY because of the Black DEATH, but WAGES had not risen in LINE. Richard FACED down a HOSTILE mob whose LEADER Wat Tyler was KILLED.

But though he was BRAVE, Richard did not INSPIRE his PEOPLE. He was ARROGANT and UNTRUSTWORTHY, sitting HAUGHTILY on his throne and forcing people to KNEEL if they caught his eye. His biggest mistake was to try and RULE without Parliament. He abused his powers so arbitrarily that eventually the BARONS had to act in self-protection. Richard's cousin Henry of Lancaster seized the CROWN in 1399 and a year later Richard was murdered in Pontefract Castle – the FIRST casualty of the WARS of the ROSES.

Although he was EDWARD III'S GRANDSON, there were others who had a BETTER CLAIM to the THRONE than HENRY. He was 33 when he SEIZED the CROWN in 1399, and he SPENT much of his REIGN STRUGGLING to HOLD on to it.

RICHARD II'S FAMILY immediately ROSE against him, as did Owen Glendower in WALES and his powerful ALLIES Mortimer and Percy. Henry RESPONDED by putting Richard's BODY on PUBLIC DISPLAY, to show that he was DEAD, and by CHOPPING up his ENEMIES and CARTING their BODIES to LONDON in SACKS. By 1410 he had succeeded in QUELLING the opposition, but was desperately SHORT of MONEY – and KEPT so by Parliament. Henry had always wanted to DIE in Jerusalem on a Crusade. In the EVENT, he died in 1413, probably of LEPROSY, in the Jerusalem CHAMBER of Westminster ABBEY.

HENRY was an OUTSTANDING KING, duly CELEBRATED in one of SHAKESPEARE'S most FAMOUS PLAYS. He was only 26 when his FATHER DIED in 1413, but he had already PROVED himself as a SOLDIER in a long CAMPAIGN against the WELSH. In 1415 he turned his ATTENTION to FRANCE, besieging Harfleur and DESTROYING the FINEST French CHIVALRY at Agincourt. By 1420 he had MARRIED the KING'S DAUGHTER and FORCED him to RECOGNIZE Henry as HEIR to the French THRONE, in place of his own son.

At HOME he was a SHREWD POLITICIAN and fine administrator. He was GREATLY admired for his PIETY and HARD WORK. Unfortunately, he died of DYSENTERY in 1422, leaving a son just 9 MONTHS old to INHERIT the thrones of both ENGLAND and France. It was a THANKLESS inheritance for anyone in troubled times, let alone a CHILD.

BORN in 1421, KING from 1422, HENRY grew up deeply RELIGIOUS and not in the least WARLIKE. He was a KIND, GENTLE man, TERRIFIED of GIRLS. He once saw the BODY of a TRAITOR, QUARTERED on a STAKE, and ORDERED that NOBODY was ever to be TREATED like that again in his NAME.

But Henry was far to FEEBLE to be a king. His FRENCH GRANDFATHER had been MENTALLY ill, and so was Henry from 1454. The French REFUSED to ACCEPT him as their MONARCH. In ENGLAND, the DUKE of YORK CLAIMED the CROWN for HIMSELF in 1455. The WORST of the WARS of the ROSES followed, during which Henry saw FREQUENT PERIODS of CAPTIVITY. His PEOPLE looked to him for LEADERSHIP, but were always DISAPPOINTED. He was finally MURDERED by York's son in 1471, leaving behind ETON Collage and King's Collage, CAMBRIDGE as his only MEMORIALS.

EDWARD was BORN in 1442, the son of the DUKE of YORK. His FATHER led the YORKISTS in the WARS of the ROSES, but was KILLED in 1460. Edward was CROWNED a year later, although HENRY VI was still ALIVE. But Henry was MURDERED at the TOWER of LONDON in 1471 and Edward RULED undisputed thereafter.

He was a good SOLDIER and a STRONG KING. His CHIEF ally in the EARLY years was the EARL of WARWICK (the KINGMAKER), who later turned against him. Edward DEFEATED Warwick and also his own BROTHER, the Duke of CLARENCE, allegedly DROWNED in a BUTT of MALMSEY. During the LATTER part of his REIGN, he took a great INTEREST in William CAXTON, who had introduced printing to ENGLAND. Edward DIED in 1483, leaving 2 sons AGED 9 and 12 in the CARE of his brother RICHARD, Duke of GLOUCESTER.

No **KING** ever had a more **TRAGIC REIGN** than **EDWARD**. He was 12 when his **FATHER DIED** in 1483. His **LANCASTRIAN MOTHER** immediately **SUMMONED** him to **LONDON**, in order to **PROTECT** him from his father's **YORKIST BROTHER, RICHARD, DUKE of GLOUCESTER**. However Richard **CAPTURED** Edward on the **ROAD** and **IMPRISONED** him in the **TOWER** of London.

His **YOUNGER** brother followed, and the two were held **CAPTIVE** while Richard **DECIDED** what to do with them. His own **POSITION** would be **THREATENED** if he let them go. **NOBODY** has ever **PROVED** that he had them **KILLED**, but there is **STRONG EVIDENCE** that he did. The two **PRINCES DISAPPEARED** in the autumn of 1483 and were never seen again. Their **SKELETONS** were discovered in 1674, during **REBUILDING WORK** at the Tower, and are now **BURIED** in Westminster Abbey.

RICHARD might have been a good **KING** if it wasn't for the **PRINCES** in the **TOWER**. **BORN** in 1452, he was a **BRAVE SOLDIER**, an able **ADMINISTRATOR** and a **HAPPY FAMILY** man, much **RESPECTED** on his home **TERRITORY** in the **NORTH** of **ENGLAND**. But the **MURDER** of the two Princes in 1483, and Richard's **SEIZURE** of the **CROWN** for himself, **ENSURED** that his was one of the shortest **REIGNS** in **ENGLISH HISTORY**.

The Princes' **MOTHER** immediately **OFFERED** their **SISTER** Elizabeth as a **WIFE** to Henry **TUDOR**, an **EXILED LANCASTRIAN** of illegitimate **ROYAL BLOOD**. Henry **ECCEPTEED** and **INVADED** England in 1485. Richard was so unpopular by then that some of his **ALLIES** simply stood and **WATCHED** as he **CHARGED** to his **DEATH** at the **BATTLE** of Bosworth. His **NAKED** body was slung over a horse and displayed in **LEICESTER** for 2 days, after which it was buried in an **UNMARKED GRAVE**.

SLY, CRAFTY and highly INTELLIGENT, HENRY was BORN in 1457, the son of an OBSCURE WELSH NOBLEMAN. On his MOTHER'S side he was DESCENDED from EDWARD III and became leader of the LANCASTRIAN party after the other CLAIMANTS to the THRONE had been KILLED. A poor SOLDIER, he was LUCKY to have DEFEATED RICHARD III at BOSWORTH in 1485.

He was also the last MONARCH to SIEZE the CROWN by FORCE. By MARRYING Elizabeth of YORK (the QUEEN depicted on PLAYING CARDS), he brought the WARS of the ROSES to an end and SECURED a lasting PEACE. He TAXED the nobility so HEAVILY that they were unable to cause trouble, and ENCOURAGED trade with EUROPE as well as FINANCING the discovery of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. He DIED in 1509 leaving the COUNTRY stable and prosperous for the first time in 100 YEARS.

DESPITE his SAVAGE REPUTATION – he DIVORCED 2 of his 6 WIVES and BEHEADED another 2, as well as COUNTLESS of his SUBJECTS – HENRY was actually an outstanding RULER. He was BORN in 1491 and SUCCEEDED his FATHER at 17. He was HANDSOME, CLEVER and naturally AUTHORITATIVE, and for the NEXT 38 years he DOMINATED the KINGDOM as a few MONARCHS have done either BEFORE or SINCE.

Perhaps his most NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENT was to BREAK with the CHURCH of ROME, making ENGLAND the first of many COUNTRIES to go on their own way under a PROTESTANT CROWN. But he also presided over a great increase in prosperity, at a time when much of EUROPE was in religious and political turmoil. And he did it without a standing ARMY, which is arguably the greatest feat of all. The COUNTRY felt an enormous LOSS when he DIED in 1547.

Method

Put all the ingredients for the marinade in a shallow dish and stir well. Cover the beef with this and leave to marinate in the fridge for 30 minutes. Remove the beef from the marinade with a slotted spoon and reserve the marinade. Heat the vegetable oil in a wok or frying pan. Add the beef, stir-fry for 3-4 minutes, or until browned. Remove the beef and set aside. Add the peppers, celery and spring onions to the wok or pan. Stir-fry for 4 minutes, or until just tender. Return the beef and marinade to the wok or pan. Boil for 2 minutes. Sprinkle over the sesame oil and cook for 1 minute. Serve immediately.

Sieve the flour and sugar into a basin. Rub in the butter with the fingertips until free from lumps. Knead until smooth and roll out on a floured board till it is a quarter of an inch thick. Then with 2 round cutters, one smaller than the other cut the paste into horseshoe shapes. Place on a greased and floured tin and bake in a moderate oven till crisp and brown. Then brush them over with beaten egg white. Sprinkle thickly with shredded almonds and return to the oven until the almonds are a golden colour.

Add the cottage cheese, sour cream, salt and pepper, mix well. Stir in the cheddar cheese. Fold the cooked macaroni into the cheese mixture gently, mix well. Spoon the macaroni mixture into the prepared baking dish. Bake for ½ hour, or until the mixture is bubbling and slightly browned. Sprinkle with chopped fresh parsley and serve immediately.

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, gas mark 4. Place the lamb in a bowl and toss in the flour and seasoning, until well coated. Heat the oil in a large casserole dish over a medium-high heat. Cook the lamb (in batches) until browned on all sides, about 4 minutes. Meanwhile, quarter the potatoes and peel and slice the onions. Slice the carrots and peel and chop the garlic. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the lamb to a plate. Add the onion, carrot and garlic to the casserole and cook for 2 minutes. Add any remaining flour and cook for 1 minute. Return the lamb to the casserole and add the stock, wine, potatoes and thyme. Bring to the boil. Cover and bake for 40 minutes. Add the peas and cook for a further 15 minutes, serve immediately.
